This suggests that the Johnson-Humphrey party organization, desperate with the intimation of the polls that this may be the year when almost any Resublican nominee can defeat Vice Presilent Humphrey,, is now making up its mind to put on a pressure campaign to persuade the one surviving Kennedy rother to accept the nomination for Vice President. The compulsion to try this must be terrific. To try it and to fail would nevertheless be to make the best wooing approach to the presently disorganized and directionless forces Sensitor Robert Kennedy had rallied around himself in the effort to create a second Camelot.

To try it and succeed would be to get for the Humphrey candidacy the one big superficial boost which might change the atmosphere of the whole Democratic campaign from one of gloom to one of

And to Senator Kennedy, and his friends, the offer would not be without its tantalizing attractions. Election as Vice President in 1968 would seem firm guarantee of an eventual nomination of a Kennedy for President.

We hope it doesn't happen, not because we fear it as an aid to the possible election of Vice President Humphrey, but because it would be a contrivance more cynical than most vice presidential nominations, because it would not offer justice and true opportunity to the worth and talent of the youngest Kennedy, whatever they may be. For those who have watched him, his capabilities and attributes are rated highly. But no one can seriously contend that he is, as of 1966, ready for the Presidency, which is what nomina-

tion for the Vice President should mean. If, later in his career, Senator Ted Kennedy has grown in stature because of his own ability and record, there can be no objection if his career is assisted by the lingering aura of the popular standing enjoyed by his two brothers. But the aura alone—and it does stand well out front at the moment-should not be considered enough, not even by a desperate Humphrey.

## A Friend To Man

It is pleasant news indeed that former President Dwight D. Eisenhower is able to sit up in Walter Reed Hospital and give out endorsement. If, in the particular endorsement he

has given out, he has been pleasantly influenced by the existence of an engagement between his own grandson and the daughter of his former Vice President, that need not detract from the generosity of his 1968 words for Mr.

In his Indian Summer phase, Mr. Etsenhower has softened more judgments than he has hardened, headed for the consensus plains more often than for the individualistic hills, and has quite forgotten what a revolutionary character he himself was in the context of his own top rank political service to his nation and the world. He poses no new challenges to the routine concepts of American life and politics, nor, considering how refreshing and different and healing he managed to be during his Presidency, should he be required to be. He mainly wants, in the years remaining to him, to be a friend to man. This is not always easy for him when it comes down to specifics, and there must have been some temptation to continue not liking either Nixon or Rockefeller, a temptation overcome, perhaps, by the oppor tunity to be on the same side with young David. Archbishop Terence J. We are continually forming the answer, for the conduct of other people. On rerer occasions, we even imagine to ask the question of ourselves, concerning our own conduct. But whenever people at themselves down for the final measurement of a person, that question outlines the direction in which their auditing heads.

"How did you treat your fellow man?" With respect for his sacred dignity as an individual? With tolerance and undenstanding for such wealmesses as might be found within yourself? As an equal? As one to be believed and to be trusted? As ye would have him do unto

### Verdict On Dr. Spock

It is a footnote to his story to say that some believe that Dr. Benjamin Spock and his associates in the antidraft cas have been sentenced to prison and fines in part for doing precisely what some officials of Hitler's Reich were hanged for not doing.

On October 16, 1946, 10 top German Nazis were hanged in the Nuremberg prison for war crimes. One of the four charges under which they and other code fendants were tried was that they had 'waged aggressive war." This was construed as a "crime against the peace" (most were hanged for crimes against humanity; quite another matter where The defense contended that these men

had all acted under orders and that they could not have done a thing to prevent the war without defying the laws of their own government. A corolary of this argument was that to defied their orders would have put them in the position of disobeying their own laws, even to the point of treason. At the time of the Nuremberg trials

many a Western legal expert was trou-bled by the conflicts of interest and aw involved. Public opinion demanded a trial for war crimes. But not before history had it been contended that high military person carried on his shoul ders a responsibility to be his own judge of the morality of his own country's Among the 10 who went to the gallo

Nuremberg two, Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel and Col. Gen. Alfred Jodl were soldiers. By their standards they only did their duty. Many an American British, and French soldier was profoundly disturbed by the idea that a soldier could be hanged for obeying or-Dr. Spock and his associates have been

found guilty and sentenced to fines and prison terms for defying the laws of the United States. There is no serious challenge to the verdict under American law. These men unquestionably defied and violated the laws of the United States. They have been correctly found guilty under United States law in United States courts.

But in part their defense could h based on the arguments used by the American lawyers at Nuremberg to obtain convictions against the Nazi "war criminals." The contention against these men was that they should have defied the political leadership of their own counry and exercised their duty as individuals to resist an immoral war. Who is to decide whether a war is moral or immoral?

At Nuremberg it was the contention of the allies that the Nazi leaders were solely guilty for World War II, They were labeled as "war criminals" because they had launched an "aggressive war." They were tried, not under the laws of any of the allied states, but under international law which, in this case, was coined for the purpose. Dr. Spock and his associates defied United States law on the ground that they had a higher moral responsibility. In effect, they appealed to the arguments used in the Nuremberg trials that there is indeed a higher law. They felt it their duty to resist a war which they

selieved to be aggressive and immoral. International law as applied at Nuremberg is in conflict with national law as applied in the Spock trial. The arguments used at Nuremberg would acquit r. Spock. The arguments used against Dr. Spock would have saved the necks of the soldiers who were hanged at Nuremberg, not, of course, of those whose crimes included the gas chambers. It is interesting to note that at the time of the Nuremberg verdict opinion was divided. Among those approving were the London Times, the New York Times, the New York Daily News and The Christian Science Monitor. The Chicago Tribune dissented, claiming that tussia, Britain, France, and the United states "were all guilty of crimes against the peace." And Sen. Robert A. Taft called the verdict "an outrage against justice."-JOSEPH C. HARSCH IN THE

# Bill Provision Seen Civil Rights Threat
