mountains, and to claim certain passionate feelings about his country and our country, And if, when we listen to him, we find that he has somehow reached into us and made us part of his memory and his feeling and his dreaming, that means he is scoring and formidable as an orator, as a candidate, and as a potential leader of a nation. There was, then, much that was "new" about this candidate as he opened his

second try for the Presidency. His speech, his delivery, his appearance, his nood offered definite pluses over anything he had previously achieved in his long political career. Any commentary on the acceptance

speech would be less than candid if it reglected to note that, in the midst of all this newness, there were one or two exposures of old shadows.

We don't know whether it would have been possible for any Republican candidate, standing in such a spot, to resist making irresponsible use of the Pueblo incident. Perhaps not. But we think it was unnecessary, and regrettable, for the candidate to make a speclist target of an Attorney General who has seemed an especially fine and intelligent public servant. And the "new" Nixon needs to guard himself against the possibility that his reliance upon and exploitation of the "law and order" issue do not tempt him into careless ex-

posures of the "old" Nixon. The hope, for Mr. Nixon, for the Republican party, and for the nation, must be that the talents and abilities and moods which represent the greater power and the greater balance which he has developed in his maturity continue to grow and expound until they leave no room for those more negative propensities which have been so costly to him in the political past.

The country has not yet accepted the idea that there really is a "new" Nixon. And of course there is not, really. But it has been alerted to the fact that Mr. Nixon is making a new kind of try, with enfranced personal skills and powers, and perhaps better restraints as well. And the country will, by the time it finds itself confronted with the Democratic alternative, be giving Mr. Nixon his open, equal chance at victory in November. He has earned that chance, by daring to try to rise out of his defents, by being able to make up his own mind to run, by being skilled enough in the arts and drudgeries of politics to capture a convention. How well he makes out is likely to depend upon how well he keeps his eye on that mountain, how well he resists the almost certainly recurrent temptation to be the savage, irresponsible prosecutor. We don't believe there was a single viewer who did not find himself, at some stage in the proceedings at Minmi Beach, fuming mad at one or another or at all of the network floor and corridor and platform operatives. But it was not, of course, entirely their fault. Their networks had decided to be on, full time, for the service of the public. Being on full time, they had to do something to pass and fill the time. In that situation, it was their poor luck to run into a very dull convention, action-wise, in which there were very few genuine happenings of any kirsi. The alightest possibility of anything real happening anywhere was enough to draw all the operatives to the same spot, like flies to a drop of syrup, but nothing ever

Possibly one reason nothing ever happened was that the microphones leaped down the throat of it before it got a chance really to happen. Possibly there were various changes in operation of man and cameras, like a little more relaxation, a little more contentment with the actual procedures on the platform itself, which would have proved beneficial. But most of the complaints, and the reasons for complaint, would have disappeared if this had been a convention which was producing some real news as it went along. Then the nerve and the insulting behavior might have been heroes in the service of the public eager to be with each significant piece of the action.

### Male And Or Female

It's getting harder than ever these days to tell the girls from the boys, what with the long hair and the exotic clothes, the jewelry, and other accessories. And now comes a new decree from the Equal Employment Op-portunity Commission which is designed to blur the distinctions even more.

Starting Dec. 1, newspapers will be forbidden to designate job opportunities in the classified ad columns under the listings "Male" and "Female," This, the commission says, violates the 1964 Civil Rights law because it discriminates on the basis of sex. The alternate is simply listing the opportunities by job classification without reference to male

The intent of the Civil Rights Law is just and proper; The Record respects the end, but the means, as it applies to classified advertising, borders on the ab-surd and the impractical. There are some occupations which, by their nature, are suited to one sex and not to another Men do not make good actresses, but they do all right as nurses - on the men's ward. Women do not do well as foundry workers or fire fighters or night watchmen, but there is no reason why they cannot be accountants, draftsmen,

In the long run, custom and personal ability will decide whether a man or a woman will get the job. This is apparently the basis of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's thinking. The Commission's new ruling will place the burden on the employer; it will, in a measure, diminish the usefulness of the classified ad section, to the extent that anyone looking for a job will have to screen all the listings instead of finding them separated for him into job listings suitable to males and

The Record has been in agreement with the spirt of the Civil Rights Law; it has listed many job classifications as "Male or Female." When the new regulation goes into effect in December. The Record will be happy to comply with whatever is required. It does seem, that eliminating classification of the job listings by sex imposes an unnecessary inconvenience upon the job hunter without affording him any additional protection, since the decision of whether to hire or not to hire lies with the employer.

One thing the new regulation does is to certify the usefulness of classified ads, not only to employers and job hunters, but also to anyone who wants to buy a car, sell a horse, rent an apartment, or give away a litter of kittens. All in all, classified ads serve so many purposes and fill so many needs, that we hate to see their usefulness diminished, particularly when there is no issue legality or discrimination involved.

Each of the television networks has issued a public state-ment, pointing out that work is z: being done with producers to reduce the amount of violence in television. With backing from the researchers, and scholars, network presidents cite the difficulty of establishing a direct cause and effect relationship between TV violence and real life acts of violence.

What is not mentionedfor good reason—is the widely held belief in television that a high incidence of deaths and fights in a program usually leads to a high audience rating.

And since advertisers like high ratings, the current soft pleadings are likely to be, at best, merely temporary.

We do not know just what television is doing to our children. A Senate committee investigation into this subject has been going on for 15 years, under three different chairman. The nation's best psychiatrists, sociologists and psychologists have appeared before the committees and several lengthy, dull re-ports have been published. We know, in scientific terms,

no more in 1968 than we knew when the Senate began investi-

Networks and stations did react, most cautiously, to the public condemnation of televis violence that has followed the deaths of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Sen Robert F. Kennedy. War movies were postponed in favor of comedies. Re-rum episodes of cops-and-robbers that were full of guns, linives and fists were put in storage and replaced with calmer stories.

These are merely delaying tactics and few broadcasters are willing to write off investments in such program mate-

ments in such program material. Instructions might be given to editors, telling them to delete the most violent scenes.

(In a burst of self-rightcousness, the Radio Board of Directors of the National Association of Broadcasters met in solemn session recently and decided to prohibit advertising for mail order firearms and ammuni-tion. The TV code was amend-ed in similar fashion last Januery.
