

Coventry Special Town Meeting Slated for Tuesday

A special town meeting has been set for Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the High School to act on several items that have cropped up during the summer before the Board of Selectmen.

The first item to be considered is increasing the amount of the town meeting from 11:30-1:30 to 10:30-12:30. This change will allow the meeting to be held in a different way. On Sept. 4 only Grades 5 and 6 will report, and on Sept. 5, only Grades 7 and 8 will report.

Parents of kindergarten children will receive letters next week informing them of their child's kindergarten assignment. Also, parents who have not yet registered their children are asked to do so on the week of Aug. 26. Schools will be open from 9-3 on those days for that purpose.

Finally, two items recommended by the Board of Finance will be brought up for approval. These are the purchase of the 5000 sq. ft. property at a cost not to exceed \$10,000, and purchase of a bulldozer at a cost not to exceed \$10,000.

The 5000 sq. ft. property, in the north end, is about 35 acres and no definite use is being recommended for it. Purchase of a bulldozer will enable the town to comply more readily with state laws concerning dumps. The Coventry dump is presently an "open" one, and must be converted to sanitary land fill operation. A bulldozer will ease the way toward the conversion.

Selectmen have appointed Mrs. David Up to the Board of Health to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. Raymond Vose, who has accepted state employment.

Arthur Vose and Robert Greenleaf have been approved as consultants in the Pine Lake Shore development.

Selectmen have also accepted a return to the town of \$100 from the American Legion. This amount represents an unrequited balance from Memorial Day parade expenses.

School Opening Schedule
The Board of Education, meeting Thursday night, approved the schedule for school opening which will be Wednesday, Sept. 4. Bus routes will be released shortly.

Coventry High School buses will be 7:45 a.m.-2 p.m., and Coventry Middle School buses only Grades 5-8.

Hebron Russell Anderson Resigns From Board of Finance

The Hebron Board of Finance has received and accepted with regret the resignation of Russell Anderson from the Board. Anderson's employment made meeting attendance impossible and in his letter he expressed the feeling that anyone on such a board should attend the meetings. His four-year term will have expired in October of 1969.

The board voted to send a letter to the Democratic Town Committee informing it of the vacancy and requesting three names be submitted for selection of a board member to fill the seat.

Finance Chairman A. Herby With noted that he had received a call from Mrs. Martha Potts, chairman of the Hebron Board of Education, advising the Board of Finance of the decision to provide kindergarten non-time transportation. She told With that the Board of Education felt that the budget could be financed from the surplus in the teachers' salary fund.

Several teachers have resigned and have been replaced by teachers on lower salary schedule than was originally figured prior to budget time.

The Board of Finance authorized the payment of \$500 to auditor Thomas McGarry for interim auditing work done by him during the year ending June 30.

Tolland Town to Get \$7,723 in Grants To Run Reading Program

Tolland will receive a total of \$7,723 in state and federal grants to be used in continuing the teacher aid reading program for new graduates at the Meadowbrook School.

The grants will cover the 1968-69 school year, according to Superintendent Robert Branton, and will permit continuation of the program at the present level of three teacher aides for a total of 48 children.

The grants include \$4,823 in state aid under Public Act 85, and \$2,900 in Federal Title I funds under Public Act 85-10. The federal funds include a grant cut, because of the cutting of Title I funds by the U.S. House of Representatives.

Tolland's share of Title I funds last year was \$4,843. The amount of the grants was announced yesterday by Branton, after he met with representatives of the State Department of Education.

Plans to increase the program by an additional aide were shelved. The current program was maintained despite the cut in federal funds by incorporating two separate programs into one.

Car Crushed, Driver Killed

FAIRFIELD (AP) — A speeding car was crushed beneath an overturned tractor-trailer early today on the Connecticut Turnpike, killing the driver.

State police identified the dead man as Robert Gerchick, 34, of Trumbull. It took about 90 hours to remove his body from the wreckage, state police said.

Gerchick's car went out of control about 1 a.m. while heading eastbound on the well-slicked Turnpike, and skidded from the left lane into a guard rail on the right side of the divided highway.

The driver of the tractor trailer, also eastbound, slammed on his brakes in an attempt to avoid hitting the car, but the huge vehicle jackknifed and overturned on top of Gerchick's car, state police said.

A crane was needed to right the truck before the right was made to rescue Gerchick. The truckdriver was identified as William Davis of Bloomfield. State police said he was not charged in connection with the accident.

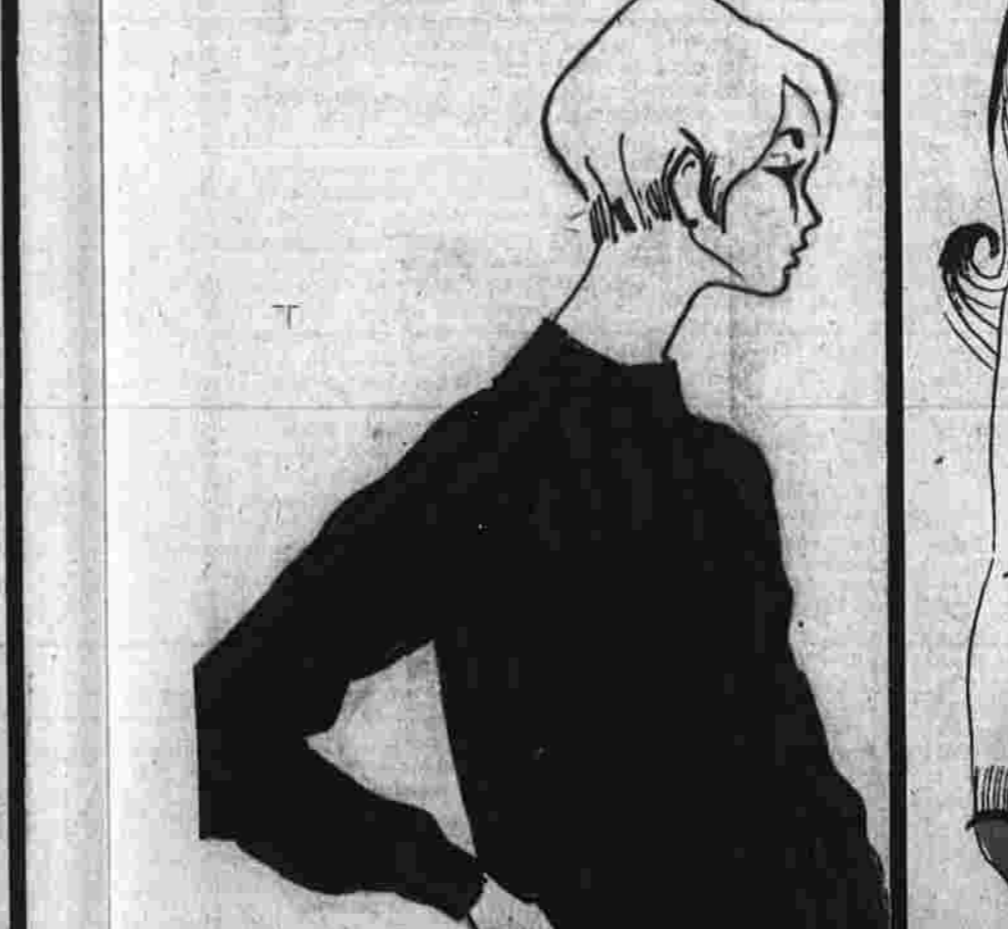

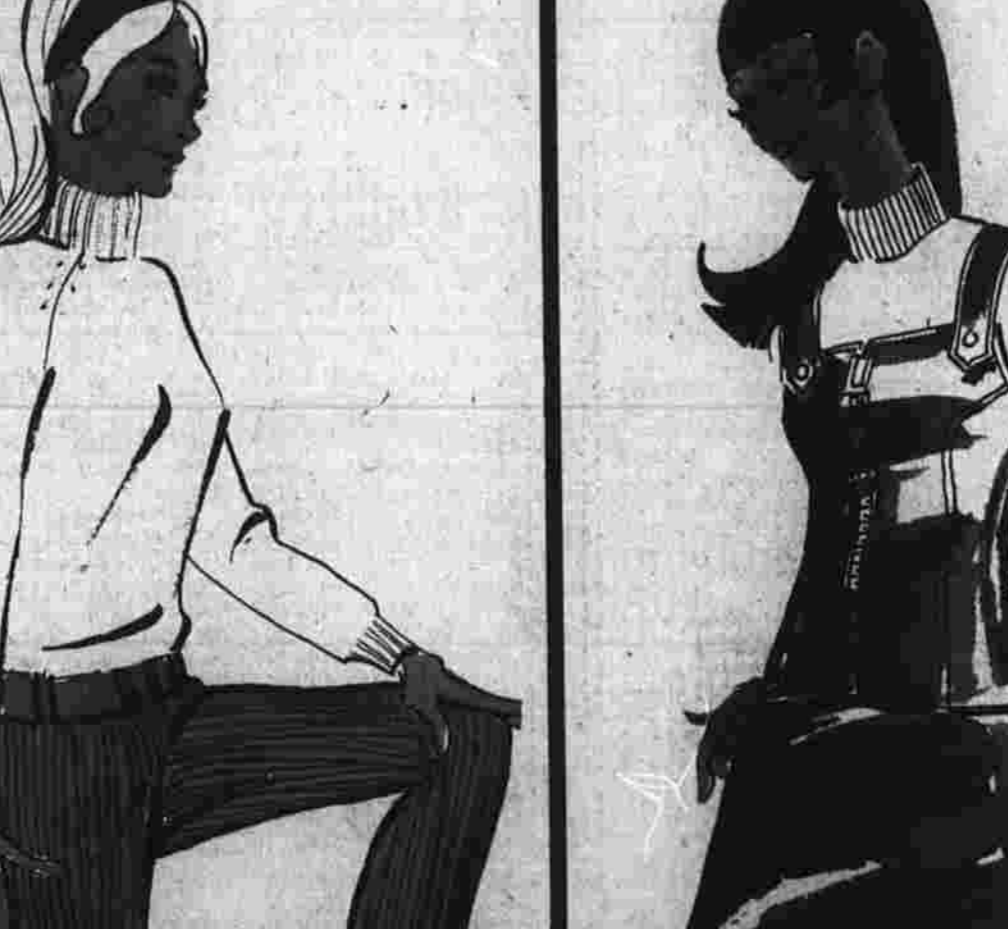
