



Centennial Thoughts

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, head of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued an "order" designating May 30 of that year -one hundred years ago -as a day for "decorating the graves of comrades who died in detense of their country during the late rebellion."

The "late rebellion" was the American Civil War, the most costly spilling of blood in which the American people have ever engaged. The descendants of those who "died in defense of their country" and those who died on the other side of the conflict now live together in the same country, in some degree of mutual understanding, and far, one hopes, from any renewal of that warring of brother with brother which makes the bloodiest of all strife.

It seems a very long time -although it was only really yesterday -since the last actual surviving member of that Grand Army of the Republic participat-ed in the ceremony of Decoration Day. A century can be a very long time, especially in the life of a very young nation. And today, as we contemplate some of the purposes of that struggle a century ago we are high in our awareness of the fact that a century has been a very long time for those black Americans to whom the course of the Civil War brought the proclamation of their legal freedom.

Memorial Day has, with the passing of the Grand Army itself, faded somewhat, and the holiday has expanded itself to a more general significance, in which we, the living, pay our homage to all those who have made their sacrifice of life itself, in whatever struggle, in behalf of the freedom of their fellow Amer-

But on this present Memorial Day, as on the several just past, we all go back to the specific Civil War connection because we find we must ask ourselves just how well one of those Civil War results . . . the Emancipation Proclamation, has been honored in the actual result over the ensuing century.

Our honor, our love, our acknowledgment of debt, to those who have died to make the American life possible. Our resolve, our own courage, our willingness to make personal contribution to the continuing business of trying to make American life become all that it can and should be for all Americans.

Big Deal? It Might Be

We laymen who are normally and naturally impatient with the delicacies, obscurities and subtleties of professional diplomacy certainly find ourselves tempted to loud and discourteous guffaws when we read from Paris that much is being made of a slight indication that the negotiators from Hanot have perhaps begun to make an indirect admission that there are actually North Vietnamese troops located and fighting in South

For three years now, at least ever since our bombing of North Vietnam seemed to become the signal for the first substantial movement of North Vietnamese troops into South Vietnam, it has been accepted as fact by the whole world that at least a certain number of official North Vietnamese soldiers have

been in South Vietnam. So it seems less of an honest admission than a silly and pointless continuation of evasion for a Hanol spokesman at Paris to include the following paragraph in his Monday prepared state-"Vietnam is one country, the Viet-

namese people are one. When the United States commits aggression against Vietnam, any Vietnamese has the right to fight them, and that on any portion of his dear country's territory. This is a sacred and inalienable right."

But apparently to Averell Harriman, the experienced, the hard-boiled, the non-soft chief negotiator for our side at Paris, it may not be entirely silly and pointless, it may even be hopeful, for Hanoi to be saying this. The reason is devious and subtle, in

the annoying ways of professional diplomacy. It seems that Harriman has been pushing toward the point where he

will want to exchange some understand ing with the North Vietnamese about further reduction of American bombing of the North in return for some possible limitation on, or decrease in, the deployment of North Vietnamese troops into South Vietnam. So far, the North Vietnamese have been answering him, in effect, by asking "what troops of ours in South Vietnam? Who says we have troops there? This is a base imperialist lie!" This, at the least, has amounted to a refusal even to discuss possible lim-

either by some unofficial contact behind the scenes, or by some oblique reference of his own in one of his more formal

We laymen have trouble believing it, but things sometimes do happen this way, and sometimes what happens as a result can be considered good. We can afford patience and suspension of judg ment, and at the same time implore haste, for although it has taken two weeks for the North Vietnamese to seem to begin to admit they have troops it South Vietnam, at least a few thousand North Vietnamese have lost their lives fighting in South Vietnam during these

There is some suspicion that one of the two candidates running did actually win the election, if there could be such a thing as an honest announcement of an honest count, by a margin of 50,000 votes out of the total of 350,000 cast. And it has employed, so far, its control of the official election processes to keep the May 12 voting from having any official result. We don't think democracy is ever, ever has been, or ever will be, perfect. It is probably a mistake to think of it

as if it were going to be perfect any day now. It is a form of government which some people have been able to prove more beneficial and useful, to people of their own standards and ideals and education, than any autocracy of either individual or party. But even with people fortunate enough to understand why they want it and what they should get from it, it takes continual working . We Americans are a little luckier than the Panamanians, but we should take nothing for granted for ourselves,
