Peace Signal Politically Timed? At Paris last week, the official repesentative of Hanol spoke directly t the press, with a message directly to

President Johnson. "If President Johnson really wants to solve the Vietnam problem peacefully," said North Vietnam's chief representaive, Minister of State Xuan Thuy, 'he still has enough time and power now to do so, so as to open the way to a just settlement of the Vietnam problem, a settlement that would be beneficial to the Vietnamese people, the American

people and world peace." Hanoi's delegate also said the same thing to our chief delegate, W. Averell Harriman, who responded by asking again, in the name of President Johnson, for some "reason to believe that you intend seriously to join with us in iously toward peace."

That, after this answer in the meeting, Hanoi should repeat the statement openly, would suggest that Hanoi was seeking to tempt or prod President Johnson into trying to do something about peace in Vietnam in time for the prospect of such peace to have some ence on the outcome of the Ameri-

If the Hanoi words in Paris are so being interpreted in the White House, as we would not care to have to resolve. Possibly, Hanoi is serious and would rather deal with Johnson than with his successor. Possibly, in such case, Hanol is willing to discuss fairly reasonable terms. Possibly, lives can be saved and battles canceled. And, in such case, the President, as President, should himself make a sincere testing reach for peace, even if he might be accused of doing no in a desperate effort to rescue his party from the defeat which threatens

But one has to imagine also, and if one is in the White House try to guard against, the possibility that Hanoi may simply be attempting to draw, our leadership off balance, to make us look eager and foolish and ridiculous, and thus weaken even the negotiating position of the next administration.

On the record, one would expect President Johnson to decide in favor of negative caution. He has had may opporunities to try to make peace for himself, and turned aside from them at the crucial moment. He has been given signals before, and he has chosen to ignore them. He has had the chance before to interpret lulis in battle activities and decline in casualties as evidence of enemy response to our pleas for some decacalation on his part before we will do any more deescalating ourselves, and he has refused to make that

We do not expect the President, therefore, to reach now for any opportunity that may seem to him even more filmsy than those he has previously ignored. What we would hope, however, is that

he seek the Harriman appraisal and advice and that, if our chief negotiator at Paris should think the situation merits it, he should respond with both word and action, no matter how certain it would be that he would be under some attack for playing politics with peace. It would be the peace which would be more important, if it could be obtained, than whatever politics might be involv ed or produced from it.

And R traced its finding that the rebellion ended up with support from students and faculty members it did not have when it began largely to the blind and mistak en policies of the university administre tion, not merely on the scene, but in th long months and even years in which the gap between Columbia and the world in which it was situated had been grow-

But even while it thus seemed to ex plain revolution almost to the point of justifying it, the Cox Commission also managed to turn around firmly and declare that "resort to violence or physical harasament or obstruction is never an acceptable tactic for influencing decisions in a university. This principle does not require notions of property or legality to sustain it. It derives from three considerations.

"First, force, harassment, and physical obstruction contradict the essential postulate that the university is dedicated to the search for truth by reason and

This is the plainest lesson of the rising cycle of violence that began at Columbia with the Naval R.O.T.C. demonstration is 1965 and culminated in the brutality of April 30 and May 22.
