Ugly Mayhem, Pretty Flowers In a better world, one would not even have to consider making such a choice. In a more decent world, neither set of circumstances would come into existence. In a more reasonable world, there would be less ugly mayhem along the presidential campaign trail in the United States and there would be fewer hypocritical flowers along the trail of Russian troops returning to their own home soil after their mission in Czech-

But if we had to make a choice between the mayhem and the flowers, between the disorder and the order, between the turbulence and the discipline we would choose the mayhem.

The heckling on the American political compaign trail this fall has been ugly - ugly in its methods and ugly in its purposes. It has turned the traditional emocratic free marketplace of ideas into a raucous contest of noisemaking and lung power. It has aimed at the denial of the right of full speech to candidates for high public office. It will be a fine, clean day in American life when we return to some semblance of respectful public order for the most vital and sacred processes of our democracy In contrast to such jangled disorder n our domestic democratic scene, con sider the descriptions from Moscow of the lovely order and the gentle tossing of flowers which has accompanied the march-back, through Poland to their some bases in what used to be East Prussia, of some of the Russian troops who took part in last summer's invasion

One can believe the descriptions of the congratulatory flowers and slogans and spesches along the marching route because one knows that a totalitarian state has the power to see that such things do actually happen. It has the power to order that the returning troops be accorded the welcome of heroes who have ecompleted a worthy and patriotic mission. It has the power to do this on the soil of East Prussia which is now under its own sovereignty. It has the power to order and get similar demonstration or the soil of Poland, a satellite a shade

And as for heciders of the type which disturb the American political scene in the current campaign, they are not in evidence along the route of the Russian go to Siberia that badly, or because those who are willing to risk Siberia get it as soon as they utter the wrong word or letter the wrong sentiment. We have troubles with our freedom. and they sametimes give us a messy. disordered feeling, but the troubles we have in freedom are as nothing to the deeper and more terrible troubles we would have inside the ordered discipline of the totalitarian state.

We ought not to have to choose. For our part, we ought to be able to achieve more respect for our own democratic processes without sacrificing democracy itself. And in that effort we should be cheered by the comforting certainty that if we do not surrender democracy and reedom, sooner or later, by those who, for the historical moment, strew flowers beneath the feet of their own oppressors

There are moments in these feverish

nours when the recital of a soft word mindless incitement to riot. Rarely have such diverse voices seemed joined in a chorus of agitated animosity; it is not often that any mayor anywhere has a nultaneously heard teacher and police The vindictive delight of some of Mr Lindsay's partisan enemies is under standable. What must be more depress ing is the timidity and silence of other men who recognize that he he has been

trying with utmost solemnity to grapple with problems that defy any easy solu This is hardly to suggest that his Adinistration has been free from error, n past or present crises. But the attack to which he is now being subjected goes far beyond legitimate dispute over com

plex issues of judgment. It involves fanastic caricatures of the man. To depict him as a union-buster is as emote from truth as the allegation that he is guilty of private religious or racia prejudice. Yet all of us have heard suc absurdities angrily shouted in recent days by citizens with no previous record of tantrums. It is almost an indignity to defend him against these unwhispere mpaigns; yet one again feels obliged to do so. As I have written before, I have known few men in public or pe sonal life as deeply reverent toward the

rights of man as John Lindsay.

What has really gone wrong stems in

large measure from a quality that some will acknowledge as a deep - seated idealism and that cynics will dismiss as incorrigible innocence. He has had an instinctive faith that, in a crowded city where the interdependence of life is pointedly dramatized each day, he could effectivity appeal to the rule of reason. On that twilight day of Jan. 2, 1966, when he took office while the city's subway and bus lines were crippled by a transit strike, he proclaimed his belief in what he called "a simple, perhaps old-fashioned concept . . that the public interest must prevail over special interest. the good of the community over the declaimed by the cynics as proof that our

cities are no longer governable."

He patiently enlisted talented men for key posts and sought to replace tired hacks. In labor disputes he invoked the notion that fair-minded mediation could a substituted for the backroom "fix" he was soon to discover that old customs were deeply entrenched. Perhaps the kind of "government ostponement" that often prevailed i he Wagner era is the best we can attain. Yet it can also be argued that much of the present turmoil is attributable to evances that grew out of postpone nent — especially the resentments ghetto parents over the inferior education their kids were getting over so many years. That, after all, is how decentralisation got its start; the aspirations ! reflects will not be easily crushed. The tragedy is that John Doar, the new distinguished head of the Board of Education who might still break the psy-

chological deadlock, may not be given a fighting chance. Conceivably Lindsay will choose not o run again and his adversaries will have had their poor triumph. It is not really Lindsay who is under fire; the anualty will be his dream that New York could become a truly model city passion. I plead here for nothing more than an end to the hysteria being unleashed against a decent, dedicated man who dared to envisage himself presiding over an island of sanity. - JAMES A. HOLLYWOOD (AP) -Auto-

mobiles play an important part in the television career of De-troit-born Martin Milner.

pair of cops patrolling their beat in a squad car. After accepting the part of senior officer Pete Malloy a year ago, Milner logged 200 or more hours in the field, tagging along with real policemen in cruiser cars, Dressed in civilian clothes and mildly disguised behind a pair of heavy horn-rismmed glasses Milner watched and made notes as the men handled attuations that ranged from died situations that ranged from murder to accidents. His first encounter was with a violent psychopath threatening to kill his wife and mother-in-law.

Just as "Dragnet" over the years has been as void of vio-lence as "The Donna Reed Show" in spite of its subject matter, so too will be "Adam

"We've got six shows in the can now," said Milner, "and al-though there have been some shots fired, no one has been hit. I haven't fired a gun and no one has used fists."

The series, again like "Drag-net," has the blessing of the lo-cal police force, and its stories will be based on real Los Angeles cases. In many cases po-licemen involved in a case-adapted to television will serve

"I have a definite preference between the two men," Milner said, "and I certainly feel that actors like other people have a right to make their political choices known. But I'm going to ple are going to think about me as a Los Angeles policeman."
