UConn Protestors Give Up Building

STURDS, Conn. (AP)—About 100 anti-war protesters occupied a University of Connecticut administration building for about 14 hours before they marched out singing today.

The head of the state police said protesters they were about to be arrested a few minutes before they marched out in two rows of three, arm in arm.

The protesters declared an amnesty for all students and faculty involved in a previous anti-war demonstration Oct. 30.

Unarmed state policemen were seen on the campus, although several plainclothes state police officers were involved in discussions with the protesters.

After a confrontation in which they refused to discuss the protest with University President Homer Babidge Jr., the protesters were set up blocking the door during the night and someone posted a sign saying "No entry. This building is closed."

Babidge appeared at the door of the building this morning and passed a note to the protesters which said "In your interest and in the interest of the university I plead with you to leave Gilkey Hall. When no reply was received, he called for assistance from the state police.

Non-uniformed state policemen were seen on the campus, although several plainclothes state police officers were involved in discussions with the protesters.

Babidge had indicated Monday, when a sit-down began in Gilkey Hall, that no attempt would be made to remove the protesters until their demonstration remained peaceful.

He declined to characterize the South Vietnamese action as sabotage or double-cross, as a reporter suggested, and said the United States is making every reasonable effort to change Saigon's stance.

"It continues to be my hope that they (Saigon government) will see it as we do and that they will go ahead with the talks very soon," Clifford said.

No meeting date for opening the Geneva talks peace talks has been set as of now, he added.

At the same time, Clifford said North Vietnam violated the understanding between it and the United States regarding the demilitarized zone and some bombarding of South Vietnamese cities.





Specialist at U.N. Speaks 66 Tongues



UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Most people who learn a second language consider it quite a feat, but there is a man at the United Nations who knows 66 of them.

"This does not include dialects of course," said Georges Schmidt, 53-year-old specialist in the U.N. translation department.

"For example, I have studied about 15 Arabic dialects, but I count them as only one language."

Schmidt, who works in a small office cluttered with boxes of documents and shelves of books in about 80 tongues, has the look of a born scholar. His eyes light up as he recalls the dozens of languages he has acquired in school and in his travels to 88 countries.

"I have made a hobby of linguistics because I am interested in people," said Schmidt, who became intrigued by languages at the age of 10. "The best way to study people is to learn the tongue they speak."

Most U.N. translators work in two and occasionally three of the official U.N. languages besides their mother tongue. Schmidt works in all five plus various others as a terminologist, or expert on new words and hard-to-find terms.

"I use English, French, Spanish and Russian regularly and Chinese less often," he said in matter-of-fact tones. "And often I have to draw on other tongues."

Born in Strasbourg, France, Schmidt spoke French and Alsatian as a child, but he soon raised his sights. In high school, he studied through courses in Latin, Greek, English, Italian and German. Before graduation he had won a nationwide Latin contest and became a linguist to reckon with.

Proceeding to Paris to study for the foreign service with hope of becoming a consul, Schmidt enrolled at the Sorbonne. Languages still fascinated him, however, and he also entered the prestigious School of Oriental Languages.

Before his student days were over, Schmidt had acquired a fairly thorough knowledge of Spanish, Russian, Chinese, Arabic, Turkish, Persian, Urdu, Malay, Japanese, Czech, Polish, Serbo-Croat and Hungarian.

In 1937-38, he served his military duty in Lebanon and Syria and pursued his study of the languages of the Middle East.

Scientists Find Scores of Drugs Without Value

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — A panel of 200 scientists has found scores of drugs tested in a study for the federal Food and Drug Administration "totally ineffective."

The panel called for rechecking of more than 2,000 drugs—two-thirds of those tested so far in the study.

Dr. Robert K. Cannon of the National Academy of Sciences told a group of science writers Monday that revisions just necessary because "the labels were misleading and deceptive."

"They left the impression that they could do what it cannot do," he said. "To put bluntly, there was not a fair representation of the drug in question."

Dr. Cannon reported on a two-year study of drugs placed on the market between 1958 and 1962. The study now is about 67 per cent complete, and there is no reason to suspect that the two-thirds figure will change when the study of 3,000 formulations is finished, he said.

The study, being made by a National Academy of Sciences panel at the FDA's request, covers drugs introduced prior to 1962—about 85 per cent of all those now on the market.

Those introduced since 1962 have been subject to laws requiring that label claims be substantiated.

Dr. Cannon said 8 per cent of the drugs tested so far have been "rated totally ineffective" despite elaborate claims.

The biochemist declined to name brands, saying that will be made when the study is completed, probably early next year.

Only a small fraction of the drugs covered in the study can be bought over the counter, Dr. Cannon said. The rest are prescription items.

Dr. Cannon made the preliminary disclosure of the drug study at the annual briefings of the Council for the Advancement of Science Writing.




