The latest thing we are doing with citrus trees is to spray them with chemicals which stimulate the trees toward their own production of a hormone-like gas called ethylene which loosens the fruit on the tree.

On a tree which has been properly sprayed, the amount of pull to free the citrus from the stem has been decreased from 20 pounds to 1 pound.

At the 1 pound level, a mere wind machine might be enough to harvest a whole grove. But somehow, instead of seeming a

miraculous piece of progress, this latest development seems to be the thing that is too much. It is one more process added to the previous business of plowing and planting and culturing and pruning and fertilizing and spraying and spraying and spraying followed by the intricate processes of packaging and marketing. All of this now normally results in the concentration of many fruits from the grove into a relatively small container of frozen juice. Why not go all the way, and proceed to the chemical manufacture of the synthetic citrus pill, without bothering with soil, seedlings, prunings, sprayings, harvestings, processings, packagings and left-over garbage and package-refuse? Why so much trouble, expense and waste over an illusion
