If We Go Deep Enough We have the word of President Johnson for it that "200,000,000 Americans

didn't kill Robert F. Kennedy, any more than 200,000,000 Americans killed Martin Luther King." Nevertheless, a certain number of these 200,000,000 Americans have a feeling - ranging from a horrible sense of almost personal involvement to a vague uneasiness over something that perhaps might have been done and wasn't -

that they did have something to do with

the three assassinations of our recent For those Americans who cannot es cape their own feeling of some guilt, the words of Senator McCarthy were welcome expression of their own mood/ "It is not enough," said he, "in my judgment to say that this was the act of one deranged man, if that is the case. "The nation, I think, bears too great a burden of guilt, really, for the kind

of neglect which has allowed the disposition to grow here in one's own land, in part a reflection of violence which we have visited upon the rest of the world, or at least one part of the world." The way we look at it, the way we diagnose it - 200,000,000 Americans are or are not guilty - has something to do with any effort to answer the question of what we ought to try to do about our national situation. Naturally enough,

that we are not in a state of any national sickness, will look mainly for cheerful psychotherapy. And those who think there is a sickness in us will want us to start turning all our values, all our fundamental assumptions, upside down and inside out, to see whether they are really valid in our day and in our kind of conditions. This is something Senator McCarthy

has been advocating, quite calmly, in those matter-of-fact-sounding little probes of his into our national smugness. And we suppose it may be something of that same instinct toward a total reexamination of our values, institutions and systems that expresses itself in the more violent revolutionary tendencies of some of our present day students.

Both schools of analysis, both schools of thought, will have some immediate impact on American life and behavior. Those who think there is no general guilt - merely the illegal acts of certain ad people — will press for what they consider a fundamental thing like a tighter control of the sale of guns.

Those who think there is a sickness in our whole society will consider the control of guns by law merely a superficial tactic. Their pressure will be toward a passionate interest in the other arm of President Johnson's post-assassination policy - the creation of a commission to study why we are so violent.

Where we end up depends upon how deep we are willing to go into ourselves, into our own national assumptions, into the real nature of the values we really honor, We will not go very deeply unless we

are willing to follow the unpleasant inferences of Senator McCarthy, inferences which, one feels, do not even penetrate the thinking of President Johnson, except to produce an angry surge of blank opposition and denial. It is not easy for a nation which, like all other nations, regards slaughter in war as a legal and legitimate exercise of its authority, to be told that it has finally come to the day when it cannot teach and require violence with one hand for one purpose while it restrains and controls violence

on the other. We will not get very deeply into the question of whether or not we have a sickness as a nation unless we make some effort to define and recognize as a kind of violence those injustices we ourselves did not originate or create but whose continued existence we do tolerate. There are violences done to the living of human beings that are done by laws, and administration of laws, by customs, by consensus behavior, by inaction, as well as by guns and blows and visible

mal waste of time. pressures or enmittes. But if we do manage to go deeply enough into the analytical, confessional side of our urge to do something about our state, then we are likely to come

clusions which swing all of us away from any easy belief that all we have to do to make America beautiful again is design a new and tighter straitjacket for a small bothersome minority.

The Spoiler
Just when American civilisation ha begun adjusting itself fairly well to the concept of the seven, eight, nine or even 10 year minimum for higher education, along comes a presumed authority on graduate work, Dr. Gustave Arit, head of the Council of Graduate Schools in the U.S., and offers to upset everything. His excuse, apparently, is a specialized

one. It seems he is interested in the problem of producing more college teachers at a swifter rate. And it was in order to handle this particular specialized prob lem that he launched his discussion, at the University of Connecticut Commencement the other day, of the possibility of organizing what he calls a "five year doctoral program" in our universities. His zeal in a particular cause can be understood. That doesn't mean, however,

that it can be approved or condoned. If there can be a five year doctoral program for one purpose, sooner or later somebody else will want to shorten th time required for other degrees for other

If standards are allowed to be actust ed and perhaps lowered for one excuse, it will be increasingly difficult to keep them high elsewhere. It seems especially important that the

whole picture of the whole American life be kept in mind, and that the occasional development of a particular emergency in some particular field -like a temporary shortage of teachers on the college level -be balanced against the welfare and balance of the national life as a We have, by moving very swiftly in

the past few years, now reached a state of educational affairs where we have as many young people in graduaté schools spending an average of seven years on higher education, as we had in all our collegiate undergraduate classes two decades ago.

This gives our young people something to do with themselves, and something to revolt against, during those early formative years when they might otherwise be graduating into the ignominy of becoming wage slaves in competition with all the rest of us. Although there may be some experts who think that some of the time in such schooling may be wasted, especially when such long-term students take the lead in campaigns to shut down the very universities they attend, there seems little doubt that most of them are indeed learning, and learning well, the great lesson offered to the young people

That is that they should never regard the making of a living as much of a We are a bit sorry that Dr. Arlt should

have come along, just as they seem to be doing very well with that part of their lesson, and possibly disturb their sense of destiny and direction by sugtheir schooling in order to crowd themselves into the function pens of their society. We offer them all our reassurance. Let them prolong their stay at the universities. Somebody else will continue to make their living.

Delay Bred By Delay

Pushing the completion of Routes 91 and 291 six months of a year farther into the future, which the Springfield Redevelopment Authority has been told s necessary for design changes, can e defended to a point. But shooting for the perfect highway design is no good if it means the highway will never

It's obvious that some mistakes have been made in the construction of Interstate 91. One example is in the section that goes past downtown Hartford; an other is the interchange at the Springfield side of the South End Bridge. Both these spots are a hazard to motorists not familiar with them because the turnoffs come up suddenly, frequently in neavy, swift-moving traffic, and the driver has to make a split-second decision on which way to go.

From the standpoint of spending public funds, it is undeniably good policy to get serviceability out of an investment as far as possible into the tuture. Apparently the Massachusetts Department of Public Works believes this purpose will be helped by the "better traffic counts and projection farther into the future" it now has. "Higher safety criteria" are also a factor. But there's reason to ask whether the

new delay will in turn produce another delay. By April, 1969, when the new schedule calls for work to begin on the affected parts of Routes 91 and 291, will there be still better traffic counts and still more advanced safety criteria to dictate another delay for redesign? This could go on interminably. Already more than 10 years have passed since both

these projects were conceived.

If added safety is the aim, what about Riverdale St. in West Springfield, a hazardous road for many years and becoming more so as it handles traffic that should have been taken over long ago by Route 91? It seems that Riverdale St. (Route 5) is outdoing any peril that the present design of Routes 91 and

291 might cause. SRA Chairman Edward J. Breck has made a powerful case against delay of the highway work, pointing out that millions of dollars have been invested in this city, downtown and elsewhere, in the well-founded expectation that the roads would be finished at least by 1970. The new delay sets completion back to late 1971. Simple fairness to these investors who acted in good faith, to the citizens of Springfield and to the tourists who travel the Connecticut Valley each year demands the best the DPW can offer in reasonable haste and mini-

There's something between the elusive ideal of perfect highway engineering and the urgent need to accommodate thousands of citizens who have undergone sacrifice and inconvenience for several years already. SPRINGFIELD

A mother returning along Rt. 85 in Bolton from taking her son to a baseball game Tuesday evening rubbed her eyes in disbelief, but it really was a red and green parachute descending into a field further up the road. In all, six men, members of the Connecticut Parachutists Association and of the Flying Colts, a Colts Firearm Co. jumpwhite cross in a field on the The first three jumped at 5:50 p.m., one, alded by a ground wind, hitting the target.

By the time the Cessna had gone back to Brainard Field and picked up its second batch, a sizeable crowd had accumulated and the wind had died down The plane came over the field, circled to gain altitude, then "put-put-put" and something iropped out. The jumpers in the crowd first thought it was a dummy, being dropped to in-dicate wind direction. The main chute didn't open, and the reserve chute was used. The object drifted into a plowed field, far from the target, tumbled, and got on its feet, looking very annoved. "It's lucky he had the reserve chute," someone said. All jump-ers are required to carry them.

Crowd Counts for Diver The plane circled again, rising to 3,500 feet, it was reported later and two more bodies fell out. The crowd counted "onetwo - three - four," up to ten, as the bodies descended in free falls. Then the chutes opened and the crowd began to shout "no wind!" The two parachutists began to drift in the same direction as their unfortunate One man, with only a few holes in his "sport" parachute landed quickly in the pasture.
