There is a Better Way



NATHAN AGOSTINELLI GOP Candidate For State Senator

Why I have chosen to run for State Senator. I believe that there is a better way to solve the problems which have caused a rapid deterioration in our State's security and economy.

I believe that community rights are vital and that regional cooperation is preferable to state controls.

I believe that the State must legislate laws that will provide educators and law enforcement agencies with the power to punish rowdies and hoodlums.

I believe that the Senate has failed to work for all people, especially the elderly.

I believe that my experience at the State level while representing the people of Manchester has helped me to understand the better way to work for the people and help solve the issues.

I believe that this shall be a campaign of issues, not of party affiliation or personalities, because these issues affect our homes and families and future. The issues are, in my opinion:

► WASTE. Our state, one of the richest in the nation, is over \$100,-000,000.00 in debt, thus far this year and still growing. This huge debt could drag down our State's economy. Although most of the State spending is done for city people, the debt must be paid by towns as well. The welfare chiselers must be weeded out and sent to work, so that the true needy will have enough.

VIOLENCE AND CRIME the Senate must enact legislation which will severely punish those who commit assaults against other people or property. A negro teacher told me that he places the blame for the soaring crime rate on the State Legislature and the Judiciary. The former must pass legislation which will provide teachers and policemen with legal backing when an offender is caught. The state must also have faith in teachers and police if discipline is to be maintained. Teachers have told me they have little authority. This can be remedied. This teacher also felt that judges should be more stringent in sentencing convicted criminals. For the last few years many convicted criminals returned to their neighborhoods as heroes instead of as repentant members of society. This sets a poor example for other youths. These lawbreakers constitute only a small minority, yet they harm the other city people as much as the innocent person who is attacked. Yet, our State Senate has done nothing, and the crime rate continues to grow.

LEGISLATIVE FAILURE TO REPRESENT THE PEOPLE. With all of the record-breaking tax receipts of the past few years, our Legislature has done virtually nothing for the elderly. The elderly person or couple that owns their own home is in a financial squeeze. They are entitled to their fair share of the State's prosperity. A State subsidy for retired home owners would aid these elder citizens. Connecticut is so progressive in its welfare program, it could also be progressive in its elderly program. For the elderly who do not own homes, the State could do more in the construction of low rental housing units. Another area where the Legislature has failed to act —only react—is the sale of guns to questionable purchasers. In the city of Hartford, in the past three years, over 43,000 pistol permits have been issued. And yet, no action will be taken by the Legislature until 1969, with hearings scheduled for next month. Why this long time gap? (Herald, 6/10/68, page 1). STATE CONTROLS OVER TOWNS. "Let the chips fall where they may." This was the rude statement of a member of a State Committee who advocates a State takeover of town school systems. (Conn. Life, June/1968, page 3). I believe that a takeover of local school systems by a centralized State agency is a radical step backward with unknown consequences. Force is not the answer. Force has never solved anything. Regional cooperation is the better way to approach problems. Regional cooperation and State controls are very different. In another article (Time, 6/7/68, page 89) there was a plan discussed that the long held right of towns to zone propperty should be taken away. I would resist such a move with all of my energy, for once again the results could be quite radical and upsetting. The towns must be better represented at the State level. A portion of the gasoline tax which is collected from the towns by the State, could be left with the respective towns for needed road repairs. Another area to be studied is a State subsidy for water and sewer construction. State income can achieve much, it only depends on how the money is spent and who receives it.

Our task is a hard one. We cannot allow our security and economy to become endangered by the above issues. The results could be that the homeowner and executive will have a clouded future. The present government has been in power for two years. The problems have only increased. A modern government must be elected that will lead, not force; act, not react; represent people and towns, not just certain groups and cities; speak out honestly. The Mayor's Walks

The police authorities in New York City who have been pressing greater security arrangements for the public conduct of Mayor John Lindsay have, of course, the very powerful argument that they would be the ones who would be held responsible if something of a dreaded nature should happen to the Mayor.

It is obviously because they possess such a powerful bargaining argument that the police have been able to exact from Mayor Lindsay and his staff certain concessions to the idea of security. Henceforth, the famed "walks" the Mayor takes will be a little less spontaneous. He will be accompanied by two instead of just one plain clothes bodyguard. And the buildings along his walking route will be searched in advance of

The New York police, if they had their way, would have a good many more restrictions in effect, including, probably, no more walks at all through troubled streets. But Mayor Lindsay and his staff aren't going to yield the police all the police want. The Mayor's "walks" are one of his famous trademarks; they prove he is not afraid; they take him into the trust of the people of his city; they have demonstrably helped his city avoid violence that might otherwise have

The situation poses horrible choice to anybody thinking about it.

If something were to happen to Mayor Lindsay because police protection wasn't as heavy as the police would like to have it, or because the Mayor refused to let nimself be bound by too much security. we would all accompany our grief with regret that other obvious lessons about the security of public figures had been ignored. We want no such moment to

Yet it is also almost intolerable to conceive of admitting to ourselves pernanently that we are such a nation and such a people as to make it necessary for any public figure to live behind perpetual armor. We have to be a country in which someone of the instincts and courage of Mayor Lindsay has the freedom to take his own risks if we are to be much of a country at all. We are not going to be able to act and feel like a free country of free men unless somebody takes the risks of trusting free-

There is a terrible balance between our instinctive desire to have a Mayor dare walk free in his own streets and our dread of the potential consequences

Yet we do know that the only permanent cure for this dilemma has to be on the positive affirmative side, of trust and acceptance of risk, rather than on the side of fear and attempted total guarantee of security.

Band of Corporate Angels?

American big business has not very often been complimented on its sense of social responsibility, on its statesmanlike sociological vision. As a matter of fact. American business has not always been very smart in the elemental business of looking out for its own future.

But what looks like a very bright page is now being written, and what it says on this page is that American big business has somehow managed to be so very smart it has recognized that its own most selfishly defined kind of welfare has reached a point where it depends upon the vitality, energy, imagination and generosity big business can put into the task of helping make this a better country for all its people.

The very interesting question to be asked, as one sees one big corporate firm after another going into our ghettoes with programs of one kind or anther, is how it has happened that big business has been so unusually quick to ecognize situations and truths individual mericans have had some trouble ac-

Big business, for instance, seems to have a very real awareness and convic-

tion that if the problem symbolized by the ghetto is not solved by positive meas ures, then there can be no America. I there can be no America, then there will be no big business. In other words, big business somehow manages to see that we have to solve our racial problem not as a matter of option, not as a matter of virtue, but as a matter of survival. And when big business makes up its mind that it and this country must, as a matter of survival, really try to do something about solving the racial problem, it really moves, with imagination

It is too early to tell whether all its varied programs, in different states and different cities, are going to prove wise and fruitful. But big business gets a big A for awareness and for action. And tha is more than be said for the way individual Americans seem to divide themselves on the issue and on its seriousness and on their own responsibility, with half of us seeming to think the way to preserve America is to build higher walls around ourselves in our own compounds.

Scenic Route?
