bought the small isle six years ago and has kept it ultraprivate. Because the wedding will be in Greece, Greek law requires a Greek Orthodox ceremony. seemed most unlikely that there would be a companion ceremo-Catholic faith because Onassis is divorced and the church prohibits such a marriage unless it finds his first union invalid.

Onassis is a member of the national church of Greece, which approved his divorce by ecclesiastical decree in 1961 and thus made his remarriage in the church possible.

A theologian at the Vaticar expressed the opinion that Mr Kennedy's marriage to Onassis would not be valid in the eyes of her church and that the marglage would automatically exnmunicate her, However, application could be made to the church's marriage courts to dediare Onassis' first marriage in-valid, as the Vatican Rota did for Mrs. Kennedy's sister, Prin-ceas Lee Radatwill.

In Washington, a spokesman for Mrs. Kennedy's brother-in-law, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, .said the Massachusetts senator was told of the impending wedding several days ago. "He extended his very best

wishes to both for their happi-, hess," said the spokesman. Born in New York, educated in the United States and Europe, fluent in French, Spanish and Italian, Jacqueline Lee

Bouiver married Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts on * Sept. 12, 1953. After he became the nation's 35th president on Jan. 1, 1961, his wife was halled as one of the

most beautiful, charming and best dressed first ladies in the world. The assassin's bullets that

struck down Mrs. Kennedy's huband on Nov. 22, 1963, left her a widow at 34. She withdrew into seclusion for a time, but the public refused to believe that she would remain a widow. After she emerged again into

society, she was seen with a great variety of escorts, ranging from author Truman Capote to economist John Kenneth Galbraith. But persistent rumors of romance were generated only by her friendship with Lord Harlech of Great Britain, a close friend of her late husband and the British ambassador in Washington when the Kennedys were in the White House.

Mrs. Kennedy and her children were guests of Onassis aboard his palatial yacht Chris-tina in the Caribbean during the spring. After Sen. Robert F. edy's assassination, she and Sen. Edward Kennedy cruised with Onassis aboard the Christina in the Mediterranear But until the reports Thursday there had been no public mention of romance between th President's widow and the selfmade, 62-year-old magnate.

The stocky dapper "Ari. with a fortune estimated as high as \$500 million, was the hero of another headline romance, with opera singer Maria Callas, which began aboard the Christina. In 1959 he took her and her husband cruising in the Mediter ranean, Later Onassis' wife go an Alabama divorce, Mrs. Cal las left her husband, and the singer and the shipping man be came constant companions. Now living in Paris, Mrs. Cal-

las refused to comment on Onassis' coming marriage. Although still a Greek citizen with a home in Athens and considerable interests in this country, his worldwide holdings include mines in Indonesia, real estate in New York and his huge tanker fleet, which he has oper ated out of Monte Carlo and New York since World War II. With homes also in New York, Paris, Antibes and Montevideo and offices in half a dozen coun tries, he travels more than 100,000 miles a year and speaks





Our Bread And Butter Failure

There are not any very good ways of trying to peck away at that New York City statistic which shows that the number of people on relief in that city reached, last August, a new all time high of 916,116.

One could try to chisel some of these nearly million people off the relief rolls, on the ground that they themselves are chisciers. But the odds are that the most severe and reactionary pruning of lists possible would still leave hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers gualified, by the circumstances of their living, for relief

If no one can really shrink the list by proposing tougher standards for admission to it, so it also has to be stated that there is in the national forum of the moment, even though it is a forum supposedly stimulated and illuminated by the activities of a great political campaign for the election of a President and a Congress, absolutely no kind of cure or guarantee for any prompt kind of allevistion of such a condition.

This is the way it is in New York City - nearly a million people on relief, getting money from government for food. rent, heat, light, and clothes - and there is nobody, but nobody, who really pretends to be able to change it.

No one has the cure. No one can change it. All we can do is keep realizing what it is, what it means

It is an abominable sickness, a dispraceful failure, in the midst of our supposedly affluent society.

It is a breakdown of system, an explosion of the pattern we hoped by now have well built. What it says to us is that we are not even mastering the basic sconomic essentials of a national life. For all our glamorous and exciting power, for all our flirtations with the moon, we haven't yet solved the bread and

butter problem. And we seem to have no formula, no candidate, to bring what might be considered the first and most elemental oroblem of any society within the power

ind competence of our society. Our biggest, most glorious city is a tragedy in its core, and becoming, not merely in the size of its relief rolls, a symbol not of our success but of our

It is our inevitable human hope that the malady can be treated, the rupture epaired, the society given some mild ind not too painful changes of direction, and what looks like a crisis be somehow weathered until it somehow shrinks away and we are left with a restored American dream, Perhaps this can happen. But perhaps what is really in store s more such nightmare as a million people on relief in one city. Perhaps there have to be real changes and reversals in the system itself before it can seem to work again.

We Hope She Has Chosen Well

The American people could see Mrs. lacqueline Kennedy, in the days and years of her grief, dedicating herself proudly to the task of living for the emory and the ennoblement of the memory of her martyr-President-husband. And they could sense, being human themselves, that any such role for any human eing, would in time be difficult to adhere to. In the past year or so, they had had many alerts, as Mrs. Kennedy herself had given many signs, that what her widow's heart and her sense of obligation to a national image had intended were growing more and more difficult.

We all began to sense that, sooner or later, she would release herself from her heroic but unnatural attempt, and begin living a life of her own again, instead of merely trying to memorialize the life of another.

If this much is conceded and considered inevitable, then it also follows that her choice of her own particular future s something particularly her own, and all her friends and admirers, who found her so inspiring and noble in the great ad days when her tragedy and the naion's tragedy were one, can do now is ope she has chosen well and found an ffection and a mode of life worthy of

The Pollsters Should Worry The most prudent polling yet done in this 1968 Presidential campaign is that informal survey among the professional polisters done by the New York Times the other day.

The Times poli of the polisters came up with a headline which said "Polisters Call Chance of Error In Election Greatest Since 1948."

Under questioning, the professional pollsters revealed three circumstances which have them a bit worried.

Their interviewers seem to be running into an increasing number of people who refuse to be interviewed about how they feel about the election.

The polling techniques for appraising the significance of indications people are not going to vote or are still undecided have not been adjusted to the complications of a three way race.

The widespread lack of positive enthuslasm for any of this year's candidates may mean a higher-than-usual possibility of last-minute switches.

We would add, to much reasons for pollster worry, the observation that this has been the most turbulent year, politically speaking, in our history.

The voters have been on a whirligig of sudden and unexpected political de velopments, which have forced them to face a whole series of different choices and campaigns. President Johnson was, and then was not, a candidate, Governor Rockefeller was, was not, and then was a candidate, and then was not. Former Vice President Nixon has been both the candidate who couldn't win, and, lately, the candidate who couldn't lose. On such a turbulent sea, the voters have hardly had a chance to be sure what ports seemed open to them and make their choice of which one to head toward. It's a little more difficult than usual for them to be sure of what they really feel and

All this, too, adds up to a development which suggests that the voters may be continuing undecided after the public opinion polls have closed.

Laziness As A Repellent

These are the wonder days of a scientific civilization, when to pose a mystery one day is to have it answered the next.

A friend of ours was asking, the other day, whether we had noticed that this had been a relatively civilized season for mosquitoes. And we, answering after a moment's

reflection over the relatively peaceful hours we had spent in late afternoon sunshines and late summer twilights, agreed that this had been, for some undisclosed reason, a year in which we had found our precious skin attacked less frequently than in any summer we could remember. And our friend agreed; a similar experience, in a long, lazy, pleasurable summer, had prompted him to ask his question.

A day or so later there came the scientific answer to us both. Department of Agriculture scientists reported that they had identified a chemical in human sweat which surved as the chief attracion to marauding mosquitoes.

We and our friend had that very pleas ant, unmolested summer, nothing can take that away from us. But it may have been due to our own wise 1968 instinct not ever to exercise to the sweating point, not to any dearth of the in-

Merchants Of Death

Biafrana are now using French arms to kill Nigerians. Nigerians are using British arms to kill Biafrans. Meanwhile the French and British Governments (French denials notwithstanding try to ensure that neither side short of ammunition. For the Euro peans on the sidelines this ought to be shameful situation. The Governmen should at once consult with the French - though on present form they are unlikely to - in an attempt to stop the flow of arms to both sides. Last week the Labour Party Executive agreed that the British Government should stop arming Nigeria "if there is a possibility of ending this war by stopping the supply of arms." The possibility might now exist if Britain and France issued joint ultimatum to Biafra and Nigeria, telling them to stop fighting or do without their supplies.

Neither France nor Britain is the sole supplier of arms to Biafra or Nigeria. The Russians are in Nigeria too and if either side felt able to carry on the other would not give up. At the same time this is a war between African which could not continue for long if the Freat Powera outside stopped sending the ammunition. The Great Powers have a duty to agree to do this.

French motives in entering the conflict are not clear. There are few direct commercial advantages, for even if Colonel Ojukwu wina sovereignty for part of Biafra he is not likely to have much oil within it. France's considerable commercial stake in Nigeria is, like Britain's, overwhelmingly on the Federal side. However, France has an indirect interest, based on her big stake in a ring of small, ex-French client States, who may be inclined to see a united

Nigeria as a threat. The role of the Russians is more paradoxical. They have long sought a oothold in Africa. When the way started the Russians assumed, with some justification at that time, that international off interest were preparing to support Biafra. Seeing Biafra as second Katanga, they came in behind agos, supplying it with jet planes. British policy, in supporting the traditional Government, has sought to avoid the involvement of other outside Powers. Last month's pro-Federal vote by the Organisation for African Unity suggests that this approach is supported by much nationalist opinion. But it makes sense only if Nigeria can reemerge as a single nation. While there is no sign of this we cannot confidently say that we are right. - MANCHESTER (ENG.) GUARDIAN.

Fortunately for Whitney, taix driver drove by and saved him from further punishment. Whitney was still shaking when he was brought to court Thursday, nine hours after Miss Cathcart beat him up. His face was covered with cuts and bruises, his nose was broken and his glasses had been amashed.

Magistrate John Ward gave Whitney a conditional dis-charge, which means he'd better behave himself in the future. "It's a pretty despicable thing you tried to do," Ward said. "But to some extent you have suffered for it already."
