Khesanh As Symbol Perhaps Khesanh is to become, after all, as much a symbol of this phase of the war of Vietnam as Dienblenphu was in the previous, or French, phase of the

Dienbienphu had, of course, a military significance Khesanh will never have. It was the scene of a conclusive French defeat, climaxing with a surrender. The military outcome of the battle of Khesanh has never been clearly defined or explained. No one can say with certainty, for instance, whether the apparent lifting of the enemy siege of our outpost, after weeks of preparation for a final action, was the result of voluntary enemy strategy of withdrawal or the result of the application of our superior fire power and the formidable nature of our defense.

And our own military theorists are still divided as to what the enemy really intended at Khesanh in the first place. There was a moment -one of those moments which make unhappy footnotes in the careers of generals —when General estmoreland dismissed the enemy's now famed Tet offensive as a mere diversion intended to make us drop our guard at Khesanh. It may seem more logical, to later analysts, to classify Khesuch as the feint which was intended to draw so much of our interest and attention that the Tet offensive, the enemy's

Militarily, in any case, Khesanh was not Dienblemphu. What it has been, however, is a miniature symbol of the whole American in-

volvement in Vietnam. We once moved forward to the occupation and fortification of Khesanh, considering that move an integral part of our strategy to deal with our enemy in

When the enemy, in turn, moved around our position in the challenging attitude of siege, we proclaimed the life and death importance of holding Khesanh, at all costs.

And now we get out of Khesanh, as if our original move there had not been anything essential at all, and as if our assignment of life and death importance to the holding of it had been merely a passing dream.

Now we proclaim that we don't have to be in Khesanh, we don't have to hold Khesanh, it really isn't important at all, we don't have to stay there. And, although some amateur general

try to raise some kind of howl about America going soft or taking defeat, there is no real substantial quarrel with the fact that our policy has now downgraded Khesanh to the status of just another sector of Vietnam to be bulldozed flat and then abandoned. Khesanh could be, in miniature, our

whole experience with our involvement in Vietnam, We have gone in, under proclamation of total policy necessity, to an inconclusive military outcome. Digesting that uncertain and inconclusive military outcome, we are no longer as certain as we once were that Vietnam ever had to be the particular place we had to try to hold with American guns and American troops. And we are wondering, as we see how we can give up thesanh, once described as so vital and important a key to our whole position Vietnam, without having anything terribly catastrophic happen to anybody. whether we may not eventually discover that there can be a way for getting out of Vietnam itself without having that be-

come a catastrophe. Our experience with Khesanh - and possibly our experience with the whole Vietnam issue then -may illuminate the overwhelming importance of what goes on in the minds of men. What we thought about Khesanh changed a great deal more than Khesanh, or the factual milltary situation around Khesanh ever did. One month it was a must to us; four months later it is nothing. It almost seems as if we select our enemies and make our wars the way we accept this or that domestic fad, or this or that trend in television entertainment, or veer from one status symbol must like the boat in the yard to another like the

swimming pool in the yard. There is, of course, one difference Fighting the wars we happen to think we have to fight, holding the fortresses

Finally, The Safety Sandbank

A tittle patience does more than anything else to bring temporarily annoying or confusing developments out into a pattern which makes some sense and order, and the latest news about sand and highways indicates that patience may be the formula there too. What is now being investigated is the

possible use of roadsides bordered by a safety belt of loose sand, just loose enough and deep enough to smother down the speed and soften the impact of any errant motor vehicle which goes out of control off a paved road. Instead of continuing on out of control into some roadside rockface, or some landmark tree, or even some hard bank of earth the rocketing vehicle will be grabbed down and soothed and brought to a soft step by the action of the sand around its spinning wheels. This possibility is something still it

the experimental stage, and no one car say for sure, as yet, whether it will ever become standard practice alongside our pavements.

But the coincidence is this: Such a valuable use for roadside sand would tie in quite perfectly with present highway practices of sanding our roads both winter and summer, in winter for ice, in summer for top dressing. In fact the third use for sand would eliminate the most tedious operation of the present two uses, which is that of going around and sweeping up and carting away the surplus sand after the ice has melted or the top been dressed.

Under the new possibility of a third use for sand in connection with highways, the sand which is surplus from the winter and summer operations would merely be brushed off to the side of the road to form that continuous safety sandbank which may be the thing which finally takes the danger out of the going off the road type of accident, just as center median strips have eliminated some of the worst dangers of the cross-

over type of accident. And once this continuous sand bank is well established along every highway, the program for dealing with winter ice and summer dressing will be simplified, too. The right proportion of sand will just be brushed back on the pavement, for the duration of the need for it, and the residue then brushed back into the safety benk again, ad saharam.
