sent without leave more than a month. He said he was last stationed at Ft. Clayton in the Panama Canal Zone.

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

Only The Weapons Change

Two United States destroyers have now steamed into the Black Sea, which Russia, quite naturally, regards as something of a Russian lake.

The reason our two destroyers have steamed into a body of water the Rusmans would like to consider a private lake of their own is that Russia, for the past several months, has been steaming its warships conspicuously and ostentatiously into the Mediterranean, which has been almost everybody's private lake, at one stage or another in its history. For most of our contemporary history, the Mediterranean has been a British lake. But lately it has become something of an American lake, although it would be more diplomatic to refer to it as a NATO lake.

It is into this NATO lake and into confrontation with American naval power that Russia has now moved units of its own fleet. Russia is in the Medeterranean at last, after centuries of wanting to be there, and Russia is not only there with its ships, but with vassal states able to offer its ships fuel and harbor.

Neither in the way the Russian ships in the Mediterraenan shadow our fleet. nor in the way our two destroyers in the Black Sea annoy the Russians is there immediate danger of actual con-

We don't want to fight each other with our ships or with anything else. We don't intend to fight each other, either, and each of us is probably becoming highly skilled in the business of staging the confrontation which is not quite a conrontation.

But we cannot resist testing each other's nerve and will. We cannot resist the old game of showing the flag forward, challenging places,

Sometimes, in history, this process goes on for decades, never producing anything more than some slight "incident" which gets a footnote in the tistory books. And sometimes the practice and rehearsal of confrontation sets the stage for an actual test of strength which finds the maneuverers finally at each other's throats, trampling over all their neighbors in the process.

So there we are, Russia and America, playing the oldest version of power politics confrontation in the world, and neither of us able to guarantee ourselves that it will not wind up, in the end, more seriously than we would choose or intend. How far, then, we must ask ourselves at this juncture, has civilization and the conduct of nations improved and progressed since the beginning of history? Doesn't the answer have to be that we have never altered the game, merely the weapons we employ to show the dag? The weapons are a remarkable display of the fruits of human ingenuity. The use to which they are still put suggests that the ever-startling brilliance of our technology is matched by a monotonous moronity in the way westry to run the political side of our world. The progress from the club to the nuclear missile is clear and indisputable. But the heart and soul of man, as it expresses itself in what man has his nations do in his name, is essentially the same today as it has always been. We will still see, no matter what the risk, whose lake is really private.

How To Invest In The Future

The company involved was in the wrecking business, and some of its jobs, just in New York City, had included demolition of the old Metropolitan Opera House, the Times Tower, the Polo Grounds, the Grand Central Palace and 24 New York World's Fair Pavilions. Somehow, it had missed

out on Pennsylvania Station. The mere recital of such project creates a magnificent impression of handsome activities and contracts and invites the thought that here indeed, in the business of demolition, lies one of this nation's greatest future industries. Not only are the great old buildings of the past being consigned to deliberate wreck and ruin at an increasing pace. They, after all, would provide only a limited backlog of contracts for the demolition firms, even if we decided to get rid of all of them everywhere. The truly bright future hope for the demolitioners lies in the character of the new buildings we are crecting. Many

of them give us no reason to love or ad-

mire them in the first place, and will tire our eyes and our minds much more swiftly than the old classics they have replaced. For every building we demolish because we think it needed demolishing after 50 or 75 years we are building new ones that will need demolishing in 20 or 25 years. If you are a wise one looking for sound investment in America's future, then, the cue is plain; buy stock in any good healthy forward looking wrecking company.

Must Police Become Military?

The staff report to the president's comitssion investigating the violence in Chicago during the Democratic National Convention terms the events on the Wednesday night on which Hubert Humphrey was nominated "a police riot." It employs this description because police ommanders on the scene were unable to control some individual policemen who acted as badly as the most excessive of the demonstrators in breaking up the sitdown in front of the hotel that served s headquarters for the principal contenders for the presidential nomination. That police cannot cope with rioters effectively when individual policemen allow their own pent-up anger to supersede obedience to their superiors on the scene is obvious, because it becomes impossible for the police to apply force intelligently and precisely where it is required to restore order. Instead you have ndividual police and individual rioters engaging in individual fights. This produces the kind of chaos the agitators have calculated upon in the first place. Unlike TV commentators who had their own ax to grind on that Wednesday night, the report does recognize a connection between the excessive police reaction and what had gone before. It concedes that the police had been "goaded repeatedly by the vilest conceivable language, by parrages of rocks, broken bottles and human excrement" for five days before they finally waded so feroclously into their tormentors. It mentions also that demonstrators with razor blades stuck in their shoes had kicked at policemen It says that this behavior was "calculated," as indeed it was,

That the report puts the burden of the blame on the police entitles us to draw one conclusion: A society that accepts calculated, lawless warfare upon the police in the "new political tactic must be prepared either to accept the inevitable ensuing chaos as normal in our civilization, or to accept the transforma tion of the police in our urban society from a civillian guard into a rigidly trained, militarily disciplined organization, a regrettable change that could have us all living under martial law as normal condition of society before very long. The National Guardsmen in the Chicago streets remained, regardless of provocation, iron-disciplined military who acted only on the commands o their officers, just as regular Army units confronted by similar earlier provocations during the Pentagon obeyed their military commanders instead of their individual human reaction to outrageous

Members of the armed forces, regula or National Guard, undergo rigid training as military personnel psychologically conditioned to military disciplines. This has not been required heretofore, at least to the same extent, of the civilian guards who police our cities because they has not, up to now, been thought of primarily as soldiers.

If society continues to tolerate calculat ed public disorders with tormenting of olicemen as a legitimate political tactic t must either accept the chaos this produces or turn its police departments into organizations trained in the same disiplined responses, as are soldiers. In either case, our society could soon lose all its civil liberties.

The sensible thing, although perhaps not the most expedient politically, would be for the public to insist on a community tone which does not equate kicking policemen with razor blades, making them targets for rocks and broken bottles and human fecal matter, not to mention abuse in the vilest conceivable language, with extension of the freedoms of speech and assembly guaranteed by our Bill of Rights.

The report is a good account of who hit whom in Chicago and with what. But there must be more to come, an in quiry to determine just who planned all this calculated tormenting of civilian police by a convergence of activists from many parts of the courtry. And incidentally we trust it will be disclosed eventually to what extent federal funds were used in the City of New York to export such activists to Chicago at public expense to prevent a major party from holding a convention. There is rather good evidence that what happened in Chicago was the calculated result of planning by persons committed to the politics of confrontation up to and including organized tormenting of another city's civil guards. So long as such mass be havior is condoned by the public and so long as those who plot mob action euphemistically categorized as "kids" exercising the right of free speech and assembly, we can only expect more Chicagos, more disturbances in other cities which will eventually be curbed by militarily disciplined force as in police

The trouble in Chicago, insofar as it. was caused by policemen, was certainly dissimilar to the operations of Hitler's Gestapo. It was rather a case of non-military guards reacting in a most unmilitary way, in disregard of the commands of their auperiors, and in an all

too human response to the feces hurling politicians of confrontation. The trouble in Chicago insofar as it. developed as a planned exercise in hurling human excrement at cops and kicking them with razor blades more closely resembled the rise of Fascism, in which an activist minority sought to wield

political control of events by the use of force was "calculated." Do we approve of that? Chicago policemen who used unrestrained force on their tormentor's should

be punished. But what of the protesters who kicked cops with razor blade- and threw human excrement at them? Do they deserve on-

ly kind words and a pail on the head for their challenging experiment in articipatory democracy? Condone the tormentors and you hasten the day when the civilian police force will be replaced by military force. - AN-SONIA EVENING SENTINEL
