



What New Left Plans For You The prophets of the New Left, like the fematics of the Old Left, begin with an act of faith in the mid-Nineteenth Cennet of faith in the mis-kineteenin Cen-tury dogmatic formulas of Karl Marx. His doctrine of eternal class warfare and the dictatorship of the proletarist were designed to meet conditions which existed in his time, when the masses were truly propertyless and shamelessly exploited. The New Left, like the Old Left, is not interested primarily in people but in dogma. If they were interested in people, they might rejoice that the descendants of the proletariat of Marx's day in this country, are well paid, protected by weekingman's compensation tected by workingmen's compensation laws, collective bargaining rights and for the most part enjoy the benefits of prepaid hospital and medical care; most of them own their own homes, dine on the best, have two or three cars in a amily, are free to travel and think nothing of hopping to Europe or Hawaii on their vacations and millions of them own shares in the productive, distributive and financial enterprises. They would want to extend this to others by peaceful

progress is sinful; these people, consti-tuting the vast majority of Americans, are what Marx's dogma abhorred as the bourgeoiste — the middle class — and therefore are still to be destroyed. So are our Constitution and our laws, be-cause they derived, not from the holy guru, Karl, but from the people them-selves. Since the people are tainted with proscribed ideas, so are their laws. So is the Bill of Rights. So is the whole environment of America. It must all go,



The New Left Students for a Democratic Society laid a plan in October to bring Columbia University low by Spring. That it did so is now history. No more than 200 students out of an enrollment of 17,700 shut the place down, under the leadership of Mark Rudd, who comes from a charming split level home in a quiet middle class village in New Jersey. What happened at Columbia will happen at a great many other American universities in the next school term unless administrators, faculty members less administrators, faculty members and students who are not fanatically committed to starting all their thinking at a point in the middle of the Nine eenth Century are alert to what is going on and have the guts to resist it, and to insist on all components of a university tolerating academic freedom for all other

And the public at large need not be puzzled by similarly oriented successes in destroying our total American environment. If we remain unconcerned with what is going on and lack the guts to protest and resist it, we all deserve what we're certain to get from the New Left. Chaos. — ANSONIA EVENING
