Rockefeller, Chance For A Choice The reported unhappy certainty of the situation in the Democratic party nationally -that the murder of Senator Robert Kennedy has confirmed the sure grip Vice President Hubert Humphrey was already gaining on his party's nomination at Chicago —seems to shift both the opportunity and the responsibility for presenting the voters of this nation with a choice to the Republican party.

An America which has to go to the polls choosing between Vice President Humphrey and former Vice President Richard Nixon will find itself confronted with two run of the mill possibilities. In such case, they would probably incline toward Nixon, as somebody perhaps more bearable personally, somebody who would at least produce a change in the Washington atmosphere.

So it may be that the Republican par ty, in order to win, does not desperately need to search beyond Nixon -not as much as the Democratic party, to be sure of winning, would have to search beyond Humphrey.

The difference between the parties is that the Republican situation may be still a little more open, and that the Republicans also do have an alternative. That alternative is Governor Nelson Rockefeller, and his initial campaign television appearance last night was such as to establish immediately an appeal different, fresher, and stronger than that either side.

If there could be some public response to this alternative which would sweep aside the expected routines of pre-convention politics, upsetting calculations in a good way as other dramatic events of this year have upset our politics in a tragic way, then the Republican party could, by emancipating itself, offer a choice which would be not only for Republicans, and for independents, but for many Democrats as well.

This nation deserves something better, in 1968, than to be forced to go into the voting machines and choose the better of two humdrum candidates.

There ought to be a way for the judgment of the people themselves to reach into the political processes, and procure the nomination of a candidate who would

That last surviving chance of a choice seems to be the New York Governor. The party which has the chance of presenting that choice is the Republican party. For itself, for the nation, it should not foreclose its own opportunity to perform that service.

The Suspended Debate

Washington wags of the moment re portedly going eround asking what has become of Secretary of State Dean Rusk. They might, with equal appropriateness, be asking what has become of Senator Fulbright, or Senator Morse. The answer for both questions would he that the existence of formal negotiations between the United States and North Vietnam, in Paris, has placed a national curb on the erstwhile debate

When President Johnson, on March 31 announced his twin decision — to pull back our bombing, to retire from candiacy -Secretary Rusk was on the other side of the world, possibly not even in consultation with the White House, It was difficult to believe then, and it is difficult to believe now that Secretary Rusk agrees with the policy which finds our high diplomatic representatives at Paris. The guess would be that he considers the negotiations a mistake, doomed to end in failure, or in the kind of success which ought to be considered a failure. And the further guess is that although he is a well disciplined public servant and member of an administration, he will manage some pretty effective well bred I-told-you-so's if he gets

In any case, that is what has become of Secretary Rusk. His normal side of the Vietnam debate has been muted

while his boss tries negotiation The Vietnam debate has also, of course, been turned out of normal bounds for people like Senators Fulbright and Morse, who used to carry the lead of the argument against the administration

policy. The administration, for the mo ment, is at least putting on some kind of show of following a policy they themselves would recommend. They have to wait to see how the policy is going, or they have to have some definite sign the administration is trying to deceive the public, before they can get back on the rostrum about Vietnam. Reports from Vietnam itself, how

ever, are beginning to be of a nature which suggests that Secretary Rusk may find his silence more comfortable than that of his opponents. By all military reports, we have been escalating the war since the truce talks began, with a vigor and intensity which Secretary Rusk, with his views and convictions, must find very satisfactory, but which long-term critics of the war must be beginning to find disturbing, as if the "cover" of peace talks in progress at Paris were being used to turn the war itself into some thing bigger and hotter than ever.

The "Stop and Frisk" Ruling The Supreme Court, in its new han-

dling of the question of the legal right of police to "stop and frisk," laid down general rule of reasonableness under which policemen would be permitted to search suspects when "a reasonably prudent man in the circumstances would be warranted in the belief that his safety or that of others was in danger." This is a ruling which has been wel-

comed by the police, and by all who believe in strengthening their hand, because it relieves them of what was sometimes ruled their previous responsibility of needing probable cause sufficient for the issuance of a warrant before they could resort to the stop and frisk opera-

At the same time, however, the new ruling is not a blanket permission, as its own language indicates, and as the nature of the cases the Supreme Court had before it would indicate. In one case, in Cleveland, police

stopped and frisked a character they observed as he seemed to be "casing" a store for a holdup, and found him to be carrying a loaded pistol. He was convicted for carrying a concealed weapon, and the case went up to the Supreme Court, which upheld the conviction. In a New York case, an off-duty po iceman had searched a character he ob-

served tiptoeing down an apartment house corridor and the character was subsequently found guilty of possessing burglar tools. Neither of these cases, nor the lan guage of the rule of reasonableness now

laid down by the court, would seem to extend to the kind of police operation which has, on some occasions, disturbed ordinary citizens and civil rights defenders. This is the fishing expedition kind of activity in which police set up roadblocks for such purposes as trying to nab teenagers who might possibly be traveling with a can of beer somewhere in their car, In such cases, it would seem to the layman, the police do not really ever have a "reasonably prudent" belief that their own safety or that of anybody else

Some day, that kind of police activity, too, may get to the higher court, and it might be, then, that the Justices would choose to build the meaning of the Fourth Amendment up again.

The present ruling, however, is a welcome strengthening of the police hand everywhere to do exactly what common sense would say it should be able to do, and should do -act on any reasonable specific suspicion.

Inspection Stands

The 14-to-5 vote of Meriden's Court of Common Council in favor of the new housing code ordinance is a fair measure of its value. The 11 Republicans in the Council, all of whom voted for it, were joined by Albert Hyman, L. Stewart Bonen, and John Casper, Democrats whose records for diligence, independent judgment and leadership entitle them to top

rank among the opposition. By adopting the ordinance the aldermen put the city back on the track as far as federal funds are concerned. There is no doubt that Meriden badly needs such funds for projects planned and in the works, and is entitled to them. More important, the new systematic enforcement of the housing code will work to prevent deterioration and the development of slums which call for massive redevelopment projects. As Alder man Bohan observed, the inspection program is "a necessary condition the Fed ral government must apply when offering grants in aid. Otherwise, the money spent to rehabilitate a city might just as well be poured down a rat-hole."

There will be no forced entry of homes for inspection purposes under the new law. In cases where entry is refused, a search warrant must be obtained in ac cordance with the recent Supreme Court decision. Nor will repair or improvemen orders be imposed arbitrarily. A Code Enforcement Appeals Board will be provided, as well as the citizen's inalien able final right of appeal to the courts

Aldermen who objected to the ordinance advanced some valid points. The Building Department, which now has sole needs more and better-trained inspec tors. Mayor Dorsey should be held to his promise to strengthen the department by the addition of key personnel and addi-

Study and updating of both the Building and the Housing Codes are also cleary in order. Adoption of the new ordinance is one reason why the restudy is needed. But it should be made also in response to the tragedy of the Heritage House fire, and with reference to the complaints of local builders on code en-

But if they are to complete their responsibility to Meriden citizens and property owners they must stay with the job until they have provided the city with building and housing codes that are as fair and modern as study can make them, and with enforcement resources to match. She did not resign as a delegate and neglected to obtain a proxy. The alternates to the convention yielded to Town Committee Chairman Charles Thiffault who will attend as an officially uncommitted delegate. THE NEWS MEDIA: A JOURNALIST LOOKS AT HIS PROFESSION.

John Hohenberg, Holt, Rinehart and Winston. \$6.95. The nonprofessional reader, if he wants to pick and choose, can find backing for almost any common preconception about the news media.

Using the full span of a lifetime for his major characters, he begins the tale well before the Civil War and ends it long

The setting is a little camp on the edge of the territory of Texas, used as a way station by bands of Indians who raid the white settlements for cattle, horses and white captives. In charge of the camp is Chaf-

in, a white man who had been captured by a band of Comanches led by Sun Eagle. Chafin's life had been spared on condition that he work for the Indian chief, and Chafin has become a renegade white, living only for the sake of his son Frederick. He also raises an abandoned white girl, Cesre, and eventually Frederick and Cesre are married, but tragedy strikes

once again. The historical gist of the story is that the advance of settlers soldiers and rangers gradually dooms the Indians to a retreat into the reservations.

This is no bang-bang stereotyped Western. Instead it is a rugged tale of hard life on the frontier, depicted with historical perspective and dramatic flair. Miles A. Smith

STRAIGHT UP: The Life and Death of John Harlin. By James Ramsey Ullman. Doubleday, \$5.95. John Harlin died in 1966 when a rope broke 4,000 feet up the notorious north face of the Eiger in Switzerland's Bernese Oberland. Had he lived beyond his 30 years, he would have written his own story. It most certainly would have been different from the usual climber's autobiography. He would have philosophical and sometimes almost mystical-about the experience of climbing and his
