

We Take Villages As Paris Stalls The opening of negotiations at Paris, maddeningly inconclusive as the negotiations have been in themselves, nevertheless marked the opening of a new kind of war in Vietnam.

In this new phase the American-South Vietnamese strategy has been to take advantage of the relative hill in other kind of operations to specialize in the occupation of villages hitherto controlled by the Victoong, or at least neutralized by the occasional or nightly presence of

In the Saigon area alone, some 250 namiets which are home to some 300, 00 peasants are supposed to have come under government occupation and contro during just the past few weeks. This is the big program now being pushed by our side in Vietnam, and at least one o our generals has been quoted with the opinion that any enemy tactic to draw out and prolong the negotiations at Paris will really operate to our advantage, giving us opportunity to get even further along with the exertion of our military power in South Vietnam.

As in the past, a Vietnam village seems secure for the government only so long as it can be provided with what amounts to a garrison of government troops sufficient in number to prevent any Viet cong guerrilla incursions into the village But, in the current phase of the war, with North Vietnamese infiltration into

South Vietnam apparently at a low level, and with the enemy strategy apparently limited to sporadic raids from sanctuaries in Cambodia or Laos and to small unit terroristic activities deeper nside South Vietnam, the American and South Vietnamese capacity to extend permanent protection to the villages has ncreased. At the moment, we seem e haven't really been able to try to sold in all the previous years of the Such reports from the battlefield indi-

cate that our strategists in Vietnam may be very well satisfied with prospects of long and troublesome and complicated egotiations at Paris, and suggest that, to put it mildly, our commanders in Vietnam will not be bringing very much pressure on either Washington or Paris to have the United States or South Vietmam soften any stand in order to speed the truce talks up. Prograstination in making peace usual

ly comes from that side which thinks to probably has the more to gain from the continued attrition of war. Reports of the action in Vietnam would seem to indicate that we have now clearly reached the stage where it is the enemy who is hurting most. That can be good news if it does not result in the development of such a great Midng for continuation of the war, not only in our military com mand in Vietnam, but in our shifting political command at Washington, that we forget we are supposed to be seeking peace, and go back to our one-time pursuit of full military victory. If that becomes our objective again, there are others beside the Vietcong and North Vietnam who will try to see to it that our difficulties are increased again. It begins to look as if we have a clear

upper hand in the field in Saigon, and therefore something of an upper hand in the negotiations at Paris. We cannot really convert such advantages, however, unless we are willing to cash them in for a reasonable price. Setting such a price, somewhere short of surrender for North Vietnam, but equivalent to a defermive victory for South Vietnam, should be the first and most fervent business of our new national leadership

We have never found White House memoirs enhancing the reputation either of the White House occupants of the time or that of the authors. Beyond that, we doubt that what has been revealed has very often been of such real historical importance as to offer a real key to the history of the time. In summary, it's all right with us it Mr. Nixon succeeds in drawing the White House curtains.

"The Dick Cavett Show," which arrived last March as the freshest, brightest and most civilized daytime program in the schedule, probably won't be around in the new year. The contract for the Cavett show runs out in December, and it has only two chances slim and none-of being renewed.






