Bus Line Sale Determined Embser Okayed by PUC To Receive Degree

The sale of all Silver Lane Bus Line Inc. stock by Edward M. Royce to George A. Negro has been approved by the Public Utilities Commission. The PUC made its decision to allow the sale after a public hearing Monday showed no opposition.

The total sale price is \$40,000 with \$10,000 of this to be held in escrow for six months to secure payment of any after-discovered liabilities. All known liabilities are assumed by Negro for the bus line with 12 passenger buses & 24 school buses. One condition of the sale is that the corporation, the service, the fares and the employees will continue without change for the present time.

Negro is sole owner of the George A. Negro Bus Co. Inc. which owns 112 school buses in towns east of Manchester, including Bolton. Member of his family who are now officers in his present bus firm will become the officers of Silver Lane.

The time of official take-over by Negro has not been set.

The Los Angeles Times recently has German-American community leaders got together a "bond" for the purpose of "combating disparagement of their ethnic group" on television and in the movies.

What came out of it was a stinging rebuke for the entertainment industry who the German-Americans say give them short shrift on the telly. They are always portrayed as the villainous mad scientists.

As a result, they are conducting the idea of forming a sort of anti-disparagement league for the Germans.

In answer to your question, "Is it not ein schutzbank?" it is definitely not. It's deadly serious.

"Other communities have their anti-disparagement leagues," Erwin Single, the editor of The New Yorker Staats-Zeitung and Herald, the German-language daily, said. "The Italians even have two. Maybe we ought to have at least one."

It's true, you know, that the Italians have two anti-disparagement leagues. But one is for the rank and file Italians. The other one, apparently, is dedicated only to ferreting out and to squashing rumors that tend to defame Frank Sinatra.

Mr. Single said German-Americans in Canada and recently started writing letter campaigns to protest what they consider to be German slurs on TV and other media.

"Effective fight against anti-German television films and documentaries as well as improvement of German prestige in America" was the major item on the agenda.

However, I'm very much afraid that this is one of those which the Germans will not get off the ground.

You see within our country, the person who toils in television is the true superman, and his particular "United German" is Madison Avenue which is systematically eradicating all the "good German" — with the exception, naturally, of that little old winemaker.

When a good German is good, he's very, very good. But unfortunately, there's no market on TV shows for a good German.

Look at it this way, if we revise our position on the Aryans, what the hell are we going to do with all those World War II films on the late, late show starring Eric Von Stroheim?

And in a Republic Picture's epic, I know full well that Vera Hrusa Ralston is again ready and able to play the beautiful young girl whom a mad scientist stalks as prey for one of his evil experiments. In a basement laboratory, he concocts a brew of vicious chemicals on his Hansen burner that will make Vera turn from a tasty tidbit of a lass into a veritable monster with hair all over her body, or at least on her upper lip. A few minor details like that notwithstanding, I've already finished the scenario.

But if the Germans don't want the part, who can we get to play the mad scientist? Boris Karloff is kind of old hat. Bela Lugosi is not with us any longer and the more the merrier. Of course you can always get a British import — perhaps one of those old Shakespearean actors who would double as a mad scientist. But with all the trouble the empire is having, it behooves us to help a proper British gentleman present a good image. And a mad scientist in decline in our society, I mean, would you like your daughter to marry one?

So, sorry to say, but it's the German actor's lot to play those roles. He's not peculiar. It's merely type casting which I suppose amounts to the same thing. But remember, in these days, it's "TV uber Alles."

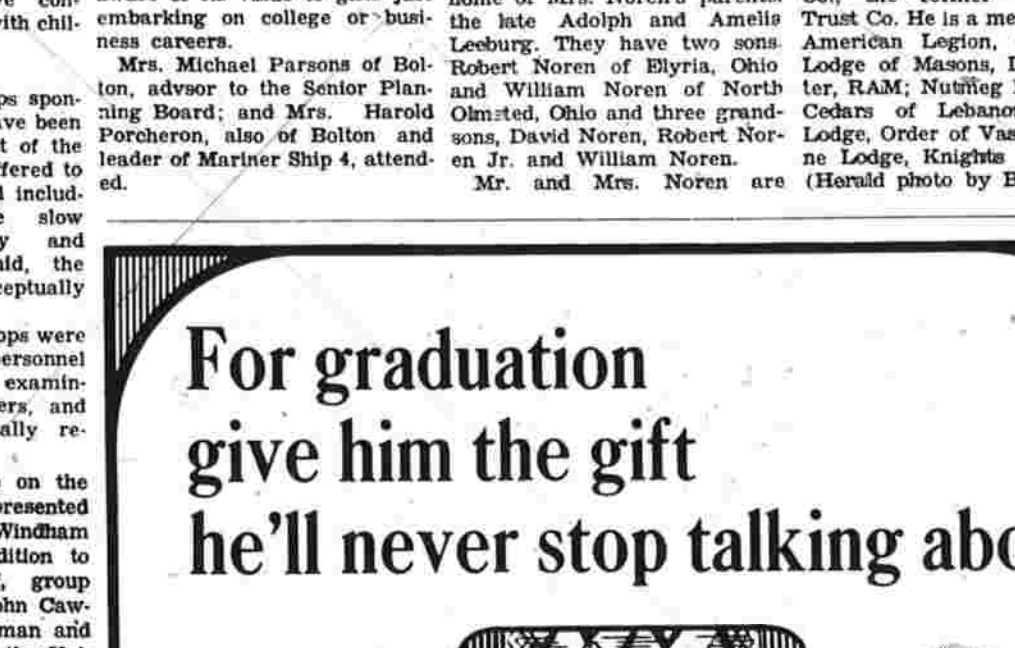

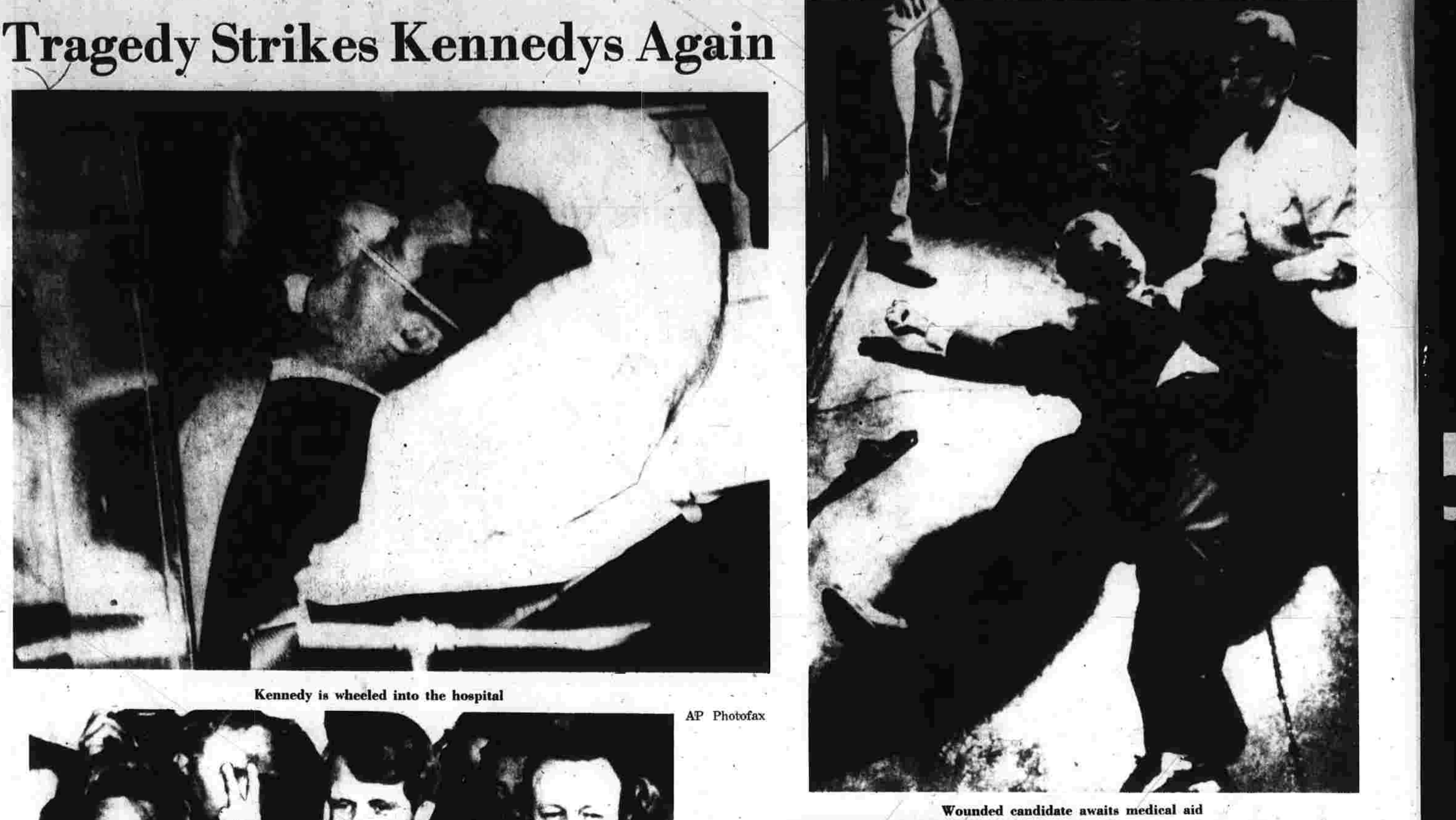

Tollard Planning Panel Okays Sale Of Industry Park Parcel

The sale of the final parcel in the town-owned Industrial Park to an undisclosed firm was approved Monday night by the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The approval was sought by Industrial Development Commission chairman William Sumner to meet a requirement of the state's new town-owned property map to be approved by the PZC.

The firm plans to construct a building of 4,800 square feet across from Kingsbury Corp. Water lines and the construction of a road have already been extended to the area for Kingsbury.

The Industrial Development Commission has arranged for an option on 40 acres of adjacent land, which will triple the existing size of the park from 18 to 58 acres.

The plan is to approve the purchase of the land in exchange to be held during the latter portion of June. It is also expected the town will be asked to approve the sale of the last parcel at the end of the month.

The PZC agreed to inform Aetna Casualty and Surety that work on the road in the Valley View subdivision "is far from complete."

The insurance company had written requesting the amount of work remaining to be done on the road by developers Omnes Development Corp., and if the work had been completed, the date the company's liability terminated.

Several members of the PZC have been critical of the way the road was constructed. They pointed out that the road was not completed and that the final blacktopping would not be done until all the homes are constructed.

The water mains should be tested before the final coating and one of the catch basins must be realigned.

When completed the road will have to be inspected by the town, which will then have to formally approve a road maintenance bond will also have to be posted for a given period to protect the town.

Humans Seen As Misfits By Zoologist

 SAN FRANCISCO — Man is the only species of animal that is a misfit among even his own kind — an "unhinged" species, Oxford University zoologist said Saturday.

Prof. Nils Tinbergen, of the Oxford Animal Behavior Research Group, said man is the only mammal in the animal kingdom that all other animals manage to settle disputes within their species without killing and that even bloodshed is rare within other species.

"A scientific understanding of human behavior that would lead to its control probably is the most urgent problem man faces today," Tinbergen said.

He was a principal speaker at a symposium on behavior sponsored by San Francisco State College, the San Francisco Institute of Animal Behavior and the California Academy of Sciences.

"Tinbergen said human behavior is endangering the survival of the species and even of all life on earth.

"Our technology has achieved an unprecedented mastery of the environment but now is rapidly getting out of hand," he said. Man is depleting natural resources, even the oxygen and nitrogen of the atmosphere, according to the professor, and he is if that is not bad enough, he is waging war on his fellows and killing them on a massive scale.

"Tinbergen said the attitudes that determine human behavior have acquired 'truly lethal tentacles.'"

People have a mental block against self-censoring, he said, and they are not learning anything about their own behavior from that of other animals, he said. "Even though medicine and psychology have learned a lot about humans from animals, most people believe when it is suggested that studies of animal behavior could be helpful in understanding our own," he said.

The first question to be answered is what makes an animal fight, Tinbergen said, since aggression is the most "direct" of our behaviors.

He said he does not include fighting between predators and their prey, since that kind of aggression is so threat to the victimization of earth.

It is "intraspecific" fighting, that is, fighting between members of the same species, the kind that man most freely indulges in, that he said is the danger. Tinbergen said many animals fight others of their own species — for food, for the mating season or when not enough food is available for all.

"But the danger to man here is that he is the only species in which such fighting is actually destructive," Tinbergen said.

Among other animals, intraspecific fighting is to the advantage in the evolution of the species, but in man it threatens the species' existence, according to Tinbergen.

By studying lower animals Tinbergen thinks we can learn whether human aggression can be reduced by lowering the population density or by changing our hormone balance.

Tinbergen said most species of animals have evolved a delicate balance between advance and retreat, that is, between aggression and fear.

"It is an old cultural phenomenon that warriors are both hairwashed and muddled in all-out fighting," Tinbergen said.

"They are brainwashed into believing that running away is deplorable.

"This seems to me to be due to the fact that man, accepting the idea that in certain issues of morality death might be preferable to running away, has falsely applied the moral concept of cowardice to matters of mere practicality such as the division of living space," Tinbergen said.

He said that brainwashing and bullying soldiers (by threats of punishment if they do not run away) is a "cultural excess" that endangers the human species.

Another such cultural excess is the use of long-range weapons.

"Very few animals who are willing or even eager to drop their bombs 'on target' would be willing to strangle, stab or burn children, or for that matter, adults, with their own hands," Tinbergen said.

If face-to-face with the victims of their bombs, these animals would shrink in horror of killing because of the evident distress of the victims and their efforts to placate their attackers. Such a frank display of distress and such ready efforts to placate the enemy are the means by which other species avoid bloodshed and death within their species, Tinbergen said.

Humans, on the other hand, tend to avoid the use of these necessary social tools because of our cultural excesses, he said.

"As a result, we have become 'unhinged killers,' and have created a social environment that, instead of insuring our survival, seems about to do the opposite."

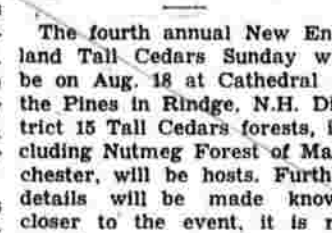
Gets Navy Grant

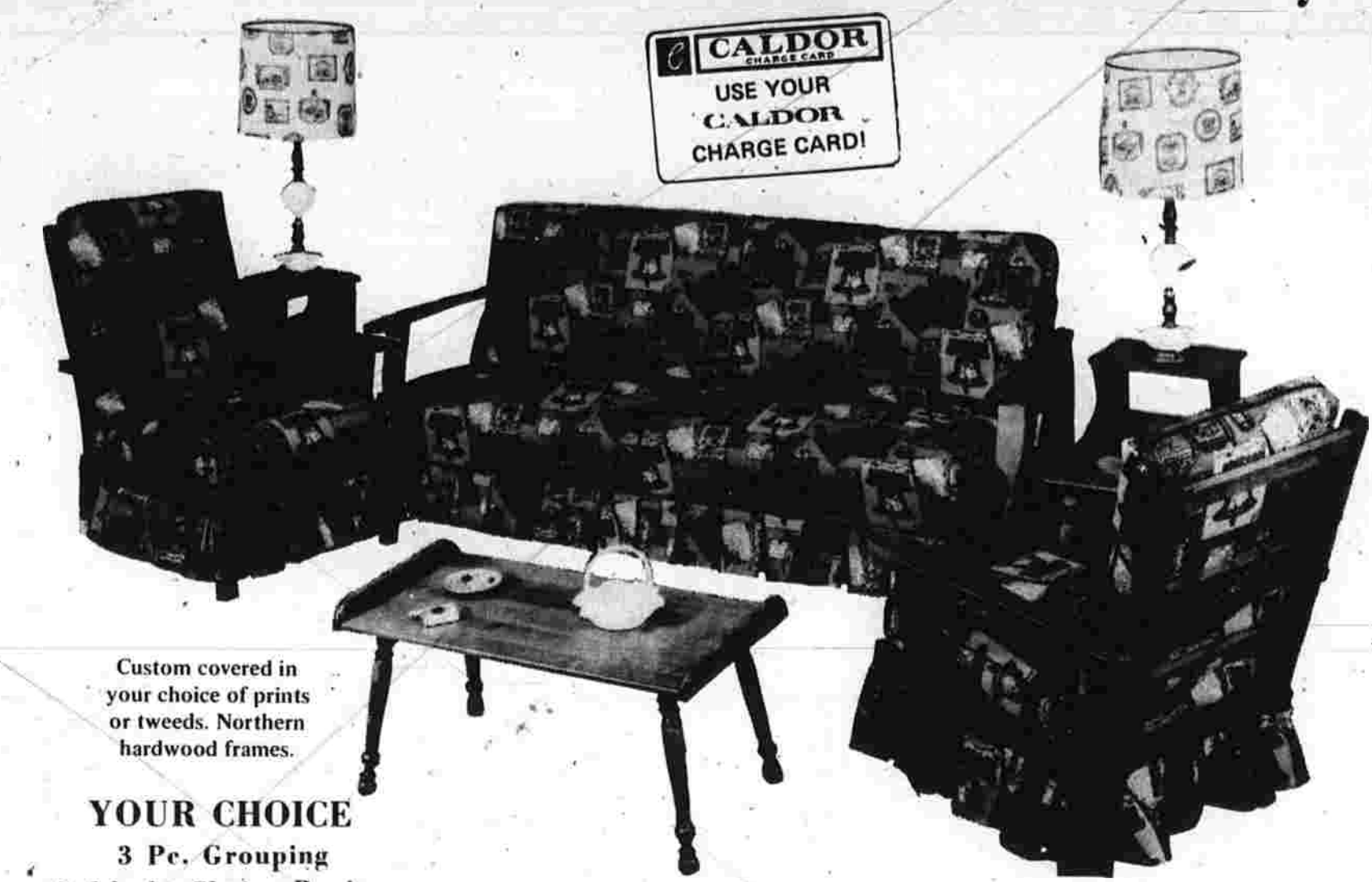
