### Dry Weather Threat to River Levels

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) -Continuing dry weather hreatens to force the level of rivers and streams farther below normal, the U.S. River Forecast center predicts. The seven Northeast states covered by the center generally measured precipitation totals September one-half inch to inches below the average. The driest areas were Rhode Island, eastern Massachusetts, most of Maine and the Albany,

The St. John River in northern Maine was at record low levels for the third straight month, and prospects for the New York-New England region were for more dry weather in October, the forecast center

Some places wished for less rain in September, however. Ashfield, Mass., for example, had 5.56 inches during the month, and precipitation was near or above normal in an area extending from western Massachusetts through southern Vermont into central New

The end of September arrived with the New York City reservoir system at 75 per cent of capacity, the Albany system at 82 per cent and Connecticut reservoirs at 88 per cent of

### The Cattle Will Get Help

Two reports in the same day's news illustrate, we think, the perverse and almost inexplicable way we human beings address ourselves better to some problems than to others. One of the news reports comes from the International Committee of the Red

Cross at Geneva, and it says that from 8,000 to 10,000 human beings are dying every day in Biafra, the rebellious re gion of Nigeria, and that the situation gets worse every day. One trouble in Biafra is not merely the existence of a civil war in progress, but the suspicious refusal of both sides of the civil war to agree on procedures by which even he innocent children can be given food. The other news report comes from

the Indian state of Nepal, and says tha two million cattle in that country face slaughter or starvation this winter because the Chinese Communists, across the border, have ended the traditional system by which cattle on either side of the border have been allowed, during the winter, to graze where the food happens to be. The Chinese Communists seem to be engaged in a steady, coneistent program of diminishing contacts across the Tibetan border, perhaps because China is pushing a strategic buildup of its military position in the region. These are the two situations in the news. We now have a wager to make

We will wager that the odds for survival among the 2,000,000 cattle of the Tibetan borderland are much higher than they are for the 8,000 to 10,000 people scheduled to die daily in Biafra. luman beings will somehow manage o do a much better job saving their

This is a sure kind of bet, because it reflects what seems to be a consistent habit and potentiality of human nature. We can be kinder to animals than we are to each other. We can treasure prop erty more than people.

Part of this has a natural not uncreditable explanation. We reason that animals are not responsible for their own plight, and also that they are incapable of rescuing themselves. Therefore, compassion and resolve and action come easily. We have a little more trouble conceiving of human beings being entirely without either blame or recourse and this leads to a little less clarity in our compassion, a little less resolution in our instinct to do something.

The proof? The children of Biafra have been starving to death for months, and the best the world has done so far is to ret in a trickle of supplies. The cattle of Nepal have not yet be gun starving. The thing to watch for and expect is the little news item which tells us that they may not have to, after

Luckily, Not By Bread Alone It is perhaps fortunate, a Wall Street Journal survey indicates, that man does not try to live by bread alone. For bread, it appears, is the spec tacular single example of what is most

inefficient in our present economic sys It is in the process of getting the bread to the consumer that things have long been out of control. "Climbing transportation costs, more elaborate packaging and increased sell-

ing and promotional expenses," says the Journal survey, "are putting upward pressure on the cost of marketing most consumer goods. "But industry and Government studies indicate that bread is the most flagrant

example of runaway marketing costs. The cost of moving a loaf of bread from the bakery to a housewife's grocery cart slightly exceeds the cost of growing the wheat, milling the flour and balding the bread."

getting \$1.15 for a bushel of wheat, from which 60 loaves of bread can be milled and baked. What these farmers get for the wheat for 60 loaves would not quite buy them four loaves of bread for their own consumption on the retail market. Over the past ten years, the ingredi ent costs of a loaf of bread have remained substantially the same, except for an eight per cent increase caused by a federal milling tax. But in the same period plant costs have gone up 34 per cent, and selling and delivery costs have gone up 50 per cent.

Not so with bread, according to an expert who has been studying its problem. His verdict is that "bread is one

The Chafer And The Chafed The European chafer is still with us; in fact, it is extending its range, and to try to corral it the U.S. Department of Agriculture is extending its quarantine

ted by an alert entomologist from the

Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station. European chafers are long-legged brown beetles about half an inch long They look something like the familia June bug and are strictly nocturnal in their habits. The adults emerge from the ground at late dusk, in June and July and fly in swarms around trees silhouetted on the horizon. Their mating flight over, the chafers return like Puck at the first streaks of dawn, and burrow into the soil where the female lays eggs to start the new generation The adult chafers do not eat, but the grubs feed on roots of plants, damaging turf and pastures where there is a neavy infestation. Meriden became a center of chafer infestation when the insect turned up here, having been brought in its larval state from New York State

in the root balls of nursery stock which were used for state highway plantings. In an effort to confine the spread of the insect, strict quarantine was imposed and nursery stock and topsoll from infected areas must be treated with approved pesticides. Meriden, Berlin, and Southington where the chafer has been seen, are already under quarantine. Recently the Department of Agriculture extended its quarantine to areas in Massachusetts and navivania in an effort to halt the

spread of the pest, whose depredations, while not yet serious in Connecticut, are The damage done by the European chafer to date has been relatively minor; Americans may chafe over the chafer, but they have been really hurt as they have by such accidental insect imports as the codling moth and the Hessian fly. The moth does heavy damage to fruit; the Hessian fly to wheat and other grains.
