May Outdo Progressives

There had to be an undercurrent of rony in President-elect Richard Nixon meeting cordially with some 30 Republican governors - when it is remembered that many spent nearly two years trying to block his nomination.

He won at Miami Beach in spite of the active though painfully uncoordinated opposition of several governors in the progressive category. Notwithstanding the notion cultivated in some cirices that his nomination victo-

ry was achieved with a narrow southern base, Nixon far outpolled in delegates his progressive rival, New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, in the total area outside the South. Indeed, he made very deep inroads in the very eastern territory that was supposed to be bound tight to Rockefeller

But the compounded grony is that, having done this and having been elected, Richard Nixon as president may now have to try to outdo in progremiveness the governors who opposed him. Nixon reportedly has sweeping plans

for recasting the GOP into the majority party at the national level - a position it has not occupied for nearly 40 years. Yet his aides concede that no amount of organizational reshuffling or brightening of the party image by the offering gress will do the job "unless Nixon is a good president."

Having triumphed, Nixon clearly will se looked to by the American people to do something positive and conclusive about settling the Vietnam war. Interestingly enough, some very high-placed Democrats think he has a very good chance of doing this. On the domestic front, he continuously

epresented himself to the voters as the andidate who could restore tranquility ridden and sometimes poverty-stricken cities. He won, above all, on "law and Since the problem of unrest, however,

is at once a national phenomenon yet inevitably local in its occurraces, the specific authority involved in effecting solutions can — under our system — onl be state and local. This means that the new Presidents'

contribution must be one of leadership: First devising imaginative new ap proaches, if such can be found, to matters like the racial struggle, crime in the streets and campus turmoil, and then using the political and moral force of his office to gain from governors, mayors and others the support required for application of these new approaches. At best, in this vast area so disturbing to millions of Americans, Nixon can be an inventor, a co-ordinator and a per-If, somehow, even part of this task is

accomplished, Nixon may prove himself with the voters, including countless middle-class suburbanites, who saw him as the promiser of law and order. Still, neither he nor his most perceptive assistants believe this could be enough to assure him of being judged a "good president." It is agreed among them that he must search for, and hopefully apply with telling effect, means which are both economical (in a nation ever more seriously resistant to tax rises) and imaginative for dealing with the racial tensions, the poverty and the alienation now afflicting the inner cities and many campuses.

To do this, he may have to go well beyond progressive GOP governors, not in concepts of spending but in boldness of new ideas. And, to the extent his proposals would cost more money, he may need extraordinary powers of persussion upom millions of suburbanites

Ford, president of the National Cable Television Association, accused the Federal Communications Commission of trying to "halt further expansion of CATV, disrupt the patterns of ownership, curtain any improvement of operating systems and probably destroy the present manufacturing capacity of the industry."

However, Douglas Talbott, general manager of Cx Cablevi-sion Corp. in Atlanta, Ga., own-er of 13 CATV systems,

or of 13 CATV systems, said "it will take time to understand its ramifications."

Talbott apologized for what he called the vagueness of his comments, but said he doesn't fully understand the ruling and neither has anyone class he has talked to from the CATV field.
