When they get to those polls, however, the chances are that they will find their choices generally restricted to candidates who have made a point of not making any single special point too prominent in their own campaigning. And the truth about the voters, too,

will be that they will actually feel more omfortable voting for some candidate who has been careful not to make any very special points at all than they would feel voting for some candidate who had shown himself motivated by and concenrating upon one single argument and

This wariness of the voter of the man who has given himself to a single issue can exist even if the issue the candidate has specialized in is the issue closest to the voter's own heart.

In the acid test, even the voters may dun the candidate who is too honest, too forthright, in favor of the candidate who takes pains to be something of all things to all men. The sad practice—but perhaps, in the end, a wise practice s that we sometimes tend to choose the man who can avoid an lame over the man who insists on meeting it head-on.

The actual truth about us as voters s probably this: that we like to have it both ways. We want to believe we are voting for an individual who is honest and courageous and who can be depended upon to give the right answers o specific fisues. But we have a endency to be afraid of candidates who look and speak and act as if they might sctually believe in any particular thing or principle so strongly they would ever trap themselves and us in any desperation commitment to it. It could be, one sees, that the can
