When, in the actual result, he lost to McCarthy by a margin of six per cent, the chagrin and distillusionment in the Kennedy camp must have been pretty deep. Whatever chance he had of overtaking Vice President Humphrey in the race probably depended upon his being able to operate a candidacy which kept soaring higher and higher.

This, for the Democrats, is a sad state f affairs, not because their nominee hould be either Kennedy or McCarthy but because any great party deserves a chance to have a nominee for Presiden of calibre and character higher than that of any of these three present Democratic contenders. The party deserves something better, and the country deserves a etter kind of choice, and yet these three men are the men who, by their various routes -Humphrey inside the organization, Kennedy by the maintenance and use of his own political machine, and McCarthy by his maverick willingness to test the strength of a principle - have succeeded in making themselves their party's leading contenders for the highest office in the land. It is amazing how much closer and closer examination of the three of them makes a certain Lyndon Johnson, who seemed only a few months ago to be rated an extreme failure in the office himself, now seem comparatively so much closer to the required stature for the Presidency.

straightaway, is irrational. By any logical standards the French ought to be grateful to their present government which is de Gaulle, and rather conten with their economy, their way of life and their status in the world. It's been a long time since they had it so good . . . So why all of a sudden this outbreak of spring madness? Perhaps after all Le Monde's explanation makes some sense. even if it's irrational. Frenchmen just

Indeed, the more you brood upon it the more you are tempted to see in it a possible explanation for the not too dissimilar phenomena noted all around the world, including our own untidy country. As old Cicero remarked long ago, "Quietem sempiternam possit pati" — having longed quiet unendurable.

Anyway, look at the trouble the Comnists are having. In the Soviet Union as well as the satellite countries people are getting restless, and the youngsters in particular are acting up. Now none as paradise, but it is certainly true that life behind the Iron Curtain is pleasanter than in the days of Stalin, or even Khrushchev. Is it possible people are just getting bored with communism?. . . Consider now the plight of the students at Columbia. Here they are at one of the finest universities in the world. Few of them have any money worries; either they are the sons of the affluent or on scholarships from the affluent society. Few anticipate any money worries here-

after; either they will continue to be supported by somebody or, if the fancy strikes them to work, they can walk out and into good jobs with hardly any ef-Meanwhile all they have to do is follow their appointed rounds of classes, which -let all us oldsters confess it -

can be dreadfully boring. Exciting teachers are rare, and exciting university presdents rarer still. True, the students have the prospect of escaping this humdrum by going off to war; but this is a dreary war that has been going on a boringly long time. It just doesn't have the eclat the wars of their fathers. So what fun to tear up the president's


office. An anonymous Columbia student writing in the Harvard "Crimson" confessed he didn't know what he was doing behind the barricades in Hamilton Hall but that he found it more exciting than rowing crew on the Hudson. Besides, given the state of modern morals, an old-fashioned college panty-raid seems rather pointless.

This is not a theory, of course, to be pushed too far. Yet sociologists have noted that even our race riots seem to be acerbated by the heat of summer; there is nothing more conducive to sheer frustrating boredom than sweltering in an urban slum. Perhaps, then, there is a germ of truth

in Le Monde's French logic. When we have to struggle to earn our bread, to clothe our families, to educate ourselves or our children, or to defend our land, we can justly lament our ill-fortune. But at least adversity, whatever the drawbacks, is not boring. That may be why the public woes of

the Depression years, which you'll retember included also public violence. still had a different cast. Men knew what they were struggling for, as they also did later in the war against Hitler. Nowadays hardly any of the rebels know what they want. The idea, in Paris as at Columbia, seems to be that first we'll have the revolution and then we'll find out what it means. After the riots somebody can think up the "Issues" to go with it. Come to think of it, maybe tedium isn't an irrational reason for a bit of rebellion. It probably had something to do with the turn of events in the Garden of Eden. And certainly the tedium of the

Three marines were killed.
