Community College Profile
He Faced the Usual Problems

There are only about 35 Negroes at Manchester Community College despite MCC's open door policy to all qualified students regardless of anything else, including finances, MCC officials explain that the new Greater Hartford Community College which opened in the fall of 1967 takes most of the Hartford area Negroes who live closest to that school.

Figures on community college minorities are more grim work now, according to officials. The students resist questions on race. For example, "of the 250 students now enrolled in South Central Community College in New Haven, 88 said they were American Indians.

Teachers in Hartford area high schools do not feel their Negro students have a chance to get into college and they steer them toward anything else, according to Fitz Walker, Jr., 19, a freshman at Manchester Community College.

Tolland TVAA Needs Now Referred To Selectmen

After meeting for over an hour during which a full report was made on the TVAA's activities, the Board of Finance last night decided they can't act on the association's request for funds for a new ambulance.

"They must go through channels," one finance board member stated, while another questioned "why have they been waiting out time?"

The Board of Finance never told the TVAA representatives to go to the Board of Selectmen to originate their request. After meeting with them at their last meeting, the finance board told TVAA President Jerome Smith to return to last night's meeting with bid costs on at least three ambulances.

The TVAA did this, voting a recommendation for the purchase of a new 1968 Miller-Meteor all steel ambulance at a cost of \$13,000, with a five year warranty.

The TVAA representatives told of two more occasions when the present ambulances failed to start, once with three patients inside. The two occasions were since the last Board of Finance meeting, and one after it had been repaired again.

The finance board got around to determining what action to take on the request at their last meeting, suddenly deciding the request must be initiated through the Board of Selectmen.

Finance board chairman Howard Wolinger suggested the board set up a joint meeting with the selectmen at their next meeting to discuss the bid. He is to act on the request.

The TVAA submitted detailed bids from Miller-Meteor of New York, Park Brothers of Conn., Eastern Coach Sales, Inc. of New York and International Harvester.

The bids covered the 1968 Miller Meteor at \$12,877 net; a 1968 Ford at \$10,400 net; and an International Harvester at \$9,600 net, in addition to a general price quote for used ambulances.

The Miller Meteor contains considerably more equipment than the others and carries a five year warranty on 1969 vehicles. The change motor are by Cadillac. It is constructed of all steel body in contrast with the Cadillac which has a fiberglass roof and side panels.

The finance board again agreed to reprocess the same specifications for the position of head Superintendent. The board will send the state the original job specifications plus those added to later by the Board of Selectmen.

They will have the entire procedure processed by the state to expedite the filling of the position in the fastest possible time.

Due to various complications, the job has been open for nine months, and became a football between the finance board and the Board of Selectmen. The final downfall was the death of Eugene Wansat after he had been offered the position a month ago.

The finance board agreed to use the services of present town auditor Austin Chapman at the 1969 fee.

THERE'S ALWAYS ANOTHER WINDMILL, by Ogden Nash, Little, Brown, \$4.95.

As a good many readers know by now, Ogden Nash seldom gives us a poem that is a sly dig in the ribs as he usually does in his observations about vulnerable moments in all our lives.

There are 101 funny verses in this collection, and many of them are as full as puns as ever ("I Don't Pretend to be Mole's Than 'Thou'"), he also slips in a few exercises in the limerick form.

He varies from typical to topical. He takes an ovalish view of such things as television and the silly Latin names that orthodontists give to birds. He masses (incoherently) about the virtues of squandering money and the vagaries of cooking with herbs. He shudders at the use of non-golf on the banks of postage stamps and deprecates the idea of human locusts attending wedding receptions.

All About Scandinavia

STOCKHOLM (AP) — To a visitor from outside, the Scandinavians live with a dream of harmony—disputed by the nightmare shadow of the enormous Soviet Union.

The dream involves a close-knit Nordic Economic Union, which could go as far as becoming a customs union.

Debated into oblivion over the last 20 years, the idea was revived on Danish government initiative just spring. Committees are studying the prospect in all its complicated details, under instructions to report next year for a political decision.

In 1964, when economic union just west on the rocks, Sweden, Norway and Denmark west into the European Free Trade Association. Within that framework, they achieved something they couldn't manage among themselves—a Nordic free trade area for industrial goods which has proved a boon to inter-Nordic trade.

The thought is that a solid Scandinavian economic bloc—effect a Nordic common market—would have a strong hand one day in negotiating entry into the wider European Common Market, the ultimate goal. But there are fears that the whole project will collapse again Danish and Norwegian industrial interests seem to fear Swedish competition.

"We certainly hope for some sort of a compromise solution at the least," says a Swedish official. "You might say this is a last chance. Something like the case of two lovers who have had their ups and downs, but on the whole have been getting along pretty well, but then suddenly decide to break off the whole affair. Things will never be the same again."

A Danish expert, assessing the prospects, says: "The Danes hope to become Scandinavia's farmers. The Swedes would not mind becoming Scandinavia's bankers, and the Norwegians could become Scandinavia's fishermen. But who would set all that out?"

Scandinavians are working on another problem of common concern—law and order. The Nordic Police Association, representing all the police forces, has drawn attention to the rise of a "mentality of violence" in out films are banned in Norway, but entering Norwegian bus companies run excursions to the Swedish towns across the border for those wanting to see the forbidden movies.

For all their differences, the

open borders, crime syndicate operators, political demonstrators and narcotics traffic for that matter. In Sweden particularly, illegal drug running is said to have risen to astounding proportions.

One published report estimated 300 million narcotic tablets were smuggled into Sweden annually and sold on the black market for an estimated \$120 million. Customs and police officials say only about six million tablets are confiscated yearly.

Norwegian authorities are worried about the extent of drug traffic—mainly from Sweden and Denmark. The dealers are said to be mainly non-Scandinavians. Norwegian police have sharpened the penalties for drug smuggling. In the past sentences ran from a few months up to a year. Now, a person caught profiting from narcotic deals can serve up to six years in jail.

The Nordic Police Association is demanding an over-all modernization of police forces, better training, better equipment and better pay and working conditions to attract more recruits.

As for the common nightmare, the Scandinavians are just about at the point of shaking it off and hoping it won't recur.

It was just as the first snows were about to fall that the political chill caused a shudder to run through the Nordic lands. Scandinavia had not recovered from the shock of the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia when word leaked out of a secret "finishing trip" of Soviet Prime Minister Alexei N. Kosygin with Finland's President Orio Kekkonen. Only a month before, Finns had been telling visitors their relations with Moscow never had seemed calmer.

The border between Lilliput Finland and giant Russia, and their relations generally, are highly sensitive. Now the Scandinavians began to wonder: What if Kosygin was to soon









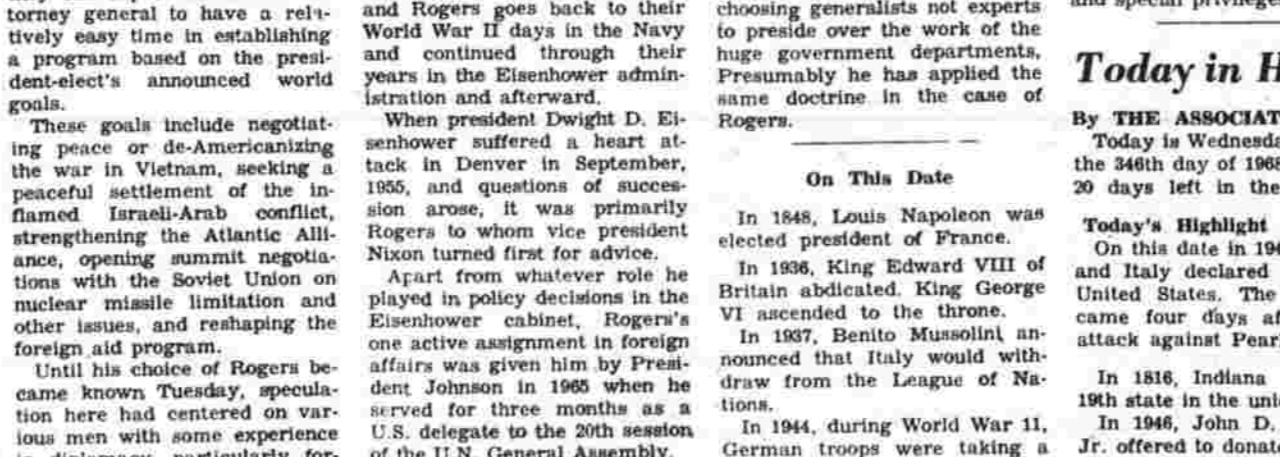

Round Moon Flight High-Risk Mission

A spacecraft in earth orbit will return to earth some 100 miles from the moon, however, its ladder to safety gets longer and longer, even as the moon recedes from the spacecraft. It will take three days for Apollo 8 to reach lunar orbit, but it will be 200,000 miles from earth by the time the moon is 20 hours like a team and return to earth.

The Apollo 8 crew, Air Force Col. Frank Borman, Navy Capt. James A. Lovell Jr. and Air Force Maj. William A. Anders, will become the first humans to be captured by the gravitational pull of another celestial body.

They will be on the moon for the moon long after their oxygen supply falls beyond help, or alternate. Some systems have several backups only hope.

Service Propulsion Rocket Engine is without a back-up system. But even this rocket engine has high redundancy of design. But the engine's thrust chamber, fuel injector and nozzle are without back-up parts. These, however, have been designed with extra strength.

Another big safety factor is the open-ended approach to the mission.

Apollo 8 will be flown on planes of decisions. This can be compared to a swimmer who jumps up by his confidence by walking slowly down stair steps into deep water. On any step of the stairway, the swimmer may decide to stop and retreat.

So it is with the Apollo 8 flight. There are go-no-go decisions which will allow a safe retreat at more than a dozen points along the path to the moon. But, just as the swimmer runs out of safe steps when the water gets above his neck, the Apollo 8 will run out of totally safe points.

That is the point for Apollo 8: when the spacecraft is in a position to be inserted into moon orbit, the moon, and lunar orbit circuit.

When the moon is 180 miles from earth, the crew is committed to complete dependence for survival on the performance of the service propulsion rocket engine. "I will have a very conservative approach to this burn," Borman said recently. "If we have a problem after this burn with the propulsion system or something like that, we would be in trouble."

Borman and his crew regard the mission as a proper risk at this point in the man-to-moon program, but the spacecraft commander points out, "We have elements of danger all along the way."

"We said we were going to the moon," said Borman. "Finally when we get down to examining the details and saying we are really going, people start getting a little queasy about it. But I can't help thinking when I see that vehicle, that booster and the spacecraft that we are looking at the best that American technology can produce. And I have confidence that it will be good enough."

Even after the crew hits the corridor, their problems are far from over. The automatic reentry system must roll the spacecraft's angle of attack on the atmosphere, precisely correct or the spacecraft could still skip out into space again.

After the spacecraft is launched toward the moon from earth orbit, Apollo 8 will determine distance and time as to other manned spacecraft. This distance alone adds risk to the mission.

Hebron Irate People Protest New Apartment Zone

Last night's Planning and Zoning meeting was attended by 100 irate people from the new apartment zone, Roy Wirth of Millstream Rd., spokesman for the group, read a petition to the board stating that the residents of the apartment zone should be consulted in discussions on strengthening the regulations included in the zoning ordinance.

Wirth said he had 100 signatures on the petition and that the group would present it to the board at its meeting on Dec. 22.

The zoning ordinance was adopted in 1967 and has been in effect since then. It provides for a new apartment zone in the area between Millstream Rd. and the railroad tracks. The ordinance requires a public hearing and added frontage.

Lester Rabin stated that he felt the people who were protesting at the meeting last night were against the zone because of fear, hysteria and selfishness. Some suggestions to be included in discussions on strengthening the regulations included increasing acreage required and increasing side yard requirements, partitioning apartments scattered throughout the community rather than concentrated, die with knowledgeable persons on drainage, require of an alternate choice for a public hearing and adding frontage.

The commission was charged with not listening to the will of the people at the first hearing and it was indicated that the people of the apartment zone will meet with the board to discuss their request for an additional \$12,000. Of this amount, \$5,000 is needed to meet the current budget, \$1,000 for a school health aide and \$2,000 to start the school lunch program.

Wirth, in his comments on the petition, stated that he felt the concentration of people in one area would result in traffic problems, create an undesirable area in the center of town, create an area with no adequate sewerage facilities, create an area with no adequate fire and police protection, and create an area with no adequate schools.

Fred Wythe, chairman for the P and Z board, felt the petition was negative and was asking for no apartments but a resident status. He said that if the apartment zone were built in the commercial zone where they belonged.

Wythe stated early in the discussion and kept repeating throughout the meeting that another hearing would be held in the near future to review the apartment zone and regulation on the strength of the petition but this hearing might not call for the abandonment of apartments altogether. Before the meeting was concluded, it was agreed that two persons representing the apartment zone residents would work with the P and Z Commission to present the ideas of the group in a calm manner so that they could be discussed. Wythe asked the group for any ideas they wished to discuss with the commission.

Several persons asked that the commission not grant any further building permits and regulations as a result of this petition and meeting until a new hearing could be held. Wythe pointed out that the new regulations requiring a public hearing before issuance of apartment building permits did not become effective until Dec. 15. Any building permits under the old regulation and not picked up by the new regulation will be issued.

Mrs. Lura Butt read a letter from her father, Douglas Feltz, a resident of Millstream Rd. He expressed his concern with the apartment zone and particularly with the anticipated concentration of apartments to be built on Millstream Rd. Some of these apartments have been approved under old regulations and other proposals are due to come to the commission under the new regulations. Feltz letter stated that this was the watershed for Millstream Rd. and overcrowding of the area could result in pollution of the water supply for Millstream Rd.

Many residents were concerned with architectural details of the buildings, appearance and stated that the apartments were being built in interior materials and foundations were being set on the top of the ground with backfill being used.

Wythe and others seated in the audience pointed out that many of these problems came under the jurisdiction of a building code which Hebron does not have. Wythe suggested that if there was concern in this area, that the town selectmen should be contacted to re-activate the building code committee.

Harvey Lipponoff of Route 6 asked the board if they took any cognizance of the sub-structure of the land before permitting building. Wythe stated that in the past under the old regulations, the commission did not have adequate time to review the soil maps however, under the new regulations, the maps could be consulted and all the

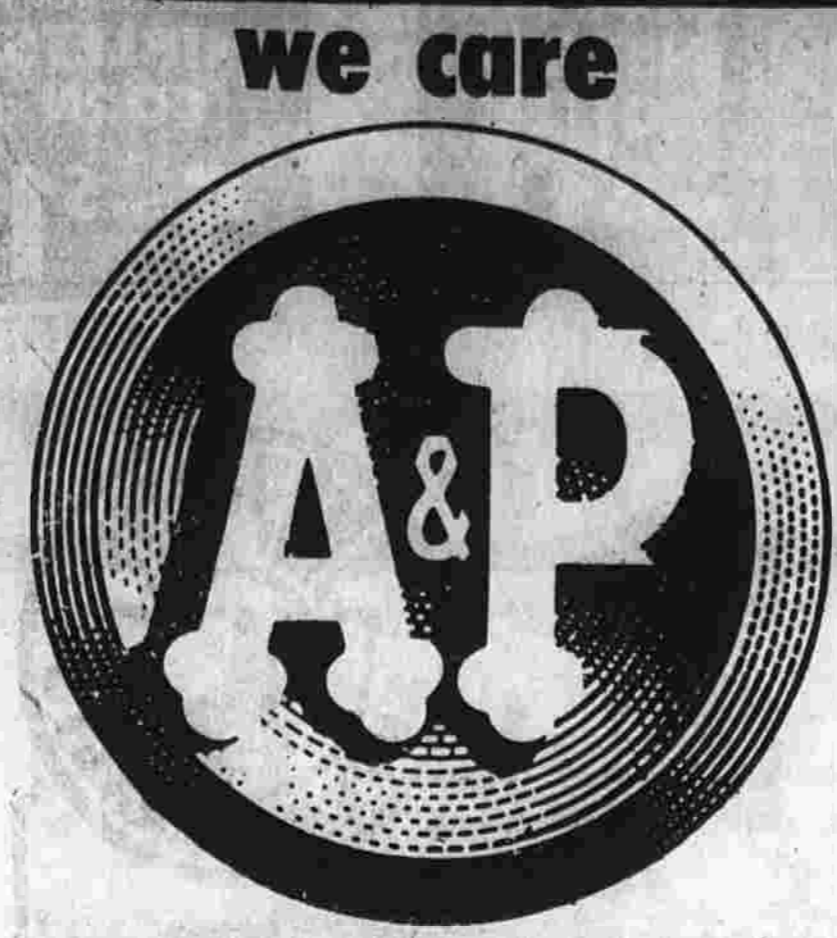

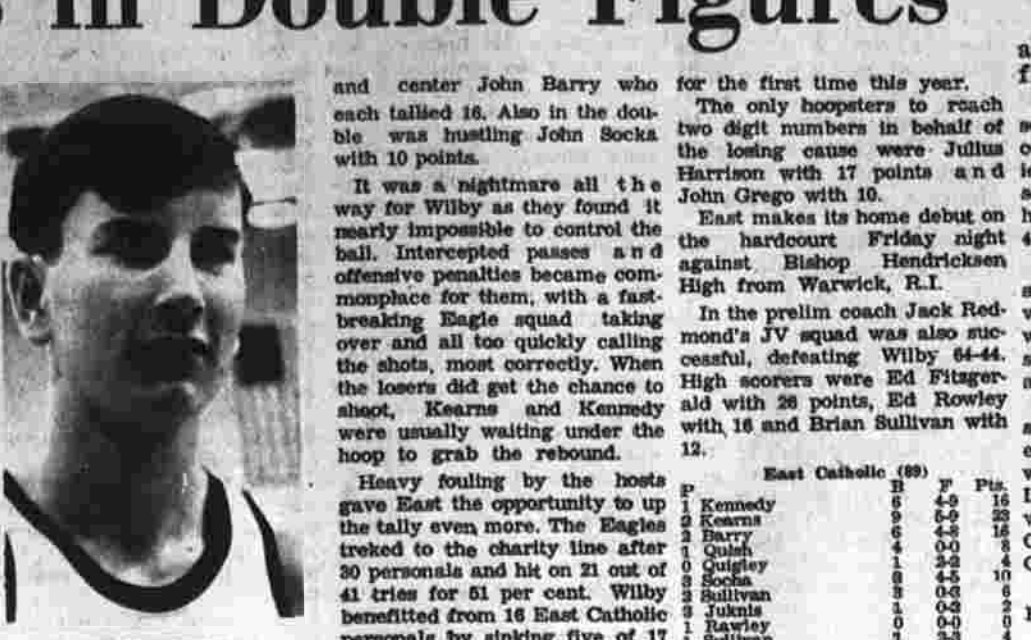
