Why Can't They See Blood Now? For those who seem to take it as an act of faith and fact that talk has a guaranteed value, we cite the five days

of talk, on the cruiser at Gibraltar, be-

tween Prime Minister Harold Wilson of

Britain and Prime Minister Ian D. Smith

of Rhodesia. Here, certainly, was an opportunity for the statement, exchange, and mutual exploration of views to prove fertile and beneficial. The two leaders of two countries had nothing else to do, for five days, but explore the possibility of finding some small opening toward some small portion of some small common position. Neither has seemed, in his publie performances in the past, to be tongue-tied.

Yet, at the end of the five days, the best they could produce was a communique agreeing that there was "a very wide gulf" between them "on cer-

The leader of the 200,000 whites in the rebellious colony of Rhodesia and the volunteer guardian representative of the rights of the 4,000,000 black Africans in that country obviously never came close to agreement as to how and when the 4,000,000 should get political rights in any way equal to those of the 200,000. Perhaps, underneath and during their continuing deadlock, each of them gained some slightly better inkling of an understanding of why each was taking npromising condition he was, but that is not guaranteed. The probability is that they could continue talking on a cruiser at Gibraltar forever and the only thing their countries would gain from it would be a couple of new prime

What creates a situation in which "talk" thus seems useless? What is, if anything ever, going to resolve the situation with regard to Rhodesia? What breaks such a deadlock?

We are ashamed to give the answer which suggests itself, because we know it is an answer wrong in morality, wrong in ethics, wrong in law, even though it may be the only answer which is effective. The answer which thus suggests itself is violence.

The shameful, realistic truth is that violence might do more than reason has done to put the two prime ministers into a mood to agree with one another on something. Violence might do more than patience has done to advance the status of the rights of the 4,000,000 minority in a country of 4,200,000. Violence, threatening death equally to both sides, might increase the willingness of both to conceive of the possibility of living together in some equality. We are almost admitting, are we not, that blood has to flow before there can be liberty, justice, equality.

That invites us to the weird conclusion that the best thing about the situation Rhodesia—that blood has not begun to flow-is also the reason why no progress has been made toward an eventual settlement.

Yet if there is no settlement, the blood eventually will flow, and everybody, induding the two prime ministers, must know that. Why can they not talk, then, as if what they know will come has already begun to happen? Why can't they see the blood now?

Once we were all inside, the Astronauts, just like any earth host, seemed especially proud of the view they had from their window, or was it merely that they had noticed some speck of dust, some small piece of unhousekeeping they wanted to divert our attention from? Psychological Flaw In I-91?

When we have made our fortune, and find ourselves distraught for ways of spending it, we hope we remember to subsidize a special study into the psychological hazards which may have been engineered into the construction of Route I-91 in the region just north of Hart-

no different from any other stretch of modern superhighway. It is equally wide, and almost completely straight and pleasantly free of the hazards of visual distractions in the form of billboards. And yet it seems a stretch of superhighway especially prone to accident. Our amateurish conclusion, which we would like to have dignified by professional research, is that there must be something different about the feeling of driving on this particular stretch of

The question we would like to have answered is this: Is there a special increase in the sense of insecurity in some drivers as they drive this road, such a sense of insecurity as might diminish their expertness and steadiness at the

And if there are some drivers who feel some special insecurity on this particular stretch of superhighway, what could be the reason for it?

One suggestion is that some portion

of I-91 have been engineered to create a crown effect, in which the road runs along as if on a ridge of its own, with no close supporting banks offering visual and perhaps reassuring psychological oundaries. The study we suggest might try to ascertain whether drivers do feel different degrees of driving ease (or tension) in proportion to the amount of drop or rise reflected in the roadside topography. If the answer should prove mportant, it might save lives to let billboards be erected to create the reassuring illusion of a boundary.


