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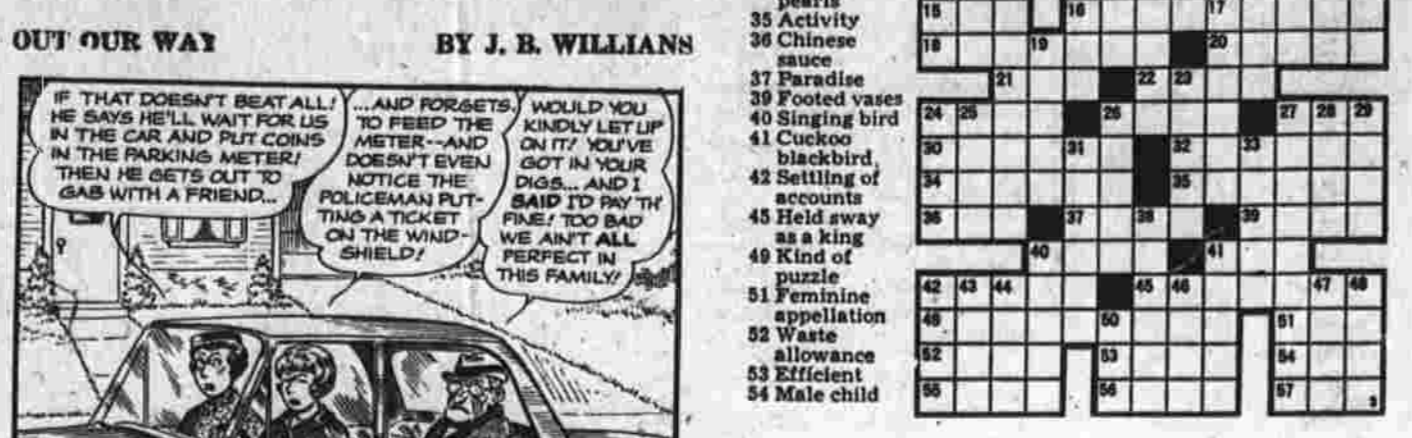

WASHINGTON — Commercials have already begun exhorting the summer viewers to mark time until a new burst of creativity and originality will carry television to new heights in the fall.

Creativity? Originality?

Well, there's to be a weekly 90-minute series called "Name of the Game." It is based on a "World Premiere" movie called "Name is the Name of the Game" and it has three stars. They'll rotate with each making eight individual episodes. The heroes are journalists.

The idea hasn't been tried since ABC offered an hour-long series program called "Wire Service." It had rotating stars named Mercedes McCambridge, George Brent and Dore Clark. They were journalists.

"Wire Service" had its premiere Oct. 10, 1955 and disappeared in 1958.

The network commercials trumpet the forthcoming "Lancer" series as a fresh approach to weekly western adventure. It is about a middle aged man with two sons, a ranch and a determination to tame the West.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) —I have a theory and I would like to pass it along for what it is worth. Now, this is no great earth-shaking, headline-making, whee-wow-whee sort of theory, but merely a something that I personally believe:

People with a sense of humor are ageless.

Realizing that this statement won't exactly spin anyone out of his rocking chair, I appeal to the reader to stay with me for at least a couple more paragraphs.

It occurred to me some years back that the people I considered young were usually the ones who found humor in adversity as well as success. Comedians are an excellent example when you consider such talents as Danny Thomas, Jack Benny, George Burns, Bob Hope, Groucho Marx, Red Skelton,

Jimmy Durante, Milton Berle and a list of names that could easily go on for a page or more.

We are all aware that, with the exception of George Jessel, these boys are not exactly teenagers and yet they radiate a feeling of youth rather than age. It is equally true of some people in every walk of life for there's always one blessed with a talent to make others laugh, or at least smile.

I am sure we all know a person who slumps in a chair at the end of the day and relates a tale of supergloom, disaster, and misfortune that dogged his footsteps from their moment he rolled out of bed. You also can probably think of someone else who could encounter the same experiences and have you rolling on the floor with laughter when he tells his story. The gloomy, why - does - it-always-happen-to-me guys are usually old beyond their years while the one with a sense of humor seems to be years younger.

None of us go out of our way to seek adversity, but it is something we all have to live with from time to time. As long as this is a fact of life, it is one heckuva lot better to seek out the humor of a situation rather than compound misery by rehashing or projecting the elements of doom to even greater proportions.

I would be willing to bet anyone who has been in the armed service that there was at least one time when everything looked bleaker than an ace of spades until one guy came up with a wisecrack that not only broke the tension, but made everyone else feel a whole lot eas-

It really does not matter if you happen to be six or sixty, the folks with a sense of humor always seem to be getting much more out of life in addition to giving something to those around them. I do not think it matters whether you are on the giving or receiving end of humor. It works the same for either end.

Laugh and stay young. It is almost as good as chicken soup.
