Device Tells

DENVER (AP) — A doctor prescribes daily medication for a patient who is going home after a stay in a hospital.

It is up to the patient to take it.

But there's many a slip between the physician's writing out a prescription and the patient's actually remembering to take his medicine every day as he should.





End Of An Exile? plans to permit the natives of the Pacific atoll of Bikini to return, within a year or two, to the homes from which they were compulsorily evacuated 22 years ago in order to clear the way for America's post-war testing of the nuclear weapons it had already used so successfully on Hiroshima and Naga-

Whatever evil or necessity there may have been in this country's decision to continue testing the weapon on which it then held a monopoly, there was always a special added weight on the American conscience for the callous way in which our government moved into territory it had just freed from the colonialism and imperialism of Japan and abruptly appropriated the homes and territory of its native population and forcibly removed that population to another island.

Now, 22 years later, and 10 years after the last nuclear test we conducted at Bikini, we are planning to give the natives -- there are some 500 people now living on the island of Kili who regard Bikini as their traditional home -an opportunity to return.

There are quite a few things for us to o before we can escort the natives back. The old village site will have to be covered with a layer of coral rock, to be safe against possible radiation there. The coconut crabs on the island will have to be eliminated, because the natives like to eat them and they have had an unfortunate capacity for absorbing atrontium-90. Some radioactive scrap metal lying around will have to be removed. We will have to set up a continual monitoring system of both the ishand and the people, "to assure that they do not, in some unforeseen way, accumuinto a greater radiation dose than pre-

And, in addition to all such precaution against the potential death left lurking on the island, our government is going to have to undertake an extensive clearing and planting program in order to restore the island, on which vegetation has grown wild during its 22 year holiday, to a state of cultivation suitable to sustain human life.

Do these people really care about this opportunity? Did they really mind being noved around? Why couldn't they live just as well on their new island of Kili? What Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall reported to the President, in his nemorandum on the situation, is that the Bikint people "have never adjusted. to Kill, which is small and has no lagoon, and have retained an intensive sire to return to Bikint."

To be reminded that these lowly nalives are espable of such homesickness ouches the American emotion and the merican conscience. We are likely to wind up making quite a display of our sindness, our solicitude, our generosity, and our own pleasure in putting these sople back on their own island.

Possibly this debt will plague Nixon, if he is elected, and do something to deform his administration. But concelvably, too, Nixon, if he weathers the handicap of Thurmond's blessing during the campaign itself, will prove capable of being whatever kind of President he is likely to be in spite of any claim Thurmond may think he has on him. Lincoln, on his way to nomination, had crucial, "king-making" assistance from ideological fanatics and very, very practical politicians, and never quite escaped all embarrassment from their efforts to govern him after he had been elected. But the thing remembered about Lin-coln, obviously, is not that part of his

political history. Closer to our times, the most spectacular piece of "king-making" was that accomplished by a most unpleasant character who threw a presidential nomination to Franklin D. Roosevelt in return for the privilege of naming his vice presidential running mate.

But, although William Randolph Hearst may have thought he had won himself an administration at Washington, actual developments found that he and his newspapers were soon the bitterest challengers and critics of the actions and policies of the man they had helped nominate. It was not Hearst, the king-maker, who shaped the character of the Roosevelt administration he had made possible, or who is remembered in history for what that administration

The suggestion is -if it can be made without advancing any premature claim about any present candidacy -that some rather highly admired Presidents have had some rather sordid help on their way to the White House. No one can say that is good. But it may not be as bad as the immediate emotional reaction to the perhaps momentary prominence of Strom Thurmond might sug-






