Youth Rall **Decides Life** Doesn't 'Rot'

"Does Life Really Rot?" Not according to 300 teen-ag

Not according to 500 teen-agers who attended the first interficith youth rally held in this area over the weekend. The boys and girls came from 11 Protestant and Catholic churches in Vernon, Ellington and Tolland and met at the Vernon Congregational Church. "Does Life Really Rot?" was the theme. They saw and heard some evidence that life can be pretty tough for particular people. Tragic news clippings were read to them in rapid succession and a movie explored the personal impact of sudden and complete blindness on a young man.

The youths then divided into discussion groups of from 12 to 20 persons to discuss the question of whether or not it would be better if certain people were

physically and mentally handi-capped, those born into starva-tion and war and the permanently disabled. Even in the short time allots to these discussions a feeling was expressed that it's better to be here at any cost than not

at all, and that everyone's life has some purpose.

They were quick to point out the limitations of their own experiences. "Nothing around us is that lousy." someone said, but they couldn't think of anything worse than not living.

Even one admission that "Life is a big mess interspersed by moments of happiness" managed to sound optimistic. "Joie devivre" prevailed.




