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Newark Missing Girls Safe After Spooky Night

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Three young Newark girls are safe at home with a story to tell of their friends about a spine-chilling night in a spooky mansion.

The girls, missing for nearly 18 hours, were found walking along a street Thursday afternoon after playing and sleeping overnight in a deserted 14-room house.

"We were operating on Frankenstein there," said 8-year-old Barbara Ann Gately, who had been sought since 7 p.m. Wednesday along with her sister, 10-year-old Colleen, and a daymate, 10-year-old Lillian, in the house.

The girls, object of a police search in five communities, were tired and hungry, but none seemed to be in any danger.

The children were found about a mile from their homes by a aunt of the girls, Mary Louise Desens of Orange.

Lower Casualties

If we can refrain from asking why, but merely note that the situation does exist, we can get the flavor of good news from Vietnam.

There has been less unit to unit fighting going on in Vietnam.

The combat level of the war has lowered.

Taken by itself, such a statistical revelation is good. It might be, in fact, the only way we come to agreement in Vietnam, or realize that the war is continuing to some extent.

At the top and best speculative level, this decline in combat could be the enemy's search of response for our March 31 restriction in our bombing areas.

At the worst, it could be what many military analysts in Vietnam seem to think—the enemy has during which he is building up strength and supplies for one more spectacular offensive before the American escalation.

There can be a hope. It would be the case that both sides are trying to realize that their efforts to score military points for the negotiating table at Paris are quite likely to cancel each other out, just as it was a recognition of military and power stalemate which brought them to agree to meet and talk at Paris in the first place.

The one thing the two sides might possibly agree upon before they agree on anything else could be neither side would be the loser if the amount of killing were to be scaled down, and the fighting brought to a halt with both sides essentially in their present geographical positions and power relationships. And they could make this kind of agreement, if they wished, without announcing anything about it, or putting anything on paper, or even acknowledging that they were doing it, but merely by military orders under which the shooting would dwindle.

"I figure I can pitch another 10 years in a standard 180-200 mile relief pitcher. I'm not sure that would be a smart, either."
