Behind The Caricature

If the cartoonists would leave him uncaricatured long enough for the rest of us to take a long look at him as he is, we would see in President Charles de Gaulle not only the saddest, but the most classic, figure on the world scene. There is seldom anything really gleeful about the fall that finally encounters excessive pride.

And the word the Greeks had for the consuming self-confidence, near arrogance which has grown more and more lominant in the public aspect of de Gaulle -the word hubris -was a word which implied an inevitable setting for searing tragedy.

It is not furny when the French leader s finally cornered by all the little people and the little concerns his grandeur so easily neglected because it assumed they could be happy merely to exist in a world blessed by his own leadership. Nor is he revealed as an evil, wicked man, now that his fates seem about to

come crashing down on him. He is probably the kind of man he had to be in order to be obstinate enough and big enough to attain the unquestionable triumphs and rightnesses of his

The pity is that he was human enough to assume, beyond logic and beyond reason and beyond what his own intellectual devotion to the lessons of history should have taught to him, that something was going to give the gift to others to see him as he came to see himself.

When a figure thus helps the fates set their inevitable trap for him, they then proceed to do a masterfully savage job. Here was President de Gaulle, happy and buoyant because he himself seemed to be speeding and cheering along the inevitable loosening of the two power politics alliances which had stood against each other in Europe for nearly a quarter of a century, pleased at the opportunity to be playing host to the negotiations over Vietnam he himself had long recommended as the necessary ultimate outcome, and serene in his belief that he had reestablished a France which was

no longer vassal to anybody. And, at this happy moment, France itself threatens to turn into a formless, structureless, cohesionless piece of nothingness, not to be ruled by anybody, not to sustain anybody.

Just at the height of the climactic grand ball of renewed leadership for France -in the image of himself -the magic midnight sounds and the zenith of glory proves to be nothing more than a dream which cracks to expose the prince to shame before the world, Sometimes the fates include a kindly courtesy in their final scene, Sometimes the fallen hero is spared the pain of being able to see himself as others see him.

More War Is Available

The fact that there are now 47,000 imerican soldiers in Thailand—many more than the 8,000 which represented our strength there in 1962 - and also many more than the 18,000 President Kennedy dispatched to South Vietnamis now producing one almost automatic

The United States and Thailand are deep in negotiations for a "status of forces" treaty which will formalize the legal position our soldiers hold under American command but under Thatland's own civil sovereignity. Up to now, our personnel in Thailand have been enjoying the legal status of special guests exempt from Thailand's own civil laws. But recently Thailand tried some American soldiers and convicted them of offenses, nonetheless, and it is considered certain that one of the things the United States will yield in the treaty now being discussed is this anachronistic survival of extra-territorial rights for its



So the question becomes is there a pattern to all this? Certainly there is, and the point is that more often than not the students are right in their objectives, and wrong in terms of their means.

To generalize again, most authoritarian countries are handling their problems with students with force and the immediate result is to restore order. But then the Communist countries and the dictatorships are concerned only with immediate results, and not the seeds that are planted. The democracies are moving slower, and are experiencing great mmediate difficulties. While the destruction of property or

the use of physical force cannot be condoned, it is also fair to say that students are committing themselves to solutions which they believe to be right. To some extent they are getting results, yet many of the tactics represent intimidation, and not civil disobedience. Organized protest is a right guaranteed to every American, student or otherwise. But it can only be hoped that this form of protest will be more used so that coleges and universities will not have to resort to wholesale dismissals.
