But the "credibility gap" of the Johnson administration focused attention on the press and the president to the extent that White House press relations have become a subject of public thought and

Various presidents have used various means of handling the press with varying degrees of success.

Franklin Roosevent chatted informally with considerable benefit to his image. Harry Truman outwisecracked and often outstrode reporters in marathon conferences. Jack Kennedy displayed charm and nimble wit at conferences. President Johnson has tried a number of methods without much success. Most reporters feel he is at his best in impromptu en-

Bruised, lacerated and thigh-deep in mud at the bottom of an empty cistern, Jeremiah waited for the end. "They flung me alive into the pit . . . I am lost," says his Book of Lamen-tations.
