### The Hippie Alert

The hippies who gathered out in the mountains of Colorado, on the assumption that the asteroids might hit this old planet earth, and that, if it did, this particular region might be one region spared catastrophic damage from the collision, were not totally wrong.

Asteroids sometimes do hit the earth, or the moon. Concomitantly, some of the great natural disasters part of almost every folklore were actual happenings as the result of such collisions in the past.

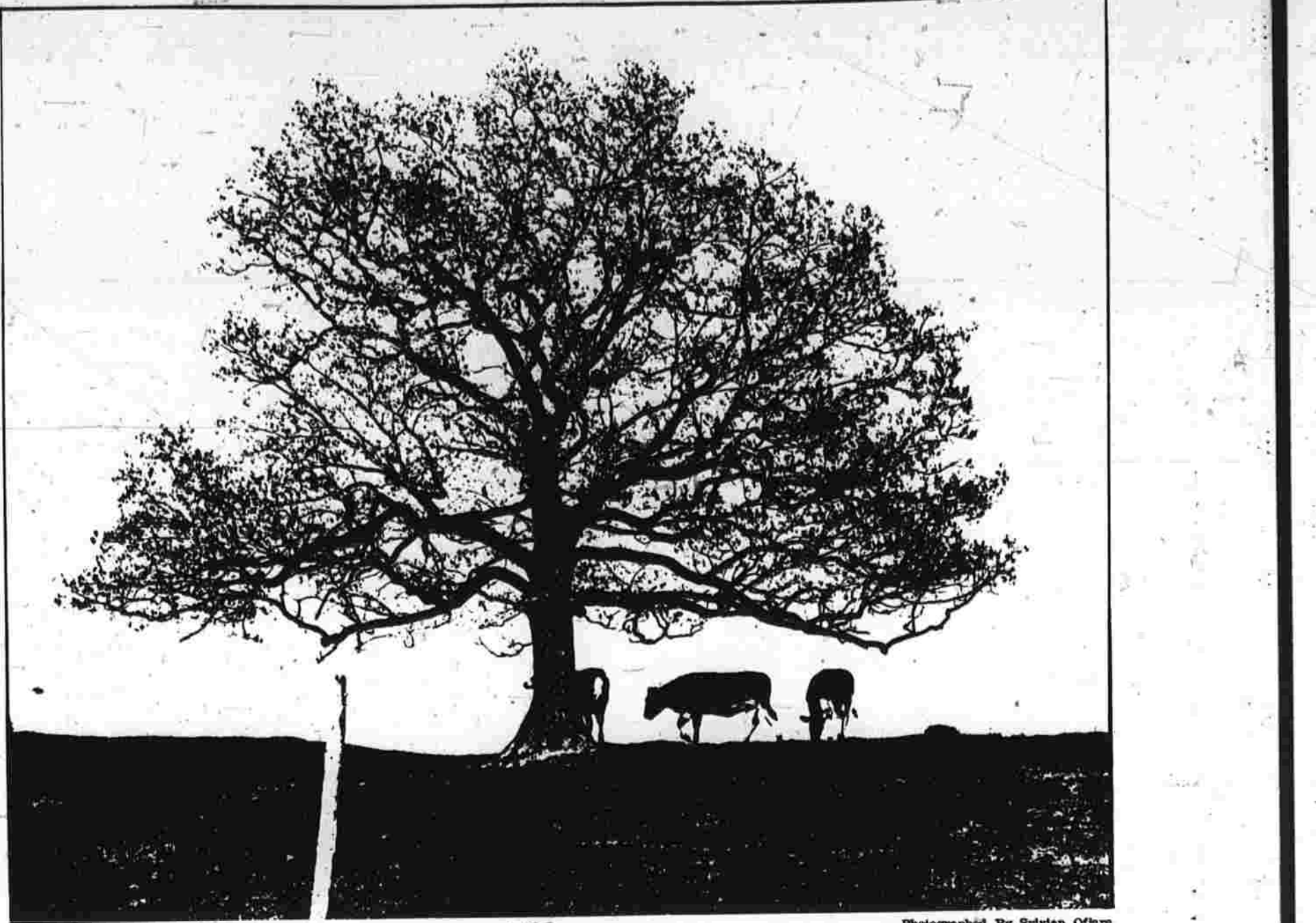
Furthermore, the mountains of Colorado, famous for their beautiful gorges between their peaks and ridges, might well be the perfect place to hide, if one were expecting some natural collision.

In short, the hippies were not totally crazy in this respect, any more than they have been totally crazy in some other aspects of their beliefs and conduct.

• To the contrary, we are inclined to salute them for their alertness and their awareness and their willingness to do something about it.

There are a number of possibilities which could mean the end of this poor world. The hippies out in Colorado at least had the capacity to single out one of these possibilities and try to sound an alert and lead an escape.

They also had the good taste to select a particular end of the world possibility which had a certain attractiveness about it. How much more pleasant it is to contemplate leaving one's world as an end because of the inevitable wandering of some asteroid, irrevocably decreed from the moment of the creation itself, than to have to try to blame it on some alien, or some human political creed, or some scientist, or even, if we wanted to be really honest about it, ourselves and our own individual little sectors of life as usual.

The Swedish Foreign Minister has spoken of "a defeat not only for American democracy but for democratic values as such." The Prime Minister of New Zealand has said: "The United States is to lose its gifted men in this way is a sad distortion of the freedom which they in turn have fought to preserve." In Cairo the Government's official spokesman has condemned the killing of Senator Kennedy "whatever the nationality of the assassin may be." 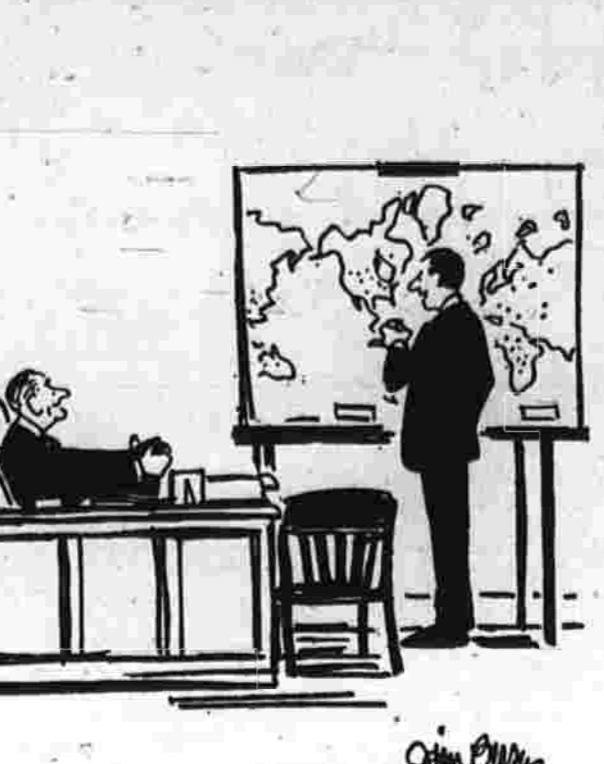
