### World's Catholics Debate

### **Reactions Vary to Encyclical**

By GOERGE W. CORNELL AP Religion Writer NEW YORK (AP)-Bishops of the Roman Catholic Church around the world are taking varied positions ranging from firm crackdowns to toleration toward the widespread opposi-tion to Pope Paul's encyclical

barring contraception. Generally, both in this coun-try and abroad, the predomi-nant tendency seemed to be to leave the door open to dissent. In scattered cases, in Austra-lia, Ireland, Great Britain and the United States, some priests were reported suspended from priestly functions or removed from their posts for challenging the encyclical.

the encyclical. A showdown over the issue appeared to be building up in this country between Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle of Washing-ton, D.C., who has indicated he may act against 52 priests less they repudiate their

priests and aimed at all Cathol-ics in the jurisdiction, Cardinal O'Boyle said Wednesday that dissent from the encyclical is "erroneous, scandalous and of-fensive to faithful Catholics." He said acceptance of the pa-pal ruling represents true free-dom of conscience in that" we are responsible for forming a right conscience." Mostly, however, American babors have not moved to cut

bishops have not moved to cut off the discussion. In Western Europe, German and Belgium bishops have up-held the rights of individual con-science on the matter.

The Russians have built clearly under stood national purposes into a form of demanded and go them. Political leadership has never been in doubt in the mother country, although this is diluted in the satellites. But ethical leadership can also come from the top and that leadership may be good, as in the case of President Kennedy, or totally disastrous, as with Hitler and Stalin. Possibly the most important accompaniment of growth in power has been the loss or suppression power has been the loss of suppression of faith in a higher power than man, in the transcendent, and just when it is needed most. It is being replaced by materialistic determinism, a growing be-lief in the meaninglessness of life, or, at best, an ethical humanism, in con-trast to the firm principles on which our Constitution was written. Our leaders have believed in faith while much of have believed in faith while much of the rest of the world has not. The question the peoples of the world must answer is who is right. Is materialistic determinism enough?

Time and science have brought great change. The association between religion and daily practice has almost vanished and along with it ethical behavior. I am sorry to say this has also occurred in medicine. John Foster Dulles said, "Great material power is dangerous in an age of materialism. It is not dangerous in an age of spiritualism." Do we have failh that the words of Christ will prevail over those of Marx? Will the loss of spiritual values be compentated by the increase in the material benefits capitalism can supply? Must we apply ever greater military force to per-suade the world of the superiority of a way of life? These questions, linked to a faith in an ultimate purpose, will be put to the test in the immediate future. The material aspects of life renew nselves yearly and mankind shows no signs of stopping propagation. Is the spirit of Easter dead? Will the present agnostic and atheistic trends ultimately make life seem pointless and so urge man to press the button for total destruc-

tion out of sheer despair? We must be careful not to say no glibly. Who can have witnessed the mass destruction consummated by Hitler's Germany without wondering whether at the end Hitler would fot have pressed the button out of hatred for his failures or out of madness? Without any good reason, I believe that man will, at great cost of suffering and waste, patiently sift out those things that will ultimately build a better world. Discovery will ac-celerate and be used to remake his encelerate and be used to remarks ms en-vironment. Once man perceives that a life of material abundance can be pur-poseless and meaningless, he will under-stand the man-made distortions of idealistically conceived systems of gov-ernment such as democracy and comnumism. Only then can he exploit his fullest capacities as a unique, highly integrated organism, living in and with the earthly and the spiritual. No sys-tem that leaves out pieces of this total interrelated system of man and his en-vironment can ultimately prevail. Man vironment can ultimately prevail. Man is both material and immaterial, as all physicians must know. It is to test this belief that man must remain free from world hegemony in which one political stem is forcibly imposed. One they measured at three microgauss, a second at 10 and a third at 20 microgauss, which is 20-millionths of a gauss. While these measurements are no more than one fifty-thou-candith of what the sarth's masandth of what the earth's magnetic field is, they serve to confirm the theory that stars form from collapsing clouds of hydro-gen gas. If the interstellar fields were any weaker, the hydrogen might wander in a never-ending spiral. If any stronger, the gas would be unable to collapse

and come together. The new measurements also tend to explain how cosmic rays arrive in the earth's atmosphere from distant stars. If the galatic field were weaker than the ones just measured, it would not be nough to accelerate cosmic rays fast enough to reach the Earth. The same findings confirm how radio waves arrive at Earth from distant stars.
