





MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — A change of inwyers and a delay were granted today in the murder trial of James Earl Ray, charged with the suber amassimition of Dr. Martin Lother King Jr. last April 4.

Texas inwyer Percy Foreman took over as chief defense counsel, replacing Alabama's Arthur Hanes, who was ousted by Ray two days before the trial was scheduled to open this morning.

No date was set for the trial, but Foreman requested a 90-day continuance.

Criminal Court Judge Preston Battle recessed court after granting the change of attorneys, and the continuance motion—indicating he will arrounce a trial date after the recess.

Hanes, who charged in an interview before court opened, that the switch was a subterfuge to gath a delay which he opposed, was directed to put up a \$1,000 bond on a contempt of court citation by the judge.

Battle, who will preside at the trial, said Hanes violated his order against pre-trial statements about the case.
