In many quarters abroad, where there is probably some resentment of the way we Americans are supposed to esteem ourselves, our string of public assassinations has led to some unkind verbal judgments upon us. We are "barbarians." There is a "plot"

operating in our public life, which conspires to eliminate, by bullet, the best potential leaders we develop. This is not abnormal thinking from

It is, for that matter, precisely the kind of thing we would be saying, were we judging any such series of public assassinations in any other country. there were, in some such string of public assassinations, as much coincidence as there has been in the death of two American brothers and of the Negro leader they both befriended and championed, we would not be able to restrain our own verdict of something very rotten, by design, in whatever Denmark it might happen to be.

Furthermore, the rest of the world, having a somewhat eager eye open for all our imperfections anyway - the fact that we are the world's most powerful and richest 'nation would in itself be enough to guarantee that kind of eye on us - is better able than we to relate all our weaknesses together. To that jealous, critical world, it is

quite natural that a nation which follows the policy we do in Vietnam should assassinate opponents of that policy at home. All our weaknesses, sins, and imperfections make one congruous piece, for our "friends" abroad. We cannot escape such judgments. It

will not do us much good to resent them. We can be grateful for those occasional from some real friends. One reason we cannot escape

harsh and garish judgments from abroad is that we ourselves are not really free of some of them. Not many of us Ameri cans believe in such a thing as a "plot" at work among us, but we cannot escape the feeling that some kind of fate hangs over us. Not many of us are willing to concede that we find ourselves parbarians, but all of us are uneasy as we wonder just what quality in our living does tolerate such violences among





Giving The Dinosaur His Due

Modern man is being invited to revise his traditional disdain for the dinosaur. Not only do the latest authorities on the breed argue that it was a more graceful and speedler animal than hitherto assumed; they insist that we give the dinosaur his due. He succeeded in ruling this earth for something like a hundred million years, which is a lot longer than man himself has been working at the problem. The dinosaur, in other words, still holds the record. For the duration of his unprecedented

Not even any modern war-making nation has surpassed the dinosaur in its concentration on armament alone as a formula for survival and power. And, although there is every indication that the dinosaur's strength eventually became, thanks to climactic conditions or pollutions beyond his control, the key to his downfall, the record for successful rule does stand. Man will have clear title to look down on the dinosaur when he can point to the record and prove that he himself has done better in keeping himself on top of affairs on his earth than the
