Agnew Did Political Switch

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) --Gov. Spiro "Ted" Agnew of Maryland, the Republican vice presidential nominee, has

changed his political thinking over the years. The 49-year-old candidate switched from the Democrats to the GOP in post-World War II days. In the past six months, he has gone through a re-evalua-tion period which he changed from moderate to conservative, from Gov. Nelson A. Rockefelier to Richard M. Nixon, and







But sometime, the tiny neck of one or more of the pouche can become obstructed-for example, by waste matter, especially that containing seeds, such as peanuts, corn, baked such as peanuts, corn, beans, even tomato and cucumber seeds. called diverticulitis. In chronic cases, treatment consists of such things as applynig heat to the painful area, use of certain drugs called anispasmodics, and eating a liquld diet or one free of substances that might tend to cause bstructions.











The Vice Presidency

Nominee Richard Nixon promised that he would find a possibility for the Vice Presidential nomination who would not arouse rebellion in any section of the country, South, West, or East, he quite obviously surrendered his free dom to make any really notable choice mong the Republican headliners of the

Just how much freedom he may have urrendered was not realized until reached into his book of surprises and came up with Governor Agnew of Maryland. Although the Maryland Governor had made a perhaps invaluable contribution to the Nixon cause, with his shift from the Rockefeller camp and his breaking up of the first favorite son holding action, none of the routine speculation about possibilities for the second spot seemed to hold him to be of a calibre which ought to be mention-

he conclusion has to be that Govmor Agnew's chief attractiveness to Nixon was his geographical and deological location-on the border.

This, apparently, is the candidate's payment of his debt of gratitude to the Southern delegates who held for him against the Reagan move, and his efort to neutralize the third didacy of Governor Wallace.

And of course it may be that Mr. Nixon has seen unexpected votegetting qualities in Governor Agnew, just as the Governor, reportedly, told those who tried to sway him during the convention that he saw hitherto unrevealed vote-getting talents in Mr. Nixon.

There is, at any rate, consistency, not clash, in the make-up of the new ticket.

Voters of all persuasions will be pardoned if, this time, they pass up the ordeal of giving their serious attention to the business we have had every four years since the days of Franklin D. Roosevelt, who bears the unique distinction of having been the last President and Presidential candidate who didn't make a great verbal to-do about increasing the importance and the responsibilities of the office of Vice President

Eisenhower was going to do it with a fellow named Nixon, Kennedy was going to do it with a gentleman named Johnson, and Johnson was going to do it with a character named Humphrey. And now in the expected campaign routine, Nixon is going to do it with Agnew, and Humphrey, or McCarthy, or LBJ himself, will soon be promising to do it with somebody.

It never has happened, and it doesn't seem likely to happen. There happens to be legal and policy room for only one President at a time. When that is so, the Vice President who insists on being active can choose between serving as a domestic rubber stamp or as a foreign errand boy. Agnew, at first glance, seems routed for the domestic

But in the course of its analysis of the danger caused by the sign trouble which finds so many motorists trying to back up against 70 mile an hour traffic in order to correct some mistake in route selection, the House subcommittee inevitably encountered other information about the way we Americans punish ourselves on the roads.

Next to the stress and strain inside the driver who isn't sure he is reading the sign correctly, the subcommitte found the tension which develops in locations where freeway traffic is engaged in the merging process.

The Unwanted "Y"

The latest estimate about that extra "Y" chromosome which may be a genetic cause of crime is that it may occur in one of every 300 men, or in one third of one per cent of all males born. Previously, it had been thought that the double "Y" factor occurred only about once in every 2,000 males.

The statistic which supports the theory that the extra chromosome represents an abnormality which includes a tendency toward crime is this: although the incidence in the male population is only one third of one per cent, the incidence in prison populations has turned out to be considerably higher, as much as four per cent.

This does not mean that no one can become a criminal without that extra "Y" chromosome. A good many of us manage to make it without the "Y." Nor does it mean, on the other hand, that everybody who is born with the extra "Y" is automatically fated to wine up a practicing criminal. There may be some other chromosome, inside him, or some influence near his life, which fight off the tendency of the extra "Y." What it does mean, however, is still significant and serious. It does mean that there may be among us those unfortunate individuals who, through no fault of their own, but through the chromosomes which were already in them when they were born, are likely to combine tall bodies and blotchy skin and dull minds and aggressive behavior with an instinct toward the criminal act In such instances, society would not hold that individual responsible for his being tall, or having imperfect skin, or being slow-witted. It would still hold him ac countable for being aggressive, or for acting criminally, but it might feel required to temper and adjust its own methods for trying to deal with him. It may, some day, feed him a pill which shrinks that extra chromosome down to the vanishing point.

What is An Encyclical?

An encyclical is an open letter from the pope. Although "Humanae Vitae" (Of Human Life), the 7,500 word statement on birth control (asued last week by Pope Paul VI, was addressed to the pope's "venerable brothers and beloved sons," it is being read by people of al faiths and in all nations. The word "encyclical" is made of two Greek words: "en" which means in, and "kyklos", which means circle. These widely circulated letters technically are written to bishops in communion with the Holy See. But in 1963. Pope John XXIII acknowledged the world-wide readership of encyclicals when he ssed "Pacem in Terris" (Peace on Earth) to "all men of good will." Encyclicals gain wide attention because their teachings on faith and morals, as well as their warnings against errors in Catholics' thinking, are aimed at forming the consciences and thus the actions of the estimated 550,000,000 Ro-"tholics on issues that often affect a men.

The Catholic Church's ordained leaders have guided and corrected the beliefs and practices of its members from the time of the Apostles, in the church's view. The Epistles of St. Peter, St. James, and St. John were instructions that could be considered encyclicals. The first papal statements actually called encyclicals were written by Pope Benedict XIV, who reigned from 1740 to

More than 300 papal encyclicals have been written since that time. "Humanae Vitae" is the seventh encyclical insued by Pope Paul, who recently entered the sixth year of his reign.

One of the most important encyclicals is Pope Leo XIII's "Rerum Novarum" (Of New Things). It is a statement of social principles that affirms such ideas as a laborer's right to a just wage. Two quent encyclicals have been regarded as updated restatements of Pope Leo's ideas in "Rerum Novarum." One of those restatements, Pope John's "Mater et Magistra" (Mother and Teacher; issued in 1961) was not only the longest encyclical ever written (25,000 words) but one of the most controversial. To the pope's call for international and governmental co-operation to implement social and economic reforms, some Catholics proclaimed: "Ma-ter, Yes! Magistra, No!"

(AP)—A Piedmont Air-lines plane with 37 aboard crashed in flames while trying to land at Charlesfog-covered mountaintop airport today. First reports indicated 33 were killed with five known sur-

vivors termed "in very critical condition." Charleston Piedmont William Hanson said the plane -Flight .230-originated in Louisville, Ky., and stopped in Cincinnati before flying on to Charleston. It was due in Vir-ginia at Roanoke, Richmond and Newport News before terminating at Norfolk.

The twin-engine plane crashed into the hilltop about 50 yards before reaching the runway, skidded about 200 yards and lipped over in flames. Air National Guardsman, sta-

tioned at an armory at the airport three miles northeast of Charleston, rushed to the scene to cover the plane with firefight ng foam to prevent further fire. The plane carried a crew of three in addition to its 34 pas sengers. No one was reporte.

five-year or 50,000-mile warranties on new cars may go the route of the rumble seat with the introduction of the 1969 modeis.

If you do get a warranty it might cost extra. And it may have a deductible feature, like auto insurance.

Insiders report the automakers would like to get rid of these warranties altogether. Some be-lieve they'll do just that. If the 5-50,000 warranty on power trains goes by the boards, the automakers would

extend the 24-month or 24,000mile guarantee that applies to the rest of the car to the power train-the engine, transmission, drive shaft, wheels and bear-

Figuring in the debate on the 5-50,000 elimination is the fear that this, coupled with higher prices for the cars, might set off a loud howl by critics, particu-larly those in Congress. General Motors, Ford, Chrys-

ler and American Motors refuse any comment regarding elimi-nation of the 5-50,000 warranty or a rise in prices, except to say they will announce their decisions when new models are introduced in early September. Customers complain of percheck-ups necessary to keep the 5-50,000 guarantee in

force, and of having to get cer-tificates of service should they get a check-up at a service sta-

tion instead of a dealer. Dealers complain check-ups cause jams in their service departments, inundate them with paper work and, additionally, that they're not always fully compensated by the companies for required repairs. On its 1965 models, Chrysler

started the 5-year or 50,000-mile guarantee, covering only the en-gine, transmission and drive With advent of 1967 models,

everyone had matched the original and had gone on to extend power-train coverage to the suspension system, water pump, steering gear and linkage, wheels and wheel bearings. As late as 1950, the industry's

warranty was for 90 days or 4,000 miles, whichever came earlier. This applied to the whole vehicle, Ford came up in 1961 with a

24-month or 24,000-mile guaran-tee on Lincoln Continentals, and made this standard on all Ford's 1963 models. Chrysler and GM went to a 12-month or 12,000-mile warranty in 1961, then Chrysler rocked the industry in 1963 by introduc-

ing the 5-year or 50,000-mile warranty on the power train and continuing its 12-12,000 on the rest of the car. In 1967 Chrysler added the 24-month or

rest of the car. American motors and GM joined Ford in extending to the 24-24,000 coverage in 1903. These

three got to the 5-year or 50,000mile power-train warranty on 1967 models, continuing the 24-24,000 warranty on other components. Originally a vehicle was cov

ered until it was 5 years old or had gone 50,000 miles, regardless of the number of owners. But a cutback on this began with the introduction of 1968 models. Only the original owners of 1968s are covered for free. A second owner must pay a\$25 fee to get whatever is le of the 5-year or 50,000-mile guarantee, and in addition second owners of Chrysler and Ford cars must pay the first \$25 cost of any power-train repairs under the extended coverage. GM and American Motor adopted the \$25 deductible fea ture. Second owners of AMC cars may extend whatever in left of the 24-24,000 guarantee by paying a \$2 fee, and second and even third GM owners may do

the same. Chrysler automatically tended the 24-24,000 warranty to cover second owners, but it cuts off there. Ford dealers may charge up to \$15 as an inspection and extension fee if a second-owner applies within days or 1,000 miles.
