They go to parties so they can sometimes harder work than one of their varsity workouts; that the parties are rarely fun because they are always on the wrong side of the social situa-

But for a student who must earn part of his college costs, tending bar at private or busi-ness functions can be lucrative. Depending on the amount of time he can afford away from his studies his studies, a man may earn; anywhere from \$800 to \$1,500 a "The University urges all stu-

dents on scholarships to earn part of it in cold cash," says John LoBrecque of Lewiston, Maine, co-manager of the Bar-tenders Agency at Columbia University University.
"It isn't easy either, but when you have to work you have got to make the time in which to do

"There are 22 student agen-cies at Columbia," said Edwin Harnden of Corvallis, Ore., Lo-Brecque's administrative comanager, "and they give students an opportunity to earn while they learn."

LoBrecque, a senior industrial engineering student, and Harnden, a junior history major, share a tiny office at 617 W. 116th St. in an ancient apartment with several of the other agencies. Students register for work here, and get their assign-ments in the faculty supervised

SIS MENTMETING To have a Columbia University student tend bar, a host pays him a \$15 minimum, plus \$4 for each additional hour after four hours, plus transportation costs if the party is out of the city. "The agency always has as many jobs as are needed, and we can always fill a request,' says LoBrecque. "But three weeks before New Year's Eve we are booked solid." The agency advertises in the Village Voice, Park East and West Side News and the majori-

Manhattan. But students will gladly travel to Long Island, Westchester or those over 21 to New Jersey.



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
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

The Taunting Of Nixon

It is becoming increasingly apparent, as the Presidential campaign enters its homestretch, that the master minds and high minds and low minds of the Democratic campaign strategy have all agreed on one last ditch hope.

It is a hope that they can provoke and insult and torment the Republican candidate into "losing his cool." Then, their theory goes, the electorate will see an "old Nixon" in action and turn away from that spectacle, disillusioned

As the Democratic campaign designers pursue this strategy, what we see and hear from them is the continuous spintter of mud-throwing, the dull thude of repeated efforts to deliver blows below What the Democrats hope to gain from

this is not so much directly the deposit of mud upon and the delivery of blows to the Republican candidates. What they hope to have happen is, to give them credit, a little more subtle.

They hope to provoke and tempt Mr. Nixon into throwing mud. They hope to provoke and taunt him into trying to hit below the belt too. If they should succeed, they would

then stand aside, in an pose of injured purity, and ask the American voting public to see what horrible campaign strategies that wicked man Nixon is employing.

The Democratic strategy seems to be working and in a way they themselves must have trouble believing. They are, by their brand of attack, by the odor of their mud and the angle of their blown, conferring upon Mr. Nixon just about the greatest favor within the power of any opposition. They are beginning to create a feeling of sympathy for him.

And they are beginning to make conscientious voters wonder why, with the campaign at its climax, they should so clearly abandon the effort to discuss issues and head so openly into an atmosphere of vituperation and harangue. Whatever alternative they have been offering to Nixon and the Republican ticket, they have now begun tarnishing

themselves, as their last big stroke of their campaign. It could turn out this way: that the more the Democrats rant on their platforms, and put the dirty digs into their political commercials the more they confirm the independent voters of the country that this is indeed the year to give their votes to Richard Nixon and

to the whole Republican ticket. It is such a year, in the opinion of this tewapaper, because this nation's very capacity to govern itself has come to be at stake, which means that one of the very first tests we should ask ourselves about any candidate and any party is whether they are first capable of

It is a strange campaign when it proves to be the party out of power which is the party of affirmation, and the party in power which tries to play on the potential suspicions and fears of the voters. But it is also a campaign which makes its own recommendations
