

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The U.S And The U.N. "America Downgrades The United Na-" read an editorial page caption in the New York Times the other day. The comment was by James P. Brown, a member of the editorial board of the Times, and it opened as follows:

"An important State Department oficial one day last winter delivered a 40minute lecture to a large group of newsmen and others on the outlook for United States foreign policy. He did not once mention the United Nations, albough every American President since Harry Truman has periodically paid lipservice to the world organization as 'the world's last best hope for peace, or words to that effect.

"The revealing omission," Mr. Brown ontinued, "was just one indication of growing disenchantment with the nited Nations in Washington and of an screasing tendency of the United States Povernment to bypass the world body pursuit of its international interests. he most recent example of the low estate to which the United Nations has aken in Washington's eyes was the abrupt resignation of Ambassador George Ball last week, just as the General Assembly convened, and his replacement by a relatively little-known newspaper editor with no diplomatic ex-

One can indeed take that point as perseps the low point in the official American handling of the United Nations, as an organization, as an opportunity. Looking back to the high point of America's relationship with the world rganization, that undoubtedly was atned in the autumn of 1956, when Pres ident Dwight Eisenhower made the hoice that he would honor United Nations law over and above our loyalty to our allies Britain and France, Then United States diplomacy in the United

Nations, sumisted by the efforts of Canada's Lester Pearson, and by a vast najority of all the other nations, exaltd the UN law and the UN presence over the action and intention of two powerful members who had decided to ake law into their own hands. That was the greatest gift the United

States had made to the United Nations since it played its original role in its founding. It was also the greatest stroke in favor of world law and world survival United States policy had ever achieved Such a high point has never since been Instead, there has been a downward

slide in United States regard and use for the United Nations.

The downward slide began with the official speeches and the official mien of the late John F. Kennedy. He, in his messages on the State of the Union, reduced the United Nations to an adjunct to American policy, and he, in his dealings with the major world problems of the day, including the cold war, behaved as if he were the young champion of the right and good, riding out of Camelot to slay personally the dragons of the world. It never occurred to him that the greatest distinction this country might attain would be that of making itself first of all the nations of the work ther than keeping it, you do not need in its service and allegiance to the law and the purpose of the United Nations. President Kennedy's performance office was so magnetizing that few peo-

ple really noticed that one of the things it had done was to elbow the United Nations out of the American policy picture. The full extent of our falling away from the United Nations did not appear until, under President Johnson, we found ourselves sinking deeper into a war in Vietnam in a situation we ourselves had never chosen to push into the United Nations sphere, as we had helped push the Buez war, or the trouble in the Congo. Nothing has really changed since then except that we have built up the danger and yet, at the same time, somehow managed to lose some of the fright or sanity or combination of the two which compelled us to create the UN in 1945. We ought to be frightened, or full of resolution. It would be an ideal situation to have our candidates for the Presidency rivaling one another in the serious intensity of their realization that there is very little choice about how to run this world if we want to keep it running. Democracy Tired Of Democracy The cradle of democracy, where not only the word but the principle originated, has just held a referendum. In that referendum the result seemed a very strange thing for a democracy. The people of Greece were voting on the adoption of a new constitution, and the vote they cast was something in the neighborhood of 97 per cent yes. Such a statistic is in itself suspect.

Add to the statistic the standard analysis of the proposed new constitution, which says it represents a marked narrowing down of the limits of individual liberties and freedoms for the people of Greece as individuals, and you approach a verdict that the election must have been some kind of totalitarian farce. What kind of a democratic vote is it which comes out almost unanimous against the traditional democratic

But perhaps, before we Americans level any judgment against the authenticity and the fairness of the Greek referendum, we should await our own demonstration at the polls next month. There will be at least one channel of

voting then which will offer the citizens of this democracy -itself a kind of cradle for large nation democratic govermnent, and often hailed as the longest-lived experiment in truly democratic self government -a chance to vote against many of the traditional demoeratic freedoms and individual rights. They will, those Americans who find heir way to the Wallace lever, be voting for stricter controls of American living not because they want such controls to be applied to themselves, but because they think there are several million other Americans who ought to be put into some kind of straitjacket for the health and safety of the entire m-

There will be people seeking the Walsick, as the people of Greece may also have become sick, of the combination of feebleness, permissiveness and excess which democracy begins to exhibit when it is a little bit sick, and lacking in positive goals and endeavors, itself.

The cure is not authoritarianism, either in Greece or in this country. The cure is to use the privileges and powers of the democratic process in a positive therapy -to get people so united and interested in positive goals they snap out of their negative demoralizations. But the mystery of how such a therapy comes to pass lies deep in the nature of human society. Men of small imagination and small' patience reach and vote for the straitjacket, as if they had come to hate the very idea of freedoms which can be troublesome. Before we scorn the voting record of the Greeks we had better watch our own returns

The purpose of the survey was to locate people unaffiliated with a church and urge them to join a church. The program was undertaken by the Talcottville Congregational Church in conjunction with the Connecticut State Conference of the

cut State Conference of the United Church of Christ.

Two types of conclusions were drawn from the survey itself, one having to do with figures and the other with the personal observations of Miss Akins.

Approximately 1,200 homes were visited and Miss Akins astlimated that of these 85 to 90 per cent were Catholic, with 50 per cent of these belonging to the Sacred Heart Church in Vernon. The majority of Protestant families attended either the Wapping Community Church or the Vernon Congregational Church.

Miss Akins was usually given a first impression that the family members were all avid church goers, but when questioned about church activities a lack of participation became apparent, and often even the lack of a specific church.

The greatest impact of these visits, however, was the realization that loneliness predominates in a large number of lives. Along with the loneliness Miss Akins noted a lack of concern for others in the immediate neighborhood. If there had been a recent death neighbors didn't seem to know about it. She found older people isolated in small groups in mostly older homes, and they were eager to visit, to talk with anyone.
