





The Extra juridical Role

It turns out that having Justice Abe Fortas before the Senate Judiciary Committee has developed some legitimate point after all, even though it would be unjust to make this particular member of the Supreme Court the scapegoat for all the other members of that Court who have, over the years of its existence, preceded him in the kind of behavior he himself has admitted un-

What Justice Fortas has admitted unfer questioning is that he has, since his membership on the highest court in the land, continued to serve in some degree as a White House advisor on some of the important issues of the day. such as the war in Vietnam and the race troubles at home. Justice Fortas, in his testimony, held that his function in such White House discussions had been mainly that of summing up, for his old friend and legal client, the President, the arguments presented by the President's other advisers. And Justice Fortas protests strongly that he never discussed issues which might be coming before the Court of which he is member, and for which he may now become Chief

Such disclaimers are, of course, no good. The Vietnam war, for instance, again and again because those who are against that war are never going to cease their efforts to force the Supreme court to rule whether it is a legal war, whether the law we adopted and enforced at Nuremberg can be applied to our own citizens when they consider a particular war a criminal kind of war. So Justice Fortas can't even be a member of the Supreme Court, in any seat, without being called upon to help decide whether that Court will, in instance after instance, agree to entertain the plea that the war in Vietnam is illegal. And a gentleman who has been sitting in on White House deliberations on the war, perhaps as a sort of moderator, has by that very act made himself part of the acceptance of that war as a proper activity for his nation.

As for the issue of civil rights, that is something that touches our courts all the time, unceasingly. And the principle that ought to be

proclaimed on the basis of the disclosure that Justice Fortas has been a White fouse adviser on such matters is easily formulated: No member of any judiciary should ever serve inside the policy making discussions or decisions of the execu-

But, although it happens to be the testimony of Justice Fortas which invites the proclamation of such principle, he nimself should in no wise be especially abused or reprimanded because he has done what others have done before him. One would guess that Chief Justice Warren has, on occasion, been in consultation with the White House or that Justice Tom Clark might have found his counsel appreciated there. One can find in the news record of his career the mimber of times Justice Douglas has indulged in public discussion and advocacy of points of view he should more properly have reserved for his pronouncements from the bench. Justice Byrnes apposedly advised the White House almost as much after he went on the bench as he had done before. Justice Frankfurter, the memoirs of the Roosevelt era reveal and repeat, often had his tinger in some policy or patronage

This is the first time in history a nominee for the post of Chief Justice has been subjected to summons and interrogation before a committee of Concress. In the main, that is an unfairless to Justice Fortas, whose confirmation ought to be as prompt as that of any other Chief Justice has been. But if his appearance has served to give attention and headlines to what should be the strict propriety of having judges stay on their bench and hold themselves clear and clean of any involvement in even the most secret conclaves of the executive or legislative branches, the innovation will have proved itself worth while.

Yet a very strange thing has happen ed to the Rockefeller peace plan on its way to the public forum.

Our positive comment has to be limited to something like this: that it seems like a good sample of a positive plan which could work if-tf-if-if certain precise conditions should happen to arrive. Or we can think that it could enemy. And we can be grateful that it doesn't, at any stage, or for any contingency, suggest a return to that blind escalation of the conflict which gave us such small positive dividends during the three years of President Johnson's pursuit of a military decision.

But that this particular plan in itself comes to us all as the magic formula for which we have been waiting, as for rescue by gallant knight, by superman, or by super braintrust-that kind of comment we cannot produce. We shall be watching to see what com-

ment others may eventually offer. Meanwhile, in order to refresh our readers on what it is the nation's commentators find it so hard to comment upon, we reproduce the formal phrasing of the Rockefeller Plan For Peace In Vietnam, as follows:
