The Madness Is Epidemic

There need not be the slightest doubt about it - our very discussion of what to do about the violence done with guns in our society is inspiring more violence with guns.

We are in the midst of a grisly epidemic which operates and spreads among us, even though it is completely tragic rather than merely grotesque or comic, much as the goldfish swallowing of an earlier time spread from coast

One answer to the goldfish swallowing epidemic would have been to outlaw the sale, purchase, or ownership of gold-

That was not attempted. The craze died of its own surfeit, its own boredom, to be succeeded, in time, by some other tide of play for attention and headlines. The cruze for the indiscriminate use of guns on fellow human beings is not quite so likely to ease itself out of fashion. Eventually, perhaps, the whole public psyche will find itself so satiated and nauseated and horrified by the exceas of gunplay that even the crazed fringes of that psyche will find themselves driven or drawn toward some other method of gaining attention to themselves.

But, in the meantime, no one can say that the gunplay is boring. To the precise contrary, the more there is of it the more fascinatingly dramatic and horrible it becomes. The game of indiscriminate killing, of killing for no reason other than that of making a sensational stand, must seem something fresh and new to each player ioins it.

So we are, for the moment, and perhaps for longer than a moment, in a condition where all our talk and agitation and legislation about eliminating the violence that comes out of guns is itself a strong suggestion to weak and crazed minds. We cannot stop reporting among ourselves the news of the latest fusillades. We cannot stop discussing whether we should pass gun control laws to try to stop indiscriminate murder We dan't take guns out of our national thoughts and out of our national headlines. And yet, as berserk occurrence after berserk occurrence reveals and reiterates, our very awareness of the problem, our very concentration upon it, our most frantic efforts to solve it, all have some tendency to add to the amount of the tragedy it involves and inflicts upon us.

If we could all be given some national kind of electric shock treatment, and be made to wake up from it with a big blank space in that part of our national mind which has been aimed at the gun, perhaps we would find ourselves back in normal llivng.

But, for the moment, the curse is simple and direct: the more we worry about the gun, the more terrible its role among us. Our very concentration on the madness loose among us intensifies the way the madness erupts; we are, as a nation, in some degree helpless, and therefore, we do not cringe to admit, sick. When we can somehow begin thinking healthier thoughts, and lift the national mind off guns as if they were somehow to blame for what people do with them, we may begin to find ourselves with healthier, saner feelings in the whole national mind, feelings which may spread a modifying effect out into the weaker and more unstable fringes of our thought and conduct.

Postmaster General's Blackmail When Postmaster General Marvin Watson, appearing before the House Ways and Means Committee, makes any kind of threat that he will deal with a tightness of funds for his department by abandoning Saturday mail deliveries and closing post office windows on Saturdays, that type of threat is, we be lieve, something that might legitimately be classified as "blackmail." The public is not grateful for the hreat. So far as the public is concerned, it is the party which has just begun paying heavy increases in its postal rates, with the presumed object of enabling the postal services to pay for themselves. It is not going to bother, the public, to penetrate to the dollar and cents rights or wrongs of Postmaster General Watson's contention that his department cannot absorb the economy moves Congress, enacted as part of its voting of the President's 10 per cent tax increase. But it is not going to take any curtailment of its mail services, and Postmaster General Watson might

What we shouldn't be expected to have to do is play out our role in pretending to believe and be excited by the Postmaster General's gesture of blackmail against the public and againct the Congress. Let him consider that the nation's boxholders and occupants have, for once, refused delivery.

The Death Penalty

A decent respect for human life is the proper concern of all civilized men. This respect, ironically, seems to be increas ingly concerned these days with the brutish lives of murderers, rapists, and dope peddlers rather than the lives of e victims, past and future.

When Attorney General Clark espouses the abolition of the death penaly, as he did last week, he spoke elo quently of the need for "humane an generous concern for every individual is health and his fulfilment." Such high-mindedness in behalf of humans who have destroyed other humans is coupled as it always is, with the notion that the death penalty is a terrible vestige of a barbaric society.

"Our history shows," stated Mr. Clark, "that the death penalty has been unjustly imposed, innocents have been dlled by the state, effective rehabilitation has been impaired, judicial administration has suffered." Further, he said "It is the poor, the weak, the ignorant the hated who are executed."

It is also true, and far more relevant that the executed were captured, tried in courts of law, convicted, and sentenced for crimes the society considered olerable. The depth and seriousness of that intolerance was plainly stated in the penalty prescribed for the crime. History also shows, if Mr. Clark had cared to note, that the instances in which the death penalty has been unjustly imposed represent only a slight fraction of cases where the penalty by law, had been tustly imposed. What's more, even that small number of erroneous sentences has been further reduced by reversals be fore the sentence" was carried out. Innocents have been killed by the state True and deplorable. As deplorable as the fact that men have gotten away with murder of many other innocents who had every right to expect protection withn the society and didn't get it. No system of law enforcement ever has been devised that guarantees the immunity of the innocent. But no system either let it be noted, contains as many safeguards against errant justice as our own. Where else could a convicted killer stave off execution for 12 years? In this land, justice is not swift, but it is swiftly becoming less sure.

Effective rehabilitation has been imnaired, says Mr. Clark, Impaired by what? By the death penalty? as Mr. Clark implies. Or is it, rather, the harsh fact that rehabilitation of some criminals just isn't possible, despite all the humane and generous sentiments of a civilized society? If judicial administration has suffered, as Mr. Clark says, it is nonsense to blame that on the mere existence of a prescribed penalty. That's like saying laws against speeding cause auto accidents.

If the penalty does no harm, does it do any good? Does the death penalty deter would-be murderers, rapists, or dope peddlers who sell their poison to voungsters? Maybe, maybe not. In rage, asion, greed, or fright, an assailant probably does not rationally consider the onsequences of an awful act. But who is to really know that fear of the penalty has not dissuaded others from deliberately doing wrong? Or that punishment less severe than the crime does not encourage the evil?

The character of a society is reflected not only in what it condones but in what it prohibits. Punishment, in this society, is rightly prescribed to fit the crime. That punishment varies, in time and circumstances, depending on the society's judgment about what is tolerable and what is not for its stability and survival. Horse thieves are not lynched any more, but in a bygone era the theft of horse really was a matter of life or death to an owner and his family. De moving the death penalty entirely would be merely another way of stating that there are no crimes now, or in the future, that the society considers so heinous as to warrant the death of the perpe-

It has, of course, become increasingly tashionable in recent years to find excuses for people who break the law Unusual sympathy is accorded a murderer because he has the misfortune of grow ing up in a slum area, even though many others grew up in similar circumstances and didn't turn to murder. Some real, or imagined, grievance somehow is always available to "explain" why so-andso did such-and-such. To explain, to ex-

invariably, the social experts ge around to shifting the blame for every horrible act onto the society itself, rather than the individual who committed it. Once the society is condemned and properly guilt-ridden, the next step is to make t change the rules.

The traditional rules in this land, designed to maintain law and order, have been steadily challenged, changed, and roded in recent years. The rights of the accused and the convicted, under U.S. Supreme Court decisions, have become so enshrined in legalisms that they mock the wrongs done, Undue compassion for the poor lawbreaker has inevitably led to breakdowns in the rules that regulate the society, as the dismal record of recent times testifies.

The taking of a life, whether by the state or by an individual, is an awful thing. Now, again, comes the familiar hue and cry for leniency toward the coniemned, and the precious concern for their fives brooks no sympathy or concern for the lives of the silenced Let the death penalty stand; let is be

The choice of vehicle depends on the backgrounds of the selected astronauts. Astronauts with a geological background would prefer a jeep to enable them to carefully scrutinize the terrain. Other astronauts may choose a type of "flying" craft to get to interesting places in a hurry. New York. In the storied past of "Today," one could often find Martin Agronaky, broadcasting's best digging reporter, doing inter-views, But Martin moved to CBS News, where he has unfortunate-ly been wasted and chained to the Sunday mid-day period with "Face the Nation."

The move of Agronalcy to CBS left "Today" without the excit-ment and incisiveness that went with Martin's determined probing of the reluctant public official. No replacement has been satisfactory, although most reporters appear determined to match downs' momogenized blandness.

Then there's the addition of Joe Garagiols, who came into broadcasting as a most amusing fellow and who promptly ran out of material. By now, most viewers have heard, a dosen times, the jokes that he com-piled for "baseball is a funny game." He's usually excused, however. Professional comedians excuse Joe for his failings by saying he's ''a former ball-

HOLLYWOOD (AP) -NBC is spending a few hundred thou-sand dollars on the proposition that advertisers end audiences would support a weekly televi-sion variety show enacted an-tirely by Negroes. Last week the pilot film of

"Soul," a one-hour musical with Lou Rawis, Nipsy Russel, Reid Fox, Chambers Brothers, George Kirby and others was taped at the NBC Burbank studios. No one would say what the cost was, but comparable specials cost \$300,000 or more.

The show is aimed for presenstion as a special, possibly this lead to a weekly series during the January self-seasion switch in programming. That was the history of last season's biggest hit, "Laugh-In."
