



More Persuasive Than Picketing When the police of New York City recently wished to indulge in some tactic which would call public attention to their bargaining demands, they embarked on temporary abandonment of enforcement of some of the city's minor laws like parking bans. And New Yorkers and their guests, responding to the invitation to ignore the law, had a little interval in which they parked where and as they pleased.

It has been a much better type of campaign the Parkway Police of Long Island have put on in their effort to gain wage increase for themselves. They decided to call public attention to their demands and to put pressure on the authorities by putting on a super-efficient enforcement of all the laws under their

So, for several days, starting last Wednesday, the Long Island Parkway Police were veritable law enforcement tigers. If they caught somebody going 51 miles an hour in a 60 mile an hour zone, they gave him a summons. If they caught a motorist going over the posted 25 mile an hour speed for construction zones, they nabbed him.

The interesting part of the result is that, as the number of summons has gone up on the Long Island Parkway, the number of accidents has gone down. Statistically, the daily average for accidents on the Parkway used to be a little over eight accidents a day. Under the average has been out to a little under two accidents a day. Popie haven't been getting places

quite as fast as they used to. But more of them have been getting there in one So one interesting thing about the Long

Island police tactic is that it has been saving life and limb. The other interesting thing about it is, of course, that, although its objectives are the same as a strike, or a non-performance of duty, the Long Island tactic

has been to demonstrate what fine police

the police in question are, and how efficient they can be at their tank. These Long Island Parkway Police actually didn't quite intend to be as idealistic as that. They had their tongues n their cheeks, and they were really trying to make a public nuisance of themselves with their over-sealous enforcement tactics.

But a certain principle survived their own intentions. It is that there may be something in relying upon good performance, rather than upon no performace, to plead the case for any group of pub-

Must Tides Always Defy Change? It must be no fun, for those in positions

President de Gaulle has, we should think, about as strong a willing power as any single individual of our time, it has frequently been a willing power strong enough to move animate objects. Yet, precious and valuable his capacity to influence the minds and hearts of his fellow countrymen may have proved, we suspect that if he were able to choose any one single power to exercise above all oth-

"Planning for the Future," a just-issued study of Connecticut's major corridor needs up to the year 2000. The study was prepared by the State Highway De-partment for the Connecticut Intervegional Planning Program, with all kinds of state and federal cooperation.

By the year 2,000, according to the report, there will be approximately 5 million people in Connecticut, just about double the population of 1980. The num-ber of cars will be approximately 2.5

ber of cars will be approximately 2.5 million, two and a half times the present number. The total number of weekly trips made by these vehicles is expected to reach 9 million, a 125 per cent increase over the 1960 level. Meniden is right in the middle of the worst of this expansion, according to further increase in use along the s ready congested shoreline from Green-wich to New Haven. Major corridors will be called for between New Haven Danbury, Waterbury and Hartford along the course of nearly-completed Route I-84.

The prospect of another major high-way expansion in the already denselypopulated and vehicle-laden segment of the state has given pause even to the planners and highway people.
