Not The First High Rise Dump In the midst of Manchester's considers tion of the supposedly novel possibilities

.of our proposed construction for ourselves of a high rise dump there comes news from Britain which sets us back on our lower Mancunian modesties. We will not be the first. British scientists, including botanists

and archeologists, are currently tunneling into the vastnesses of a high rise dump some 3,000 years older than ours could ever be, It is called Silbury Hill, and it covers more than five acres in area to a height of some 130 feet. Instead of carting their rubble and refuse there by truck and lift and trailer the good Britons of the Bronze Age transported it in primitive baskets. But their persistence over a period of time produced a monument of the same general limensions as that which would be created by the present engineering proposal to give a few added years of life as a dump, plus perhaps centuries of immortality as a monument, to the area which, if it got raised high enough, could eventually be called Hockanum Heights. So the British thought of it first, as

they thought of so, many other things it elights us Americans to imitate, sometimes pretending we are originators, and the original designers of the first high rise dump are, if such surveillance is possible for them, chuckling among themselves and poking each other in their ghostly ribs to see the mystification of the present day scientists who are trying to determine what it was they thought they were building, and why. Hockanum Heights, then, can never have quite the truly antiqued patina of a Silbury Hill. But that doesn't mean it can't have, in time, an eminence and a new world distinction of its own, and rank as a truly first class reproduction.
