### Police Arrest 100 Hunt For Killer

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain (AP)—More than 100 people, including 15 priests, have been arrested by police searching for the killer of a local police chief, it was reported today.

Official reports indicate that many of those arrested will be sent to other parts of Spain. The police chief, Meliton Hernandez Gonzalez, was shot Aug. 2. He had a longtime foe of the Basque separatist organization ETA.

ETA wants to make a separate country of three north Spanish provinces.

### Smith Regime Ruled Legal

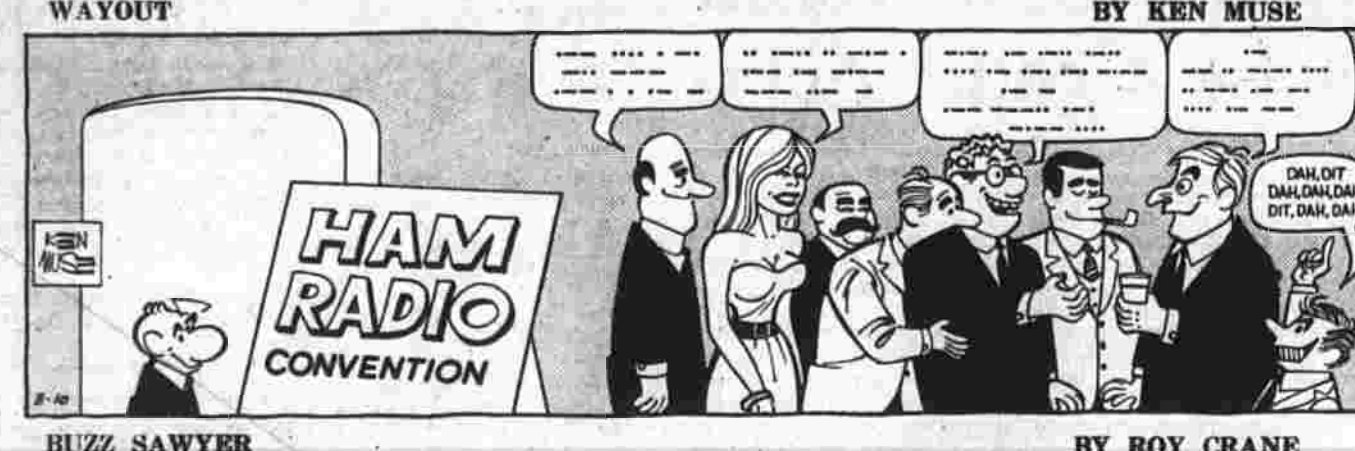

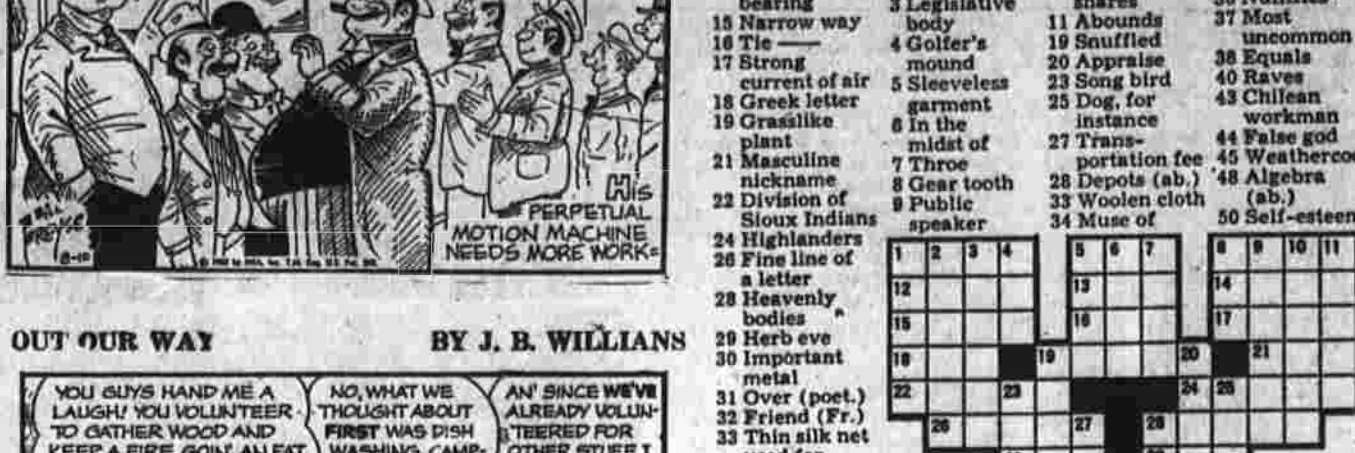

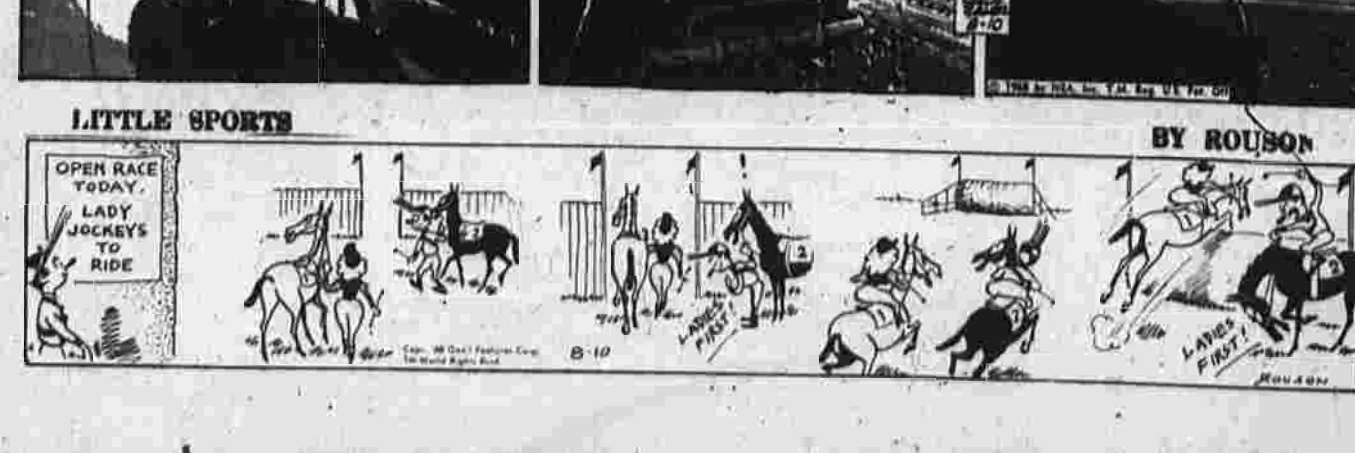

men then swept the village and ran into an estimated 100 Viet Cong troops in a complex of tunnels and bunkers.

Sporadic fighting continued through today. Sixteen Viet Cong were killed and 47 captured. Allied casualties were listed as light. The tunnel complex also yielded tons of rice, flour, medical supplies, 21 rockets and other weapons.

Maj. Gen. Keith Ware, commander of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division, awarded Bronze Star medals for valor on the scene to a South Vietnamese battalion commander and a South Vietnamese platoon leader.

In other actions in Saigon's suburbs, headquarters reported:
-U.S. Army helicopters

raided a band of 30 to 40 enemy troops about four miles north of Saigon. Crewmen reported eight kills.

-South Vietnamese fighter-bombers strafed suspected enemy buildup areas northwest of Saigon and troops sweeping the area later reported finding 35 enemy bodies and two destroyed antiaircraft positions.

-Enemy forces shelled a South Vietnamese infantry battalion 25 miles northwest of Saigon and several hours later launched a ground attack that was repulsed. Military spokesmen claimed three enemy dead, while government losses were put at one dead and five wounded.

-U.S. B52s continued hammering suspected enemy troop concentrations, camps and storage hideouts with four more strikes Friday and today on three sides of Saigon. The closest raid was 85 miles northwest of the capital. U.S. infantrymen reported finding 11 enemy bodies after sweeping an area attacked by fighter-bombers four miles from Cambodia.

Further north, between the frontier center of Gio Linh and the South China Sea, South Vietnamese troops reported killing 25 enemy Friday at the scene of a government victory the day before.

5 Die, 2 Hurt In Crash of NATO Copter

IZMIR, Turkey (AP) — Three American airmen and two Turks died and two American officers were injured seriously in a helicopter crash near here, police reported today.

The accident occurred at Mugla, 150 miles southeast of this Aegean port city Friday night. Police sources gave this account:

A North Atlantic Treaty Organization helicopter, carrying an injured Turkish mayor from a hospital in Fethiye, 300 miles southeast of Izmir, to a hospital here, crashed and burned after developing engine trouble.

The helicopter carried five American airmen and a Turkish army officer in addition to Mayor Selim Gunday, reported shot in a feud and in serious condition.

An American captain and two sergeants as well as the mayor and the Turkish army officer died in the crash. Police said an American colonel and major suffered serious injuries and were hospitalized.

The identities of the American and Turkish military victims were withheld pending notification of relatives.

## Death on TV Isn't Lifelike

WASHINGTON — Violence in one of those subjects that has occupied the television industry

since its birth. The topic has come up again, following the violent deaths of national leaders and this time the concern over violence has reached a new level of intensity.

Each of the television networks has issued a public statement, pointing out that work is being done with producers to reduce the amount of violence in television. With backing from the researchers, and scholars, network presidents cite the difficulty of establishing a direct cause and effect relationship between TV violence and real life acts of violence.

What is not mentioned—and for good reason—is the widely held belief in television that a high incidence of deaths and fights in a program usually leads to a high audience rating.

And since advertisers like high ratings, the current soft pleadings are likely to be, at best, merely temporary.

We do not know just what television is doing to our children. A Senate committee investigation into this subject has been going on for 15 years, under three different chairmen. The nation's best psychiatrists, sociologists and psychologists have appeared before the committees and several lengthy, dull reports have been published.

We know, in scientific terms, no more in 1968 than we knew when the Senate began investigating in 1953.

Networks and stations did react, most cautiously, to the public condemnation of televised violence that has followed the deaths of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Sen Robert F. Kennedy. War movies were postponed in favor of comedies. Re-run episodes of cops-and-robbers that were full of guns, knives and fists were put in storage and replaced with calmer stories.

These are merely delaying tactics and few broadcasters are willing to write off investments in such program material. Instructions might be given to editors, telling them to delete the most violent scenes.

In a burst of self-righteousness, the Radio Board of Directors of the National Association of Broadcasters met in solemn session recently and decided to prohibit advertising for mail order firearms and ammunition. The TV code was amended in similar fashion last January.
