



Strangers In A Flat Grant World In the world in which most of us grew up, there was never any magic wand which guaranteed us any of the nice basic necessities of life. For some of us circumstances may have been frugal; but for most of the rest of us, too, the understanding was that people got what they earned, or what they could afford. Sometimes it may have seemed unjust and unpleasant that some people could, without seeming to do much about earning it themselves, afford so much more than other people

Such background constitutes the reason some of us have to be educated to take, without flinching, some of the assumptions in today's America. There is considerable agitation on now,

among welfare and social service experts down in New York City, for a flat-grant system which would make the basic allotment to families on relief high enough to take care of most of the specal grant allocations now being made all the time, but only through special consideration which involves unnecessary time and red tape. As of now, say these experts, they

have to make special determinations on such things as welfare clients' demands for telephones, for spring clothing, for er's Day or school graduation, or for camp clothing. The older generation, born to frugality, or to limited spending, or to the idea that it would really be wicked for anybody else than yourself to get something for nothing. is quite likely to feel its blood pres sure rising at some of these "special grant" items. But they all make sense, of course, in the context of the times.

There is a new state law, for instance, which authorizes special relief grants to send children away to summer camp. Very well. If you are going to send children away to summer camp, they have to have clothes for summer camp, don't they? The provision of telephones for all welfare clients is now being advocated on the ground that they are needed to summon medical help, or police help, or fireman help, but it is also a status symbol of a negative kind not to have a telephone, and the idea about modern welfare relief is that it should never seem like relief

It would save a lot of red tape then, and a lot of debate, too, if the basic grant to New York City families on relief were made high enough to cover all these incidentals which are really not incidentals any more. The basic allowance by the city Social Services Department to a family of four now averages \$272.50 a month. or only \$3270 a year. The experts visualize a \$6000 a year level as one which would eliminate a lot of needless bookkeeping and individual ex-

On every level except the purely instinctual, conditioned by our own memory of the kind of world we ourselves were born into, we can feel ourselves eventually yielding to such a concept, even accepting the inevitability of the system by which the income of those who work is tapped to take the troublesome red tape out of the spending of those who, with or without fault of their own, don't work. But we keep muttering one old-fashioned reservation to ourselves. When the flat grant gets just a little bit higher, we may swap roles, and cross from the worker to the relief side of the ledger. We don't really mean it; there is just a dwindling fringe part of us all which can't help thinking cheap, grudging thoughts like that.

MIAMI, Fig. (AP) —A gre-nade-wielding hijacker who threatened to blow up a jettiner took control of the plane over Texas today, held command during a hurried refueling stop at New Orleans, then forced the pilot to fly to Cuba. The National Airlines DCs, with 57 passengers and seven crewmen aboard, set down at Jose Marti Airport in Havana at 9:36 a.m. EDT. First off the plane was the hijacker. Wearing a yellow shirt, he walked jaunthy away with security police who apparently had taken from him a grenade and pistol with which he terrorised the crew and passengers.


