

Nixon, Johnson to Hold White House Conference

KEY BRISCAVNE, Fla. (AP)—Richard M. Nixon and President Johnson meet today in a White House conference that may determine whether the President-elect takes an active role before his inauguration in the search for a Vietnam peace.

President and Mrs. Johnson are hosts to President-elect and Mrs. Nixon at a luncheon. Later the men are to discuss problems of government while the women talk about keeping house in the executive mansion.

Nixon told newsmen Saturday he might send personal representatives abroad—presumably to the Paris peace talks or to

assignments in the administration which leave office Jan. 20. Nixon has said repeatedly that he would go either to Saigon or Paris should Johnson feel such travel would be helpful in ending the Vietnam war.

Year's First Snowfall Blankets Connecticut

Snow and heavy rains brought numerous accidents, some power failures and hazardous-driving warnings in Connecticut Sunday.

A highway fatality Saturday night in Pomfret was unrelated to the large storm which moved up the Atlantic Coast. Out-of-state traffic accidents claimed the lives of two Connecticut men.

Snow fell in Hartford for the first time this year with accumulations of up to three inches until rains washed most of it away. Snow was also reported farther south in the state in Hamden, Meriden, Bethany and Newtown.

Snow Causes Town Crews No Problems

Yesterday's inch and a half snowfall in Manchester caused no problems for the town's highway crews, according to Highway Superintendent Pascentelli.

The inch and a half estimate in Pascentelli's report said that the snowfall, mixed with intermittent rain, caused muddy and slushy conditions—more annoying than troublesome.

Pascentelli reported that two trucks and crews were dispatched at 10 a.m. yesterday, to sand the main thoroughfares and intersections. They were out by 3 p.m., when 18 crews, in trucks mounted with snowplows, worked to midnight, plowing—as many town streets as they could cover.

The men then were sent home. Today is a holiday for town employees, with only two standby highway crews on duty.

As for tomorrow, "it's back to picking up leaves, weather permitting," Pascentelli said. He added, "We can only hope that the leaves are not frozen into ice blocks."

Nine accidents were reported by Manchester police during the stormy day, two of them in the same spot within 20 minutes of each other.

Kenneth L. Beaulieu, 18, of 135 Loomis st., told police that he lost control of his car, skidded off the west side of the

road. The weather bureau said that it recorded 1.26 inches of melted precipitation at Bradley International Airport in Windsor Locks, and at New Haven 1.08 inches fell—mostly in the form of rain.

There were two inches of snow on the ground at Bradley Airport. During a 4½ hour period Sunday morning "the rate of snow to water was approximately 2-to-1. This accounts for the extreme wetness and heaviness of the snow," the weatherman said.

The combination of snow and rain was due to upper altitude temperatures right on the line separating the two types of precipitation, the Weather Bureau said.

Red China Seat Asked By Cambodia

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Cambodia urged the United Nations today to seat Red China as the lawful representative of 700 million people. But the Nationalist Chinese said this would be giving "aid and comfort to a bogus regime."

Cambodia and Nationalist China opened the annual China debate with their opposing views. As soon as Nationalist Chinese Foreign Minister Wei Tuo-ming took the floor, the Soviet bloc delegations walked out. Communist Yugoslavia left a member in its seat. Others who walked out included Albania, Cuba and Cambodia.

Cambodian Ambassador Hnot Sambath called on the 125-nation General Assembly to bring to an end "the injustice perpetrated by the U.S. government against the Chinese people."

The nationalist spokesman introduced a Communist-backed resolution to give Peking the seat now held by National China. He said that the China representation question was not an "important matter" requiring a two-thirds majority but "simply a question of control of credentials."

Sambath called for rejection of an "two-Chinas" formula which would give seats to both Nationalist and Communist China.

"The United States," he said, "must restore the province of Taiwan (Formosa) to China which was torn away from Japan."

Nationalist China's foreign minister, Wei Tuo-ming declared that nothing has happened since Peking lost its bid for a seat a year ago "to warrant the reconsideration of the China question."

"The Chinese Communist regime has never had the moral consent of the Chinese people," Wei said. "It has never been regarded by them as the legally constituted government of China."

Wei said the Nationalist government now functioning on Formosa "is the only government capable of articulating the wishes and aspirations of the Chinese people."

The Nationalist minister accused the supporters of Peking of presenting a false picture of the situation on the Chinese

Must Try to Reach Masses

Nixon Faces Problem of Unity

(Ed. Note: The following article is the third in the five-part series on the outlook for Richard Nixon's administration currently appearing consecutively in The Herald.)

The new president has done a remarkable job this year in uniting the Republicans. Bringing a satisfactory degree of unity and stability to the country, however, will be immensely more difficult given the conditions that are producing such violent disunity.

"Something new is happening in America," Mary McCarthy, the author and critic, wrote recently, "and whoever is elected cannot count on a return to tranquility."

The upheaval occurring in the United States is part of a worldwide revolution cuts through the church, the home, the neighborhood, the schools, the universities—in reality through all the traditional institutions. There is a limit to what a president and a federal government can do about it.

In Nixon's case, furthermore, he is diametrically isolated from the Negroes, from the poor, the young and the dissent-

ers. In a political campaign deliberately focused on the white middle class he passed up a valuable opportunity to reach those very elements who will make it most difficult for him to stabilize the country.

Nixon will turn immediately to trying to improve his standing with the Negro community through conferences and through appointments of Negroes to high posts, almost surely including the cabinet.

One such candidate is former New York criminal court judge Samuel R. Pierce Jr., a young Yale-educated Republican whose broad civic activities embrace not only judicial matters but labor relations and the city government.

Some regard him as able enough to be considered for Secretary of Housing and Urban Development or Secretary of Labor.

Very soon Nixon is expected to hold a conference of Negro leaders from various fields. Then in his first 100 days he will attempt token beginnings of his long-range program for getting private funds to work in the ghettoes.

Through television and White House conferences this winter he will try to speak to the Negroes and demonstrate his concern for their advancement.

"Nixon is going to come through stronger and stronger as a compassionate man," Charles Rhyne, his friend and Duke Law School classmate predicted. "Nixon will come through as a fellow who gives blacks a dignity they never had. He will give them jobs."

In a recent speech on the presidency he committed himself to "an administration made up of Republicans, Democrats and Independents, and drawn from politics, from career government, from business, from professions—including not only executives and administrators but scholars and thinkers."

That he will install an effective element of democratic dissent in his administration defies belief. But in search of national unity he contemplates appointing Democrats who are somewhat left of center. In selecting Negroes for important jobs, for example, Nixon will probably have to choose Democrats, since so few outstanding Negroes have been associated with his own campaign.

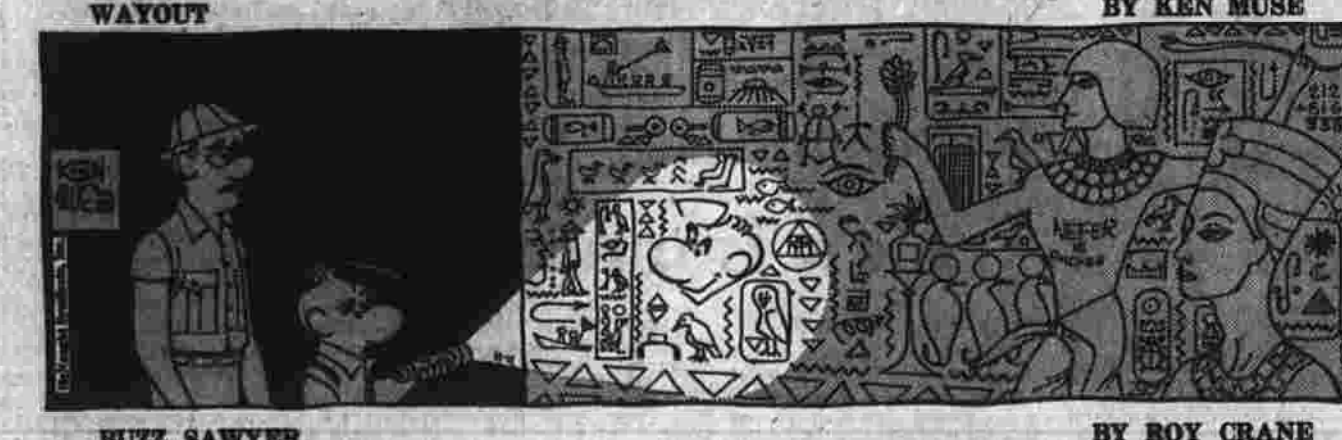

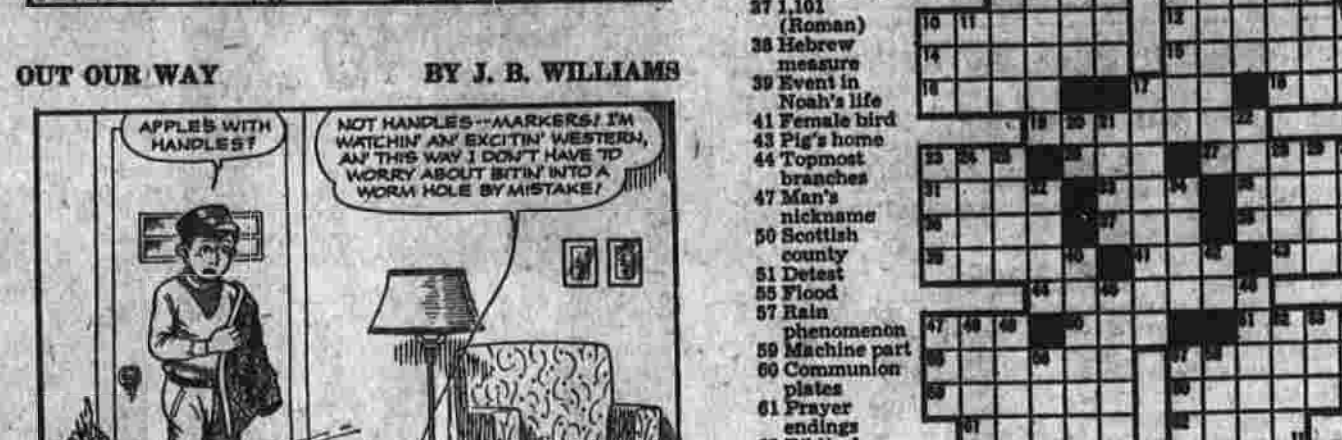

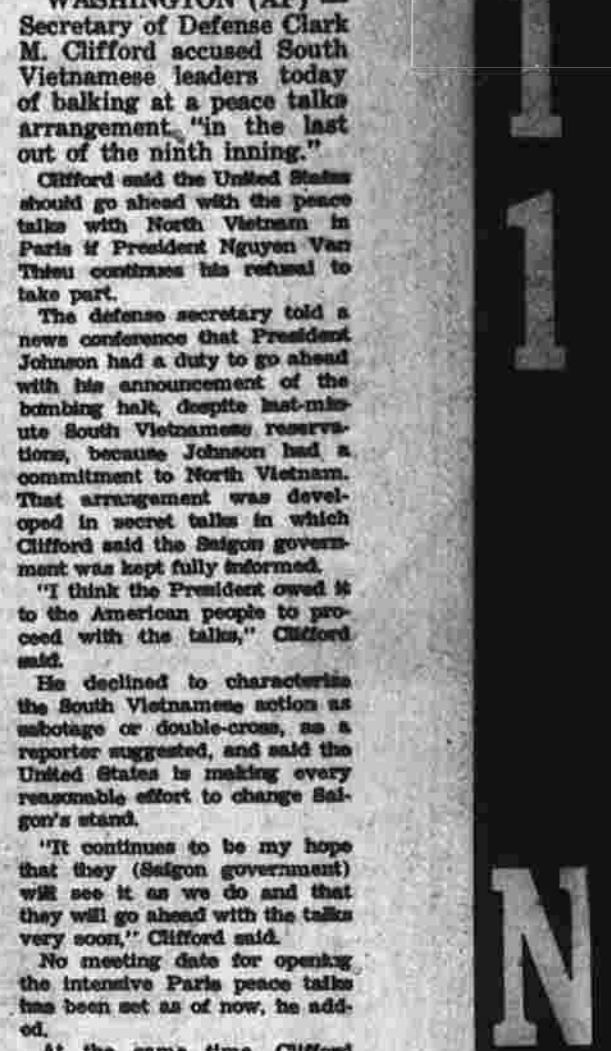
