Generations Meet In Court The question of whether Columbia Uniersity has any power to discipline those student rebels who led the famous revolution of last spring has now reached the atmosphere of the courts, and one of the first things held by Federal Judge Marvin E. Frankel is that the First mendment's guarantee of the right of "free speech" is not quite as broad a thing as the student rebels and their awyers wished to claim it to be.

That "debate on public issues should e uninhibited, robust and wide-open" as, said Judge Frankel, been affirmed again and again by the Supreme Court

But the Court has nevertheless refused, Judge Frankel continued, to classify certain actions as if they were speech. "It has made clear," he said, "the gross error of believing that every kind of conduct (however nonverbal and phymoslly destructive or obstructive) must be treated simply as protected 'speech' because those engaged in it intend to express some view or position.

"Similarly, the Court has rejected the notion that everyone with opinions or beliefs to express may do so at any time and at any place.

"Without such inescapably necessary limits, the First Amendment would be oving license for 'peaceful expression' by the seizure of the streets. uildings and offices by mobs, large or small, driven by motives (and toward objectives) that different viewers might deem 'good or had'."

To the plea of the Columbia rebels that the First Amendment should be construed as authorization of all the tactics by which our revolutionary forefathers secured themselves the right and opportunity to write themselves a Constitution, Judge Frankel replied, coldly: "It is surely nonsense of the most literal kind that a court of law should subordinate the 'rule of law' in favor volutionary action designed to forcibly oust governments, courts and all." All of this must have sounded to the Columbia rebels as if King George III were back on his throne. It is strange indeed how the older generation doesn't recognize the clean and shining zeal of wouth's effort to throw everything out, and how the younger generation doesn't concede the instinctive necessity of the grown-up to try to continue living inside the structure it has taken 200 years to build.

From Multimouse To Multichild? The procedure by which the thing called a multimouse is brought to birth is perhaps a little complicated for immediate application to human beings even by a medical science which is daily becoming more accustomed to transplants of whole organs.

To describe the process briefly: Embryos from two separate matings of separate pairs of mice are removed from the female mice involved and merged together and then implanted into a third female mouse which, later on, gives birth to a multimouse.

The multimouse is thus a creature which has four biological parents, two fathers and two mothers, plus one foster parent, the female mouse which carried the final embryo.

And the scientists of heredity who accomplish this know they have a multimouse when, having started with one black pair and one white pair, they get the birth of a mouse which is black and white

Having obtained such a multimouse, they work back from there, tracing how what genes handed on which characteristics through which cells.

Presumably, some day, after the so ence of constructing or assembling the multimouse has been perfected and rendered reliable, civilization may fall into the hands of somebody who wants to speed up the unification of mankind, and who will then be able to command from the laboratories the technical procedure for making the multichild.

By that time, we suppose, improved aboratory techniques might have increased the number of parents possible for one single offspring from the four of the present multimouse to 16 or perhaps to 1600, so that it might be only a matter of a generation or two before we would all be children of the same parents, and all whatever alternation or blending of colors the social fashion of the day might

This is, of course, precisely the process nature itself has been following, slowly, painstakingly, with all kinds of romantic illusions of free choices and selections, but with never a doubt about the ultimate result, since the beginning of life. But since we have, of late, taken even to fighting over the few lingering differences the natural process has not yet merged and blended, it will perhaps be a mercy to have the laboratory take over and speed the process to its inevitable ultimate conclusion.

The Fourth of July has come and gone, with its usual complement of marching bands, patriotic speeches, about which Alexis de Tocqueville got so excited, and the grim addition of death on the road. The summer heat has suddenly turned the sorry days of June into little more than a chilly memory and a bumper crop for maple trees; everything settles into torpor.

Events, too, seem to have taken on the aspect of quiet siege, awaiting declaions for cooler days. Great decisions seem to be behind, even as lingerin problems fester. The Cardinals and the Tigers have left their respective leagues standing in the dust, and so it is with Nixon and Humphrey, The Metscramble to reach .500 ball - this for them is nirvana. So it is with the Mc Carthy forces, who remain undaunted the pursuit of the nomination which not even Allard Lowenstein can think is now possible.

But it is vacation time, All-Star-Game time, and America seems bent on calling t quits on the frenzy and didacticism that the year has boiled. Even in the black communities there is less of the perceptible tension that percolated into riots; perhaps we have all been through the necessary catharses, and now are in period of retrenchment or at least elaxation. In the all-consuming corral of foreign policy there is a perceptible tapering off: the Pueblo incident signaled that, though no one knew it at the time. Or perhaps it was the Cuban Missile Crisis that buried brinkmanshi for the decade. In any case Pueblo seems very far off. It doesn't appear as though the escalation momentum will ever get started again either, now that the talks have started - talks which ooth sides seem to want to continue, despite the fact that they are going 'nowhere." Evidence? When there is a fear that the futility of it all will sever the Paris conference, a State D. p.rtment or, even stranger, a Defense Defense Department spokesman will detect "movement" so that everyone is encouraged again.

The list goes on; Khesanh, the battlement over which rumors began that nuclear or germ warfare was imminent, has been abandoned, just like all the strategić hills in Vietnam which American forces were compelled to take at staggering human cost. Berlin, too, over which so much trouble has been made has faded into some legalistic maneuvering. Dean Rusk, who apparently disappeared, much to the relief of all, flew to Berlin to give the standard assurances. But the really important news seems to be the demands in the Senate for a 60 per cent reduction in our European troop contingents, and Soviet overtures to the United States to negotiate a freeze in missile deployment. For years it has been apparent to all but the policy makers, Air Force and Space Digest and General Power that the law of diminishing returns applies to missile and defense technology as well as to economic law of labor supply. That we have gone ahead with our \$5 billion thin" anti-missile missile is due more to inertia and defense lobbying than it is to any rational belief that it can work to stop incoming nuclear warheads. The Washington Post HONG KONG, July 11 - Communist China is believed to have assured North Vietnam that delivery of military and economic supplies moving by railway to North Vietnam will be improved.

Analysts here consider this assurance implicit in a speech delivered Wednesday by China's Vice Premier Li Hsien-Nien, honoring Le Thanh Nghi, head of a Hanoi delegation now in Peking to negotiate a new Chinese aid agreement. In his peech, transmitted here Thurs-day by the official New China News Agency, Li said Peking "will extend more effective support to the revolutionary struggle of the fraternal Vietnam-

ese people.' The use of the phrase "more effective support," analysts submit, seems to suggest that the Chinese have promised to accelerate the movement of supplies

rather than increase their aid to Hanoi. Authoritative Chinese statements as well as unofficial accounts have disclosed that rail shipments to North Vietnam have been repeatedly disrupted by factional fighting in south and southwest

In Arms Shipment to Hanoi Trains passing through Kwangtung

Province and the Kwangsi border region have reportedly been hijacked by Chi-nese resentful that the North Vietnamese were receiving medicines, food and other merchandise they themselves lacked.

In some places, according to reports here, Red Guards and other activists raided trains to obtain weapons for their internecine disputes. It is thought that the antiaircraft guns used by rival factions in Chungking may have been originally earmarked for North Vietnam. Speaking to a conference of transport workers in Peking in May, Premier Chou En-Lai said that clashes were so serious at Lauchow, an important rail juncture in Kwangsi, that "traffic is at a stand-

Material cannot be transported to Hankow or Vietnam," Chou added. In his Wednesday night speech reiterated China's opposition to the Vietnam peace talks in Paris, employing

the same formula used on previous oc-casions by other Chinese leaders. He
