

Suspect **Of Mexico**

HOLLYWOOD (AP) -The Frank Sinatra Jr. kidnaping case, first in Hollywood history, was broken today with the arrest of three men and recovery of nearly all of the \$240,000 ransom money.

"Thank God, it's over." said Frank Sinatra Sr., spending his fourth night at the home of his former wife, Nancy. parents, knowing a break was mminent, were reported "sweating it out" with young Frank, 19, and his misters, Na cy Sand, 23, and Tina Sinatra

The three suspects were iden tified in an announcement reas John W. Irwin, 42, of Holly-wood; Barry W. Keenan, 23, of Los Angeles; and Joseph Clyde Amsier, 23, of Playa Del Rey, Calif., a suburban beach town The FBI said all three would be charged with kidnaping. If

convicted they will face a pos aible maximum sentence of lif imprisonment. Keenan and Amsler were held

at the FBI office in Los Angeles while Irwin was held by the FBI in San Diego, accenting speculation that he might have been planning to cross the border into Mexico. At the time of his son's safe

return, the elder Sinatra told a news conference that the kid nap gang may have numbered from seven to nine persons But an FBI agent said of the trio captured:

"I think that's all of them. think we've got them all." Keenan, by coincidence, was School in the same class as the younger Sinatra's sister, Nancy, A spokesman for the family said he wasn't sure whether Nancy knew Keenan but added "she probably did if they graduated together.'

The father of the victim, who had obeyed FBI orders like a good soldier during the 54 hours his son was held by the kidnap ers, was lavish in his praise for the federal men.

"Credit must go to the FBJ for a masterful operation." said the internationally famous singer and Oscar-winning actor. "Our only hope is that the rapidity with which they were apprehended will act as a detercent to others with such houghts in the future. One report that Sinatra had





WASHINGTON (AP) - New rules for cable relevision have been denounced by an industry leader while a government go-a-head for limited pay TV drew both criticism and praise.

Ford, president of the National Cable Television Association, accused the Feder-al Communications Commission of trying to "halt further expan-sion of CATV, disrupt the pat-terns of ownership, curtain any improvement of operating sys-tems and probably destroy the present manufacturing capacity of the industry."

However, Douglas Talbott, general manager of Cx Cablevi-sion Corp. in Atlanta, Ga., own-or of 13 CATV systems,

or of 13 CATV systems, said "it will take time to un-derstand its ramifications." Talbott spologized for what he called the vaguaness of his com-ments, but said he doesn't fully understand the ruling and net-ther has anyone else he has talked to from the CATV field. The FOC announced its new rulings on both pay and osble ulings on both pay and cable

The CATV rules basically re guiate retransmission of pro-grams originating on networks or individual stations, restrict ownership, and require all but the smallest cable TV stations to originate some of their own programs. programs.

The nation's 2,000 or so CATV

The nation's 2,000 or so CATV services began as a means to bring clear signals to small ru-ral areas. Many of the systems have expanded into big cities where tall buildings often block good reception. The TV regulations would al-how subscription television oper-ations in any city, provided such communities already received service from four conventional stations. Only one pay TV stastations. Only one pay TV sta-tion would be allowed in each

city. None of the new rules would go into affect until June, after the FCC hears arguments and, in the case of pay TV, there is review by Congress and the courts.

At present, the only pay TV operation is in Hartford, Conn., where the system was set up in



There is general agreenext that much of the nation's foreign olicy troubles have stemmed from inloquincies within the state department. An overhaul of the department has been the aim of many presidents, but the mecleaning job has never been done. Rogers, with his experience in governent administration, has no doubt been sarged by Nixon with that job.

Thus it appears that foreign affairs will be handled by the president himself with the antistance chiefly of Dr. Henry Kissinger, the Harvard specialist who has been named special assistant for national security affairs. It is likely that both Rogers and Melvin R. Laird, the ecretary of defense, will be closely con-

Another indication that Nixon plans to devote the greater part of his personal effort to foreign policy is the appoint-ment of two particularly effective and trusted associates to politions which will permit them to take charge of domestic

They are Robert H. Finch of Caliornia, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, and John Mitchell, attorney

It has been assumed in some quarters that Mitchell, Nixon's law partner and sampaign manager, would fill the role n the Nixon White House operation that Robert Kennedy, when he was attorney general, filled in his brother's adminis-

Others hold that Finch will be in the position comparable to Robert Kennedy's. The argument is that in the Kennedy time the critical issues in domestic affairs were sit-ins and civil rights dempatrations, thus the attorney general was in the most sensitive position. Of all our holidays, Christmas brings out the strongest feeling of nostalgia. We are willing to go to all kinds of trouble to preserve just one ele-

ment of the far past, whether it's in decoration or food or manner of celebration.

Holiday foods are frequently the only possible way to recapture tradition. Original recipes from hundreds of years ago are intact and never get broken. Ingredients and equipment may change, but the art of cooking is timeless.

Plum pudding is surely one of the most nostalgic of special Christmas foods, yet despite its fame, many people have never eaten a "real" plum pudding. That's partly because it takes time and planning to make, and the list of ingredients is formidable. Nor is it the type of food you eat a lot of. A true plum pudding is very rich, very filling, very special in its dark, fruity, aromatic perfection. Just a few mouthfuls set you back into history.

Here is an authentic, old English "receipt" for "a proper" plum pudding - not a modernized version of fruit cake. It is the recipe that American colonists brought with them and faithfully reproduced for Christmas and Twelfth Night. It is still being made in America by master chef Albert Stockli at his world-famous restaurant, Stonehenge, in Ridgefield, Connecticut.

According to Mr. Stockli, real plum pudding is such a delicacy that you should approach it as a true culinary gift. It's a gift on your table when you serve it at home; but it should also be a beautifully wrapped carry-away gift to very special people on your Christmas list.

This recipe makes enough for both yourself and friends. It should be done right now because it takes three or four weeks of storage for all the great flavors to develop and blend.

The ingredients are many but they're the same today as they were for George Washington or Tiny Tim: suet, flour, eggs, beer and fresh and candied fruits, plus spices. And if you're looking for the plums - there are no plums in plum pudding. And it's really not a pudding, it's a cake.

Real Plum Pudding

11/2 pounds hard beef kidney sue

1 (11/2-lb.) loaf stale white bread 1½ pounds raisins (4½ cups)





Prepare ingredients which require preliminary cutting to fit into a meat grinder: cube suet, core and quarter apples, peel and slice ginger root, quarter and seed lemon and orange etc. Take every-

thing up to the flour and put through the grinder, catching ground ingredients in a very large pan or bowl. Mix together. Add flour, sugar, eggs, beer, rum, brandy and spices. Mix together thoroughly (batter will be heavy and thick). Grease or butter baking containers' and pour in batter to about an inch from the tops. Cover with lid or foil. To keep fruit distributed and prevent a crust, remove cover and stir completely through batter two or three times during the baking period. Bake large molds at 400°F, for 3 hours; small molds at 375°F. for same length of time. When done, remove cover and let cakes cool completely in pans. Then cover tightly with aluminum foil and store in refrigerator for 3 to 4 weeks to allow the flavors to blend and develop. To serve, heat by placing mold in a pan of simmering water or wrap in heavy-duty aluminum foil and heat at 325°F. Serve warm with hard sauce.

A timeless holiday tradition is yours for the making of a real plum pudding. Beer has always been the essential ingredient which blends and melds the fabulous flavors of fruit and spices.

*Plum pudding can be made in any steamed pudding mold, or in deep, round baking dishes or pans. One and two-pound empty coffee cans are also excellent for plum pudding. This amount of batter (about 6 quarts) will fill 6 one-yound coffee cans or 3 twopound coffee cans. It will make 4 to 6 puddings in typical molds or round forms. Remaining batter may be cooked in custard cups.

Cream butter until soft. Gradually beat in sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla. Pile in serving dish and chill until firm Serve about two tablespoons on each serving of warm plum pudding. Yield: about 10 servings.



AP Beligion Writer From the start, A hard uestion beat at the heart of the world. Who owns it? And for what intent? "What is his name?" puzzled

Moses, more than 3,200 years ago, while his enslaved people totled under the Egyptian op-pressor, Pharaoh Ramses II. To whom, or what, does man belong? Where lies his real allegiance? The answer remained searing-

ty elusive, unbound to manage-able equations or definitions. "I am who I am."

But clues accumulated through time and events, chiefly for Christians in the birth of a Jew called Jesus, the manifestation of "the mystery hidden for ages," as described by the apos-tic Paul. That is the content of Christ-

mas. But it wasn't an isolated occurrence, Jesus stood in a long succession. He came in turn in the unfolding of history's disclo-sure. He was part of a process. It foreshadowed Him. It pointed to Him, before and since.
