Negro Up for Rank As Army General

By LEE LESCAZE The Washington Post SAIGON—One day in the next weeks or months, Frederic D. Davison will be promoted from colonel to brigadier general in the United States Army.

Negro general on active duty and the second Negro to have made general in the history of the Army.

Davison is the Deputy Commander of the 1st Cavalry Division, 23rd Air Landing Brigade, one of the American units that has participated in the defense of Saigon since before Tet.

He was the acting brigadier commander when the Vietcong attacked at Tet and official figures credit the 196th with more than 90 enemy killed in the first four days of the enemy attacks.

"The Army's been extremely fair to me," Davison said today in an interview at the 196th present forward headquarters in a district factory on Route 6, just south of Saigon's city limits.

Davison believes that the Army has a hard time understanding what's going on back there.

He first served as a company commander and staff officer with the Negro 82d division during World War II. Most of the division's other officers were white, but all the troops were Negro.

"Particularly since Truman's decision to integrate the armed forces (July 26, 1948)," Davison said, "the opportunity has been there. We have incoherence in civilian life as officers are areas of tremendous opportunity, but in the Army there's a university of equal opportunity."

"I think the most significant thing is that the Army has led the way."

Speaking of the civil rights movement in the United States, Davison said: "One thing that's essential for everyone to understand is that regardless of the approaches being taken by various Negro organizations, the Negroes are to be full participants in American life."

"The guy who's been over here is doing his full share. I believe very strongly that he has a right to full participation."

Davison hopes that the Negro and white soldiers returning from Vietnam will help create a climate for peaceful progress in civil rights.

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Renewal Tract to Get Office Building

With a modern courthouse and a modern housing project for the elderly being the theme, the Redevelopment Commission has an option to buy in 15 years.

The housing project for the elderly will be built by the developer, who on completion will turn it over to the Federal government. This is the first in the area of what is called a "turn-key" project.

Excavating has already been started on the Tolland County Courthouse and plans have been approved for a 100-unit high rise apartment for the elderly. Work will be started on this as soon as federal funds are made available.

The third building tentatively approved last night is a commercial-office building. Sam DiCarlo of Also Development Corp. told the commission that plans to have the buildings in the renewal area of colonial design had to be abandoned when the state and federal government approved the first two buildings, both contemporary in design.

DiCarlo said the plans presented for the office building were not necessarily the ones to be used but he wanted the commission to approve the concept.

Four-story building It will be a four-story building with 8,000 square feet of office space on each floor. The building will be serviced by an elevator, DiCarlo said. It will be constructed on Parcel Three of the area, which is on East Main St. where the Leader building stood.

Leiter Baum, chairman of the commission, said it was originally decided to keep the theme colonial to avoid having a square cinder block type of the buildings.

Work was started on the courthouses on July 15 and construction has to be completed by March 10 of next year. The state is leasing the courthouses from the developer and will be required to buy in 15 years.

Blind Ex-Marine Operates Computer

BAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Paul Duke, a blind ex-Marine, is a computer programmer and confident, perceptive technician of the computer age.

"I'm more aware of certain areas than you would be," he said. "I've had these senses more completely. The senses work in themselves just by virtue of their existence. You have to train them."

"Blind people listen harder. And they pay more attention."

NEW YORK (AP)—A torrential rainstorm, erratic weather following it, and a radar equipment accident combined to increase the air traffic congestion and delays at Kennedy Airport Wednesday.

In the afternoon the situation was reported as bad as any since July 3 when the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Association, a national group, began what it calls a safety campaign—strict enforcement of all Federal regulations.

Thousands of air traffic takeoffs and arrivals have been delayed for the past three weeks.

Youth Camp Bill Sought By Ribicoff

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., called today for prompt passage of his Youth Camp Safety bill, which he said provides guidelines for each camp to comply with minimum safety standards.

The measure would establish a joint state-federal camp safety program, with safety standards established by the secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. It also would provide for a program of state inspection to insure compliance.

Standards for camps would be developed and published by the HEW secretary in cooperation with specialists in camp safety from private groups and state governments.

Ribicoff urged passage of the bill, which he introduced in the Senate and which several congressmen introduced in the House, in prepared testimony before a congressional committee.

He said states would participate in the program if they wished, and that federal grants of up to \$50,000 per state would be available.

"This program is not a federal intrusion into camping operations. In fact it would prohibit states or federal officials from interfering with the curriculum or program of a camp," he said.

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Tolland Parents Call Bus Stop 'Unsafe'

A petition was read at last night's Board of Education meeting asking for action concerning an "unsafe" school bus stop at the corner of Rhodes and Morrow Rds.

Twelve parents living on Rhodes Rd. listed the following reasons for the dangerous situation: No safety lights or signs on bus; no stop sign; no walk on a completely open road; Tolland firehouse is behind them and gas station is on left and open road on right hand side and across the street on both corners of Rhodes and Morrow Rds. All companies have purchased land for gas stations.

"They also made the point that there are 13 children on the road and it is not necessary for each child to be spoiled up his home."

"The petition also stated, 'We have noticed this past spring the empty school buses going up and down and if they can come by here every day, they can see my children walking with the taxes I'm paying.'"

A spokesman for the group, Robert Carr of Rhodes Rd., the father of three school-aged children and a new resident, was present at the meeting. He stated he felt bus service should be given in view of the high taxes paid to Tolland. "I can't see my children walking with the taxes I'm paying," he said.

Board chairman David Cook ventured the opinion, "And they'll go up and see my services are added."

Carr said that he could see few services anyway, that there is no police force and added, "I've never received a letter for so many taxes. One man was charged with carrying concealed weapons."

Cook then replied, "The tax base is the people." He added, "When we went to the budget meeting in July \$5,000 was taken from the transportation budget and not one person spoke out against it. This amounts to just about one bus."

Board member Mrs. Barbara Kala pointed out that with a 20 per cent increase in students and practically no increase in transportation this is a "pretty difficult situation."

She added that "we might describe that one solution might be to cut out individual pick-ups at homes and designate certain bus stops to which the children will have to walk."

Carr again questioned where the money was being spent. In answer Mrs. Kala stated that in the last six years the school population has tripled and that it actually costs \$800 to educate every child every year. She added that families moving into town who have children usually cost the town money and that they pay less in taxes than it costs the town to educate their children. She added, "We borrow to capacity to build schools."

Coordinator's Job

On the question of the Rhodes Rd. bus stop it was pointed out that this is a dirt road. "Not a good road," Carr said, "but it is passable."

Cook pointed out that the board would be discussing the position of a transportation coordinator later during the meeting and that this particular problem would have to be considered in light of all of the bus runs. He added this would be one of the jobs of the coordinator.

He explained to Carr that an empty bus position on Rhodes Rd. was probably on the way to

Strip Film Figures in Fortas Quiz

WASHINGTON (AP)—A 14-minute strip-lease film entitled "D-F" has become an issue in the fight over Senate confirmation of President Johnson's nomination of Abe Fortas to be chief justice.

Two Senate Judiciary Committee members, Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., and Hiram L. Fong, R-Hawaii, say all their colleagues should see the film before voting on Fortas' nomination.

McClellan said this is one film he blocked action at a committee meeting Wednesday on a motion by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., to recommend that Fortas be confirmed.

"I thought every member of the committee should have an opportunity to see the film before they vote," McClellan said. Fong said the film was discussed at Wednesday's closed committee session. "All members are anxious to see it, and I think they should," he said.

McClellan, Fong and Hart showed this week a 14-minute film shown by James J. Clancy, a Los Angeles attorney representing Citizens for Decent Literature, Inc.

Clancy subsequently told the full committee that the film, a 14-minute film, was a federal district judge, a Los Angeles juror, and California appellate courts that the film was hand-core pornography.

"This judgment is representative of his actions in other cases," Clancy testified in referring to decisions of Fortas in obscenity cases since he became a member of the Supreme Court in 1966.

A committee meeting may be called next week, but with many of the Republican members leaving for Miami Beach for preliminary to the GOP National Convention it is doubtful a quorum will be on hand. Since Congress will recess at the end of next week for both party conventions in August it is unlikely that the committee will resume its deliberations until September.

The delay abroad the outcome in further uncertainty, since a filibuster in the Senate against confirmation is threatened once the committee acts on Fortas' nomination to succeed retiring Chief Justice Earl Warren.

President Johnson also has nominated federal Circuit Judge Homer Thornberry as an associate justice, but there is no sign of action on the court for Thornberry to fill unless Fortas is confirmed.

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said he didn't think the committee's hearings had helped Fortas' chances and predicted it will be very difficult to break a filibuster. A two-thirds majority is required to end debate.

Earlier Hart, a Fortas supporter, had said the same thing. McClellan described the film as "something no civilized country can tolerate." He said he understands it is not permitted to be shown "even in France."

Fong said he would have ruled it hard-core pornography if he were on the bench, and he said Hart told him he agreed. Hart could not be reached for comment.

Francisco Mayor John Ballew did it successfully in 1966, Tampa, Fla.'s "White State Patrol" pulled a similar coup in May 1967, and Louisville, Ky., did it one year later.

The 108 Negroes who went to Stokes Wednesday morning and asked him to keep all whites, including white policemen, out of the area felt they have proved they have a basis in this extremely race-conscious city for genuine black community-wide organization.

Potential troublemakers, particularly young teen-agers, had a full day to brood over the fact that seven of the dead were Negroes, said Ed Colson, United States Attorney, and to plot retaliatory mischief for the hours after sunset.

Police Hold Looting Down In Detroit

DETROIT (AP)—Rioting crowds smashed several windows along Detroit's 12th Street early today and police arrested 14 persons in connection with the disturbances.

The State Police said they had several people on the street, but they were inconspicuous agents and not troopers.

The five-day riot in Detroit last year—considered the worst in modern history—began July 23 following a police raid on an after-hours drinking establishment.

"Looting was held to a minimum," said an officer from the 12th Precinct, which covers the 12th Street area, where the riot first flared up a year ago.

"It was mostly broken windows done this time," the officer said, adding that most of those arrested were charged with disorderly conduct, looting and entering or leaving a minor.

One citizen resisting arrest reportedly suffered a minor injury.

Police in the area were on a tactical alert for 5 1/2 hours, but the alert was lifted at about dawn.

Meanwhile, across the state in Benton Harbor, police reported the calm overnight for the first time in four days.

Commenting on the number of arrests in Detroit earlier in the evening, a 10th Precinct officer said the number was "not unusual at night like this in the city."

Los Angeles To Seek Oil At City Hall

LOS ANGELES (AP)—In a search for new revenues, Los Angeles plans to drill for oil and gas beneath the 16-story City Hall, once the tallest building in Southern California.

The Board of Public Works approved a proposal Wednesday to drill for oil and gas below 4.5 acres of city-owned land in the Civic Center area, including the spot over which city councilmen are trying so hard to find revenue.

"We don't know exactly how much oil is down there," said city administrator Arthur O. Spaulding. "It probably won't be anything profitable."

Spaulding said chances there would be oil and gas below the city office building were "pretty good—about 90 per cent."

The idea was proposed last March by the Standard Oil Co. after it discovered oil last fall at First and Charvy streets, a half mile southeast of City Hall.

About 20 per cent of apartments in existing coops on its newly-completed coops will be used in the program. HUD has contracted with local firms to establish rents which will be within the means of tenants in the projects.
