McCarthy Doesn't Fool McCarthy Senator Eugene McCarthy, as 1968's heriting expounder of the flet's talk sense to the American people" creed Adlai Stevenson enunciated back in 1952, has been showing the emotional strains of such an effort more visibly than Stevenson did in the candidate phases of his career.

He is perhaps a more sensitive character. And we would say that he set the standards he hoped to be able to hold to, even while he was campaigning for the presidency, higher than Stevenson did. He began, for instance, with less patience and tolerance for the practical strumentalities of the political opera-

At the same time, a more sensitive person, with standards set a little higher, he has found himself operating in a world rougher than that which Steven-

son faced back in 1952. So he thought that if a man stood for certain things, and said so quietly, the voters would come toward him. But his pest recent run, in Oregon, happened to coincide with the best campaign organzation he had found working for him anywhere. So he hoped to campaign like a gentle-

man, and yet, when all the chips seemed finally down in California, and he had an obvious chance to overtake his chief opponent, he or his campaigners reached. for tougher tactics. Then the campaign was heated up more than anyone intended by an assassin's bullet.

So he hoped to campaign without resorting to the politically obvious. Then, in his television debate with Senator Kennedy, he could be noticed reaching eagerly for one specialized appeal to one voting bloc after another.

The observer, taking Senator McCarthy's campaigning as a whole, could still rate him very highly for trying to avoid the worst routines of the candidate game, could still praise his courage in taking the stands he has taken and then standing by them, could still respect him for the way he has reached for such high standards, and for his own effort to respect the intelligence of the Ameri-

can electorate. But not even a whole chorus of admiring observers could fool Senator McCarthy himself. He, apparently, keeps his own book on McCarthy, and knows just where and when the candidate has been tempted into the moves and words and strategies he would rather not ever employ. This would seem to be why he has been observed in moments when he has seemed to be sick of himself as well as the political process, moments when he

makes an exaggerated return to acting as if he really couldn't lift a little finger actually to summon delegates. What kind of a continuing campaign he is now going to make, after the dramatic and tragic emotional interruption it has had, and how he is going to arrive at the scenes of final decision and how he will comport himself there, are developments for the future, and they will come from the functioning of his sensitiveness and his conscience and

cfrcumstances themselves change. Aiready, whatever the end, he can be given credit for a tremendous influence on events -for peace talks at Paris, for the retirement of a President, for the pattern Presidential politics has taken

his varying moods of ambition as the

After giving him that much credit, in advance of whatever the final score will be, there is a temptation to express a fanciful wish concerning him. Eugene McCarthy, we think, deserved to be born as an inheritor of power, so that he could become a philosopher king, or a Marcus Aurelius. Marcus, we suspect, wouldn't have made out too well, or too happily, in a democracy either.

The Freer Life? There is new evidence concerning the ossibility that, at some still unspecified time in the near future, Russia's evolution toward private enterprise and America's evolution toward socialized oureaucracy may criss-cross each other, with the result that life in Russia is

freer than it is here. The statistic came from Russia the other day that it is now the situation that only half a doctor's time is spent in the tedious business of making out papers and filling out forms.

Let America's over-papered doctors comtemplate such a statistic for a moment. Only half their time! What would life be like, for an American doctor, if se could suddenly find himself magically transported back to the days when he could still spend as much as half his time healing and comforting the sick! If Russia has now succeeded in cutting paper work for its doctors down so that it now takes only half their working day, one wonders whether it may not also have achieved similarly pleasant results for its farmers. The last real glimpse we had of the typical American farmer in operation, he was a fellow who found himself forced to spend more time at the kitchen table, trying to keep

his records up to date, than he was able to spend out in his fields, trying to make

While one is engaged in such pleasant speculation about the possibility that there is a land somewhere where the amount of paper work being required for what were once the routine functionings of life is being cut down rather than in creased, one inevitably gets to the business of governmental forms. How many forms and how many trips are required in Russia, for instance, to accomplish the sale and registration of a motor vehicle? And when and if you register a motor vehicle in Russia, does the state sell your name to any dingy capitalist enterprise that comes along willing to pay for an opportunity to exploit your gullibility? These ought to be a committee to keep tabs on how the race toward and away from freedom is going, in Russia and the United States.

In Sorrow And Shame I am sorrier that Robert Kennedy i dead than I am about the harsh things said about him before he died, but that smaller sorrow is a very large one

Reconciliation with his death is in a minor way easier but in a major way much harder than with the death of his brother. It is easier because President Kennedy must have been so hap py when he died and Sen. Kennedy must have been so unhappy, not so much as he was five years ago, but in a way quite obviously acute enough.

be happy and greatly able to be unhappy. It was impossible not to feel that the ast 10 months, first of withdrawal and then of sudden eruption, had been generally unhappy for him. He was so vul nerable in so many ways and most of all to the hurt of being disliked by persons to whom he had never done or con templated harm. When he died he had just won the California primary by not quite enough votes to relieve him of that

And then, great as his charm was, he was the Kennedy least suited to life on apaign. He was designed to be the ager rather than the candidate. He did not have that courteous, detached contempt for his rivals that his older brother had; and the nature which cheerfully endured making enemies in his brother's cause suffered when he made them in his own. Even his ambition did not have that pure and selfish quality which can make the life enjoyable for successful politicians; it was an ambition less for imself than for the restoration of a time that could not be restored. It is an awful and exhausting thing to have been forced by circumstance to identify history with yourself. There is, then, the small comfort of knowing that he can

rest at last. But there remains the larger pain that the life was so incomplete. President Kennedy died, after all, at his summit; Sen, Kennedy died on a long climb toward a height which was, by every sign, beyond him this year. He had probably come to know this; the stridency of his beginnings had passed after Oregon. His enemies said that his new bearing was a calculation to soften his image as a hard man. But those gentle manners are what those who saw him fairly often remember best; they were what was normal in him; the stridency had been

His great wound was the best of excuses for an act which still seems to me unlikeable while his person never really was. We, as much as any people, know now what a horror is described when anyone says that politics begins at the barrel of a gun. We have endured five years of the politics of resentment. It Vice President Humphrey had beater Sen. Kennedy at the end, his wound would, I think, have been closed and our painful history since his brother's death would have been healed instead of lying raw and open as it is now.

And then Sen. Kennedy's natural sympathies could have flowed as they were neant to; he could have become what he may have been better suited to be than any politician alive, the tribune of the losers in our society, the representative of the unrepresented. Now he deprived of that high vocation and we of that great service. It is impossible, without the promise of that presence, to imagine what will become of us.

And now one more private thought 1 cannot conceive a time when I can again write about our politics as the casual omedy it has most often seemed to me. politicians are just too vulnerable to be thought of in the old callous way; we must continually see them in life as we would in the shock of death when we would be conscious only of the good in them. We shall have always to remember that Vice President Humphrey's heart is as kindly as it sometimes seems feeble, that Mr. Nixon's persistence is as heroic as it is so often depressing The language of dismissal becomes hor rible once you recognize the shadow o death over every public man. For I had forgotten, from being bitter about a tem porary course of his, how much I liked Sen. Kennedy and how much he needed know he was liked. Now that there is in life no road at whose turning we could meet again, the memory of having forgotten will always make me sad indefinitely make me ashamed


