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66-Second Manuever Apollo Steering Test Successful

SPACESHIP CENTER, HOUSTON (AP)—With a jolting burst of speed, the Apollo 7 astronauts fired their steering engine today in the most powerful manuever ever made by a manned spacecraft.

"Taboo-50" about Navy Capt. Walter M. Sobierski as the huge engine flashed to life and ignited a steady tail of flames for 66 seconds as Apollo 7 zoomed 130 miles above the Gulf of Mexico.

"That was a real nice test," the machine performed beautifully," spacecraft commander Sobierski reported at the completion of the vital test of the engine that one day will guide American astronauts to the moon.

Minutes earlier, the wives of Sobierski, Air Force Maj. Donn F. Hoyle and civilian Walter Chapman were disappointed at not being able to see their husbands slip over their Houston homes.

All three gathered at a boat landing at Clear Lake near the Manned Spacecraft Center, hoping to catch a glimpse of Apollo 7 as it dashed across the heavens south of Houston.

Humphrey Says Early Peace Would Help Every Mortal

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey said today an early settlement of the Vietnam war would help his presidential prospects and also "every living mortal in the world."

Answering questions from housewives in suburban Bloomfield, Humphrey said the political impact of an early settlement, "Events will have a great deal to do with what happens in this country."

The event of a settlement that would not only help me, it would help every living mortal in the world," Humphrey said he is not a prophet and cannot make predictions about what he termed the most delicate of negotiations under way that we have ever had.

"If they found all of the Dead Sea Scrolls," he said, "some of the prophets are going to look a little bad."

Asked his position on Vietnam, Humphrey replied by reading excerpts of his Sept. 30 Salt Lake City speech.

After the question period, at Connecticut General Life Insurance Co., Humphrey headed for downtown Hartford and a rally.

Apparently still bothered by housewives in his crowd, Humphrey sprayed something into it before the question session, then swallowed a lounge as he began a 10-minute introductory

Humphrey came to Connecticut from Detroit, where he told labor and Negro groups that he would not order troops to Vietnam unless he really efforts to pay real fees.

A soon hour rally in downtown Hartford and a second Connecticut Democratic caucus included criticism of the Republican opponent Richard M. Nixon as a "reactionary" who refused to speak out on vital issues.

He indicated that Nixon was not the man the American people can trust to lead the nation during the next four years. Humphrey said this trust has been the central issue in his campaign with only a little more than two weeks remaining.

Memories of Hebron

St. Peter's School

In addition to the various stories of Hebron's past history a later one should have its place, perhaps the most important of them all: St. Peter's School of Liberal and Humane Studies.

The school was attached to St. Peter's Parish, being taught in the light of Catholic Christian doctrine. The west Catholic is taken here in its larger meaning, including all Christian doctrine.

I am told that an article written by myself was published in "The Connecticut Churchman," many back in 1928. I had forgotten all about this and do not remember ever having seen a copy, and can only hope that the said article helped to give its impetus to the project.

The faculty of the school included the Rev. Theodore Martin, honorary president and pastor; Benjamin H. Bissell, Ph.D., president and professor of English; Austin Warren, M.A., dean and professor of literature.

The purpose of the school was to promote the acquisition of personal soundness of character. Now I've got to stop right here and apologize to the Rev., Dr. Professor, etc. Benjamin H. Bissell, late lamented. It's concerned with his middle initial. He was not fond of it, in fact he didn't like it at all. It was his mother who inflicted it upon him. He thought it was an affliction but his mother thought old family names ought to go down to posterity so she chose Heskiah to go down the line. What's the matter with it? A fine old Biblical character.

Students' Idea
She liked it and so did I. Also it was Barry's name.

But now to go on about "The School." Let's go back and tell how all this got its first start. The idea sprang from the brains of two young Wesleyan University students, Austin Warren and Benjamin H. Bissell, who became close friends and to whom the starting idea of a school in the small town of Hebron came.

The town at that time had only a country school teach-

ing nothing much higher than the three R's—reading, 'rithmetic and 'rithmetic except for sporadic attempts, though Governor Peters' law school might be an exception. But that's another story. To Benjamin Bissell the credit must be given as the actual head start of the school, Austin Warren trailing respectfully along. As years went on Warren was not a truster, but a leader.

But now I've got to tell you the rest of those faculty members were: Alexander Krapp, Ph.D., vice president and lecturer in Medieval literature; Louise Brown Osborne, M.A., registrar and lecturer in Renaissance literature; Edgar S. Brightman, Ph.D., professor of philosophy; Frederick M. Carey, Ph.D., professor of the classics; Delmar S. Markie, M.A., lecturer in religion; Wellington Sloane, M.A., director of music and dramatics.

Honorary vice presidents were Joseph Warren Beach, Ph.D.; Gregory Brest, Ph.D.; Lewis Field Hill, M.A. Other officers included Miss Helen Gilbert, burser and Miss Susan Pendleton, chairman of the trustees.

People From Abroad
Courses of instruction included Homer, Dr. Carey; Survey of Church History, Mr. Markie; Seventeenth Century Poetry, Dr. Bissell; The Poetry of Pope, Dean Warren, and Introduction to Musical Appreciation, Mr. Sloane.

The School ran from 1923 to 1928.

Accident Suit Names City, State Official

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A youth injured in a car crash on Interstate 91 Dec. 9 has named a city and a state official in a suit for \$200,000 damages.

Timothy Paul Loerke, a resident of Yale University, claims in the suit filed Thursday that the accident was caused partly by smoke from the New Haven city dump.

Loerke, who was 18 at the time of the accident, was riding in a car which hit a truck stopped in smoke and fog on the highway. Two other Yale sophomores in the car were injured and one later died.

The suit contends city Fire Chief Francis J. Sweeney was negligent in not ordering the fires at the dump put out. The suit also names Edward Ives, state highway commissioner, claiming negligence for failing to post signs warning of reduced visibility.

Other defendants include Lombard Brothers, Inc., of Waterbury, and John Silver of William, Mass., owner and operator of the truck involved in the crash. Operator of the car, William Katz of Caldwell, N.J., was also named in the suit.

LeMay Views Air Strikes From Carrier

SARONG (AP) — Third-party vice presidential candidate Curtis E. LeMay, nearing the end of his latest tour of the Vietnam war zone, went aboard the aircraft carrier America today to watch air strikes being launched against North Vietnam.

The visit to the carrier operating in the Gulf of Tonkin could be the last major stop for the 61-year-old retired Air Force chief of staff.

Aides said tentative plans call for LeMay to return to the United States on Saturday, in time to meet with American Independent party presidential candidate George C. Wallace before the former Alabama governor appears on the NBC television program "Meet the Press" on Sunday.

As on the first three days of LeMay's fast-paced tour, security was tight. Air Force guards with rifles kept spectators and newsmen 30 yards from the candidate when he arrived this morning in Da Nang, the command center of most military activities in the northern part of South Vietnam.

A spokesman said the guards were present to protect LeMay from any attempt on his life. For added security one member of LeMay's party carried what looked like two shotguns.

LeMay came to Da Nang after spending the night at the giant U.S. logistics base at Cam Ranh Bay on the central coast, where he talked to officers, enlisted men and merchant seamen as he toured the dock area and other facilities.

A C-130 cargo plane took LeMay to the Da Nang airbase. There he boarded a helicopter and flew to the Marine Division headquarters for briefings. He was met by Lt. Gen. Robert L. Castman, U.S. Marine commander in Vietnam.

LeMay ate lunch with enlisted

men of the division. Observers said one Negro Marine asked to speak with him and told him that he planned to vote for the Wallace-LeMay ticket.

LeMay also talked with members of a Marine reconnaissance team before it went out on patrol and with crews of fighter-bombers loaded with bombs for missions from Da Nang air base.

Then he boarded a Navy C-119 plane and flew to the carrier.

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Judge Blasts Verdict Freeing Winsted Man

LITCHFIELD, Conn. (AP) — A Superior Court judge has described as a "miscarriage of justice" a jury verdict that freed a man accused of assault with intent to commit murder.

Judge John C. FitzGerald made the statement Thursday in sentencing two youths who admitted their part in a holdup and had identified against the man who was acquitted by the jury last month.

The jury found Richard Kent, 22, of Winsted, innocent of the assault with intent to kill charge and another of robbery with violence in connection with a hold-up last May of Tony's Drive-In Package Store in Harwinton.

The store clerk, Theodore Caruso, 24, of Torrington, was shot during the holdup.

Kent had testified he was not in the area at the time of the incident.

The two youths sentenced Thursday were Harold Van Deusen, 19, of Torrington, and William O. Moore, 17, of Winsted. They were charged with robbery with violence.

FitzGerald sentenced them to terms of one year each, and ruled that they be given credit—337 days—for the time spent in jail since their arrest.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The new check that fits right in your wallet. If it says "United States Note" on the face, it's about to become a collector's item.

The Treasury Department announced Thursday it is not issuing any more \$5 U.S. notes. They only amount to \$187 million now, anyway, says the Treasury. Federal Reserve notes issues amount to \$2.8 billion.

The Treasury noted there is still \$135 million in \$2 bills outstanding, even though they haven't been issued since 1956.

"All over the country people are hanging on to them in hopes they'll turn out to be worth something big to give to their grandchildren," said a spokesman. "The same thing will probably happen with these fives."

LBJ Appoints Three To Anti-Crime Posts
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has made three appointments for three anti-crime posts the Senate failed to act on before adjourning.

The top appointment Thursday was Patrick V. Murphy, director of public safety for the District of Columbia. Murphy takes over as head of the newly

created Law Enforcement Assistance Administration with a salary of \$24,700 a year.

His assistants at \$28,000 a year will be Dr. Ralph Blum, deputy director of development of the Army Materiel Command, and Wesley A. Pomroy, the attorney general's assistant for law enforcement.

The man who will be responsible for distributing \$100 million to states and cities for law enforcement program improvement.

The appointments are subject to Senate action when Congress returns.

Our Bread And Butter Failure

There are not any very good ways of trying to peek away at this New York City statistic which shows that the number of people on relief in that city reached last August, a new all-time high of 816,116.

All this, too, added to a development which suggests that the voters will be continuing undecided after the public opinion polls have closed.

These are the wonder days of a scientific civilization, when to pose a mystery one day is to have it answered the next.

It is in an admirable sickness, a disconcerting failure, in the midst of our supposedly affluent society.

It is a breakdown of the system, an explosion of the system we hoped, not to have well built. What is wrong with us?

It is our inevitable human hope that the malady can be treated, the rupture repaired, the society given some mild and not too painful change to make it what looks like a crisis be somehow weathered until it somehow strikes away and we are left with a restored American dream.

We Hope She Has Chosen Well

The American people could see Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, in the days and years of her grief, dedicating herself proudly to the task of living for the memory and the establishment of the memory of her martyr-President husband.

If this much is conceded and considered inevitable, then it also follows that her choice of her own particular future is something particularly her own, and all her friends and admirers, who found her so inspiring and so devoted to duty and days when her tragedy and the nation's tragedy were one, can do no more than hope she has chosen well and found an affection and a mode of life worthy of herself.

The Pollsters Should Worry

The most prudent polling yet done in this 1968 Presidential campaign is that the survey among the voters of potential pollsters done by the New York Times the other day.

The Times poll of the pollsters came up with a headline which said "Pollsters Call Chance of Error in Election Greatest Since 1948."

Under questioning, the professional pollsters revealed three circumstances which have them a bit worried.

The polling techniques for appraising the significance of indications people are not going to vote or are still undecided have not been adjusted to the complications of a three-way race.

The widespread lack of positive enthusiasm for any of this year's candidates may mean a higher-than-usual possibility of last-minute change.

We would add, for such reasons for a pollster worry, the observation that this has been the most turbulent year, politically speaking.

The voters have been on a whirlwind of sudden and unexpected political developments, which have forced them to make a series of difficult choices and campaigns.

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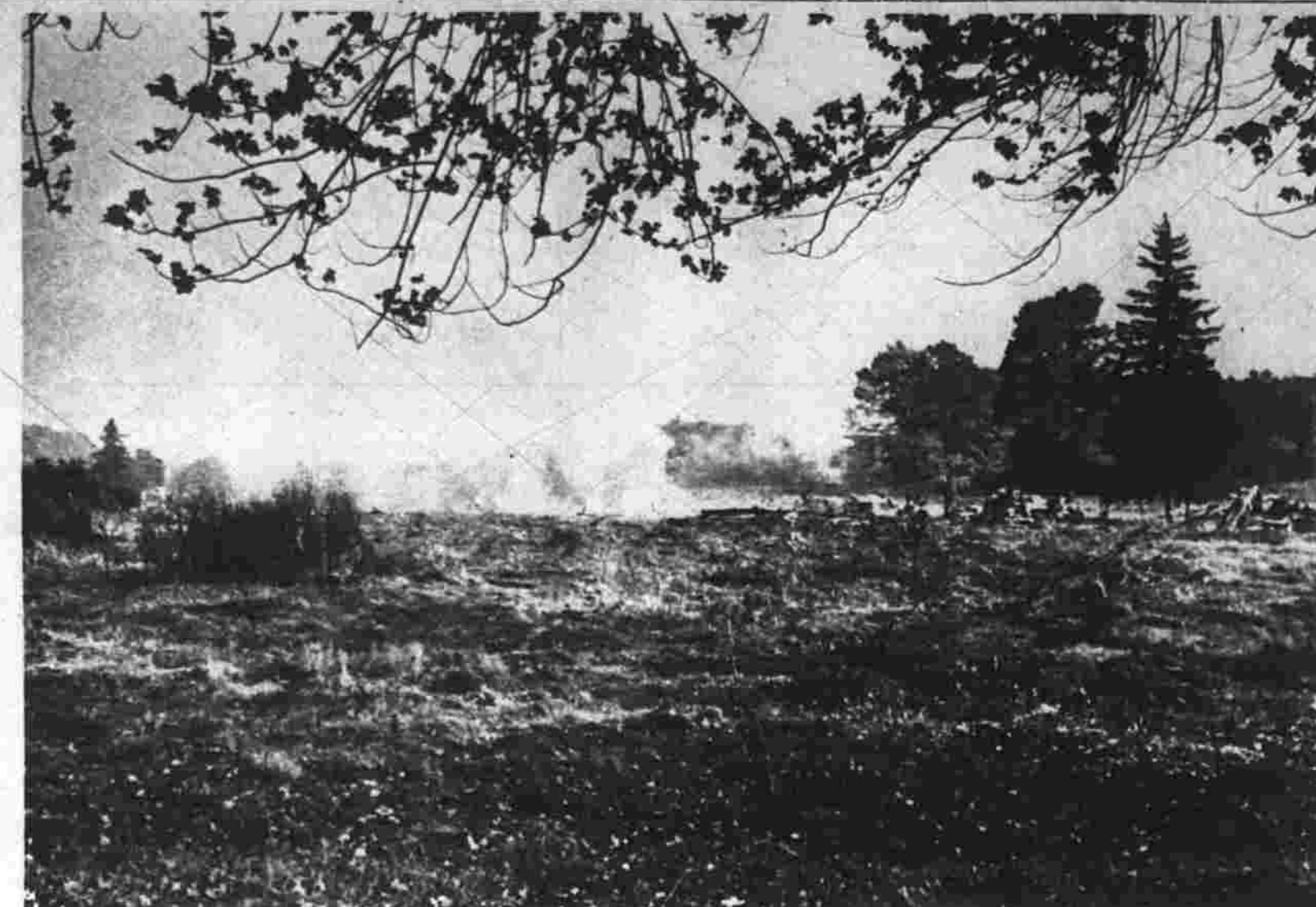
