



SAIGON (AP) - Aflied forces killed 150 enemy troops in a new outbreak of heavy fighting near the Cambodian border, along the jungled approaches to Saigon, military spokesmen reported today.

Enemy gunners shot down a U.S. helicopter ferrying ammu-nition to the embattled South Vietnamese mercenaries in the area. Four Americans were

killed and two wounded. Earlier, U.S. headquarters reported that 24 Americans were killed in the collision of a big Army CH47 Chinook helicopter and an Air Force Caribou cargo plane 11 miles northwest of Hue on the coast. It was one of the worst air collisions of the war. There were no survivors.

The fighting along the Cambodian border, 60 miles northwest of Salgon was triggered at daybreak Thursday when about 400 South Vietnamese civilian irreg ulars were lifted into the area by American helicopters. They mmediately ran into an enemy force of about 800 to 1,000 men. Two and a half hours later. another 400 South Vietnamese mercenaries were committed to the fight. The battle raged throughout

the day. Preliminary reports from military spokesmen said the mercenaries also seized 10 machine guns, 25 assault rifles, and other assorted weapons and ammuni

Government casualties were put at 15 dead and 44 wounded. The American helicopter was brought down by machine-gune fire as it was landing. A U.S. Special Forces captain and the crew chief were killed in the flaming wreckage. The pilot and a gunner were killed by enemy iflemen as they crawled away from the wreckage after pulling out the wounded helicopter com mander. The commander, a first lieutenant, and a Special Forces master sergeant, survived with minor wounds.

#### **Rusk And His President**

Secretary of State Dean Rusk happened to be on the other side of the world last March 31, when President Johnson announced his retirement as a candidate and his decision to halt part of our bombing of North Vietnam. It seemed obvious enough at the time, and in the weeks that followed, that Secretary Rusk was not moved to extraordinarily positive enthusiasm for the President's halt of the bombing and the subsequent opening of peace negotiations in Paris, To the contrary, there were those observers of the Washington scene who thought they saw Secretary Rusk gradually working his way back toward a reunion with the President on an attitude toward Vietnam more in harmony with the Secretary's own consistent views.

That reunion of the consistent Secretary of State with the sometimes wandering President seemed clearly symbolized in the hard line speech the Secretary delivered before the United Nations Wednesday

And Washington report-such as that from Evans and Novak on this page today - suggests that this reunion, on Rusk's consistent terms, may have taken place many weeks ago, when the President may have done those things which disastrously subotaged the very mme neace possibilities his March 31 decisions had brought into existence at

If such report is true, Secretary Rusk is happy and serene again because things are once again the way he most sincerely believes they should be. And what has happened with regard to President Johnton and the chances of peace in Vietnam is what has previously happened many times over. This would not be the first time President Johnson has made spectacular peace moves in the spotlight and then used the knife, behind the scenes, on the hopes he himself has raised. There never was, from the start of the bombing north in 1965, any American effort for peace in Vietnam which was carried through without alteration or renege. For a time, with the March 31 bombing halt reinforced by the President's refusal of renomination, and with actual negotiations opening at Paris, it seemed that this peace operation might prove to be different. It still may so prove. But the main record stands, at the moment, as one in which, after we had negotiations begun, we stiffened our stand away from the basis on which the negotiations had been procured and, instead of making the further concession indicated for us, merely began arguing that the next concession had to come from the other side.

At any rate, Secretary Rusk, before the United Nations Wednesday, was in fine form. With hardly a blink of the eye, he accused Russia of violating the UN Charter in Czechoslovakia and inferred that we were somehow defending that Charter in Vietnam. Once again, all villainy was on one side of the world, all virtue on the other.

And once again, one has to hand the paim to Secretary Runk for being consistent both in his own beliefs and in his own behavior. He has never once really pretended he favored peace neotiations at Paris or expected anything rom them, or wished any kind of negotiation at all except on our own terms. He has never really even pretended to be soft. He has never been found tossing crumbs to doves. He has not really bothcred to conceal his distaste for those stray and irresponsible moments in which his President has tossed such crumbs. And he has always had the satisfaction, in the end, of seeing the President come back to him.

Speaking to the UN Wednesday, chore made necessary by the fact that an Ambassador who differed with Rusk on Vietnam had just resigned and by the fact that the new Ambaasador, gentleman who agrees with Rusk Vietnam, had not yet taken office - on this occasion Secretary Rusk was still his imperturbable, changeless self, and spoke as if he had his President back with him on the old hard line basis. It seems a certainty that either of them would sooner repudiate their Vice Pres ident than each other.

Plus Or Minus \$100,000 Out of Detroit comes a bit of news which on the surface of it seems to reflect discredit on the individual, but which, when you stop to think about it, reaffirms the worth of human beings. The news involved is the notice that the Ford Motor Company is recalling 41,850 Econoline vehicles for a safety check. The recall of automobiles for the correction of defects or features suspected of being capable of malfunction is now common, of course. But this case differs from most of the others, In most instances the problem stems

from some sort of sophisticated miscalculation or uncalculation on the part of a team of engineering experts who were aided by all manner of testing and evaluating machines when they designed. Most of the problems, when exlained, involve some esoteric bit about manticipated stresses or unforeseen interrelation of functions,

The Ford recall traces to one man doing one job and trying to do it a little better. He was an assembly line worker who found that he could attach break hoses quicker and easier by shoving the hoses through a spring coil. As it turned out that was not a good idea. It may cost the Ford Co. as much

as \$100,000. Anyone who has ever tried to build a better mousetrap and gotten caught by it can sympathize with that worker, who, by the way, still has his job, though he will probably never enjoy it again. He has done us all a service, however, by reminding us that even in a computerized assembly line life we count for something individually. Today it's \$100,000 on the minus side; tomorrow it may be \$100,000 on the plus side.

Pedagogue As Sheepdog

#### The biggest gap in teacher training today is the lack of guidance in studer discipline. Most administrators skim over a

prospective teacher's credentials, look the desk at him, and ask, "But can he control a classroom?" Most new teachers can't. And a woe-

fully large proportion of long-time teachers can't either-at least not without paying a heavy price in emotional wearlness at the end of day-long battles of The new teacher is often bewildered

when he steps into a classroom-with the best of intentions and with a good lesson - and meets a resistant atmosphere that can break into onslaughts of student hostility and teach erbaiting. The teacher is apt to learn, too, that calls to the principal's office lose effectiveness if they are regular: students will push the teacher almost to the point of having to make the call since it will be the principal, not the teacher who holds the power. And what if the administrator is himself weak or refuses to back up the teacher? No, the teacher soon learns he must fight his

And he must learn how to do so on his own. The universities don't teach him. Their standard view is that a well-worked-out lesson will obviate the need for discipline. But teachers find this theory just doesn't do the whole job. Yet many eachers do master the art of discipline and if it can be learned there is no reason it cannot be taught.

Achieving an informal decorum in the classroom is the first goal. Informal. Because the contemporary mode seems to be casual, Because af fection and humor can more easily thrive

when the teacher does not affect the often stuffy posture of a shepherd. Decorum. Because a sense of respect for the rights and progress of others must prevail if any one student is to move ahead. Because students need a secure sense that fundamental rules and principles - not the personality of teacher or student - are the governing force

in the classroom. One young teacher in a traditional Boston suburban school - not a privileg ed one - found it helpful to style himself a sheepdog rather than a shepherd. The method worked, Instead of pontificating all week long (and students often would like nothing more than keep a Wacher talking so they can put off getting down to work), he read aloud the assignment for the week as soon as class started on Monday. He gave whatever explanations were needed as the week progressed - but only once, and then briefly.


Like intelligent sheep who knew where they were expected to graze or travel, he students were expected to govern hemselves and work out their asignment on their own.

If the youngster tended to stray into improductive paths, the teacher would ark or bite, as the occasion demanded And quickly the integrity of the flock would be restored. He seldom preach ed, as a shepherd would have felt comcelled to do, and he thus protected himelf from the antipatronizing hostility many teachers provoke.

Students appreciate confidence their ability to govern themselves. They do not mind a teacher's being tough so long as he is fair. The young Boston resolutely gave his students the benefit of the doubt when a question had been ambiguous. 
