





### Top Negro Ballet Dancer Opens School in Harlem

 NEW YORK (AP) — There are a number of Negro dancers in modern dance companies, very few in ballet.

So Arthur Mitchell, a star of the world's top Negro ballet dancer, recently termed "one of the best dancers in the world" by the New York Times critic in Harlem.

"There are people to open the doors," he says. "And there are people to train them—people who are ready when the doors are open. That is what I would like to do."

"This doesn't mean that ballet schools and companies have had their doors closed to Negroes before. However, Mitchell explains that a lot of Negro people have thought they did and there is no reason to become classical dancers.

In his own case, "I don't go by hearsay. Tell me I can't do something and I'm going to break the doors down to get in. I'm a dancer. I don't have to break ballet doors down. He received a scholarship at graduation from New York's High School of Performing Arts, to the School for American Ballet, the school and training ground for the New York City Ballet.

### Welfare 'Flop' In Bay State, Official Says

BOSTON (AP) — A spokesman for the National Association of Social Workers says public welfare in Massachusetts is a complete flop, with fourth and fifth generations on it when they were supposed to be rehabilitated.

The Rt. Rev. Joseph T. Alves, head of the association's social policy and action division, said Monday he thinks the system needs more money for administration, social workers and welfare recipients, an improved civil service system and simple affidavit applications.

"The average welfare recipient in Massachusetts is a child," Mr. Alves said, "and the victim of being born into poverty."

He said his organization opposes requiring a mother whose husband has deserted the family to swear out a warrant against her.

"Such a procedure could prevent eventual reconciliation and accentuate a crisis in the mental health of women and children," he said.

Alves testified before the legislative committee on Social Welfare, whose chairman, Sen. Beryl W. Cohen, D-Brookline, issued a report last month criticizing welfare medical programs.

### Solar Flares Won't Delay Apollo Flight

 CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Despite concern expressed by some scientists, the space agency predicts America's Apollo 8 astronauts will be exposed to radiation no greater than the total equivalent of three chest x-rays when they fly around the moon.

Solar flares erupting on the sun's surface could spew radiation into space between earth and the moon, but "it would take a very unusual flare" to prevent or alter the mission, said an Apollo 8 spokesman, William A. Anders.

"They probably haven't seen more than one or two in the last decade large enough to cause concern," said Air Force Maj. Anders, who plans to head off Saturday for a 10-day flight around the moon with Air Force Col. Frank Borman and Navy Capt. James A. Lovell Jr.

The Apollo 8 spacecraft "is a relatively thick-skinned vehicle," Anders explained.

The largest flare given off during the last 11-year solar cycle produced a maximum of 260 rads. The spacecraft can withstand up to 400 rads, a Radiation scientist in the Soviet Union and other Communist countries have said in recent weeks that

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The question of jurisdiction over a short stretch of Interstate 87 has been resolved, apparently by the mutual agreement of officials in Connecticut and New York.

This was the word from a harassed official of the National Communicable Disease Center which has been deluged with calls from persons worried about Hong Kong flu.

"Some people have odds and some people have something else and it's all being called Hong Kong flu," said George Beneshouse, public information chief of NDCDC.

"We're getting calls from mothers with questions they should be asking their doctors," Beneshouse said Monday. "We try to assure them that if it (the flu virus) is not a strange and exotic disease and tell them to call their doctor."

But still the calls keep pouring in. "We've got four men answering calls in this office

**Manure Accidents**  
 Various presidents have used various means of handling the press with varying degrees of success. Franklin Roosevelt chattered informally with considerable benefit to his image. Harry Truman outwitted and often outbragged reporters in marathon conferences. Jack Kennedy displayed charm and nimble wit at conferences. President Johnson has tried a number of methods without much success. Most reporters feel he is at his best in impromptu encounters.

 President-elect Nixon, of course, has had his bad experiences with the news-gatherers in the past, but he managed a lot of success in his election campaign. The current guess is that he will rely heavily on the type of informal "back-grounders" which he used when he was vice president. In this setting he could sit around with 20 or more reporters and swap information in a relaxed atmosphere, not "on stage" and not being held strictly accountable for every minute detail or for the tone of each syllable.

 Of course, as president, his accountability will be greater, and he will have to have some full dress conferences even though he may prefer to continue the "back-grounder" type as his regular procedure. The technique, itself, is of no great importance to anyone but the people whose job it is to gather and report the news. The result, however, is vital not only to the political leader involved, but to the nation.

 President Kennedy, in his brief term of office, was able to survive some severe crises because he had created public confidence by allowing a steady flow of information and opinion. This despite the fact that he had fierce and larger clamp down somewhat on press representatives of executive departments. ## Roy Darwin Seeks Bar Evidence Seized in 1964

Roy Darwin's counsel has filed a motion asking that a copy of the state seized illegally five years ago and later seized legally be turned from use in Darwin's appeal of the conviction in the state Supreme Court.

name will be called Woderlah, Omsor, Father, Prince of Peace, and peace there shall be no end.

Through the reigns of four kings, the noble born, intellectual, gifted Isaiah served as a royal counselor, guiding the nation's conscience.

He was a widely endowed man—a piercing poet, an adept statesman, a man of action and public affairs, unshakable in the presence of rulers, distressed at military, oppression, and the wretched luxury in the face of poverty, the religious perversion.

"Your princes are companions of thieves, they despise the gift for a bribe, and deprive the innocent of his right." They write "iniquitous decrees," to turn aside the needy from justice and to rob the poor.

Considered the greatest of the Old Testament prophets, Isaiah, like the others, never hesitated to bring politics into the pulpit. It was a prime concern.

"Seek justice, correct oppression, defend the fatherless, plead for the widows," he urged in a ministry proclaimed as like his own.

He was in his early 20s when his military began a brilliant, well-to-do young Jewish scholar, married to an alert, studious wife. They had two sons. The time was 760 B.C., the year Judah's King Uzziah died.

Isaiah's mission lasted more than 40 years—through the reigns of Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, and probably into the start of that of the vicious Manasseh.

It was in the rule of the nervous Ahaz, who about 722 B.C. planned a military pact with mighty, feared Assyria that Isaiah first spoke out against such hellacious combinations, ostentatiously for defense against the neighboring them—repudiated by King dom of Israel and Syria.

"Do not fear... these two monarchies—stomps the king that their own armed threats would be their downfall." Ahaz spurned the advice, shunning his country to evade Assyria, plotting its heavy tribute to Judah's impoverishment, installing Assyria's pagan rituals and altars to serve him.

Under the next king, Manasseh, Judah was plunged into further decadence of Assyrian values, with its cruelties, atheism and even human sacrifice. Tradition says the valiant critic, Isaiah himself was executed by being sawed apart.

But he left his radiant hope on earth, a future driver's counter on earth. "Behold, a King will reign in righteousness... And a high day shall be there... the Holy

In Chicago the University of Chicago and University of Illinois Research and Education Hospitals were forced to limit their intake of emergency patients because of high absenteeism among the staffs.

The number of college closings continued to grow as the school resumed early Christmas vacation in the face of high absenteeism or to avoid the danger of spreading the virus.

Among the latestes to avoid the virus are Eastern Michigan University at Ypsilanti, Mich., Howard and Georgetown Universities in Washington and three campuses of the State University of New York.

Public schools were showing the effects of the flu bug as well. Of Los Angeles county's 860 schools, 70 reported absenteeism rates between 10 per cent from the flu and other diseases.

Seven District parochial schools closed and public schools were hard hit with absentee rates reported increased by 15 per cent.

More than 2,000 Chicago public school teachers were out and about 700 of Boston's 4,000 teachers were reported ill with the flu.

Youngsters in Portland, Ore., appeared to be a harder breed than their teachers—there has been no increase in the number of students sick but teachers absenteeism has jumped about 40 per cent.

And in Columbia River community of Arlington Ore., the high school didn't open Monday. There were plenty of boys and girls on hand but all 17 teachers were sick.

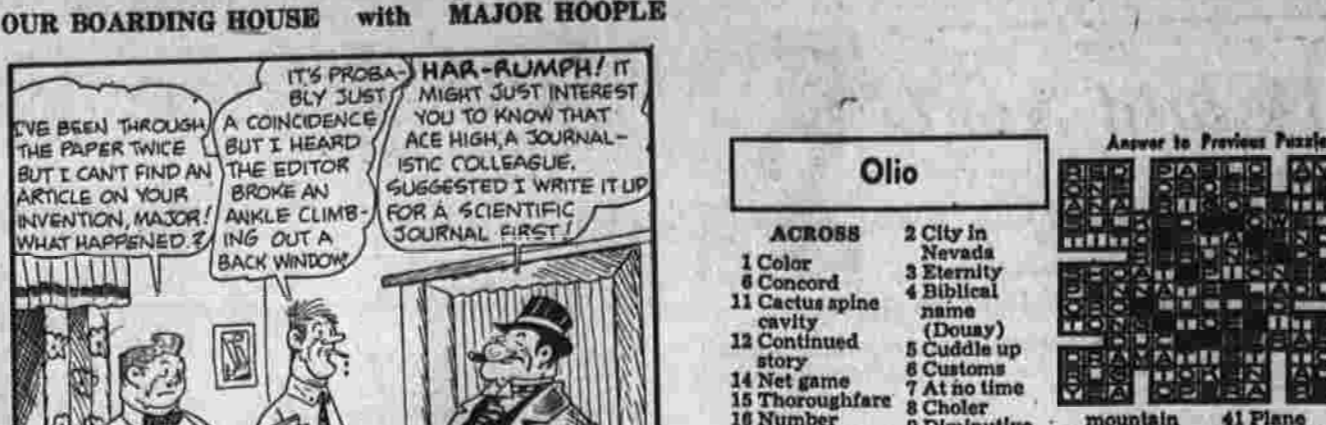

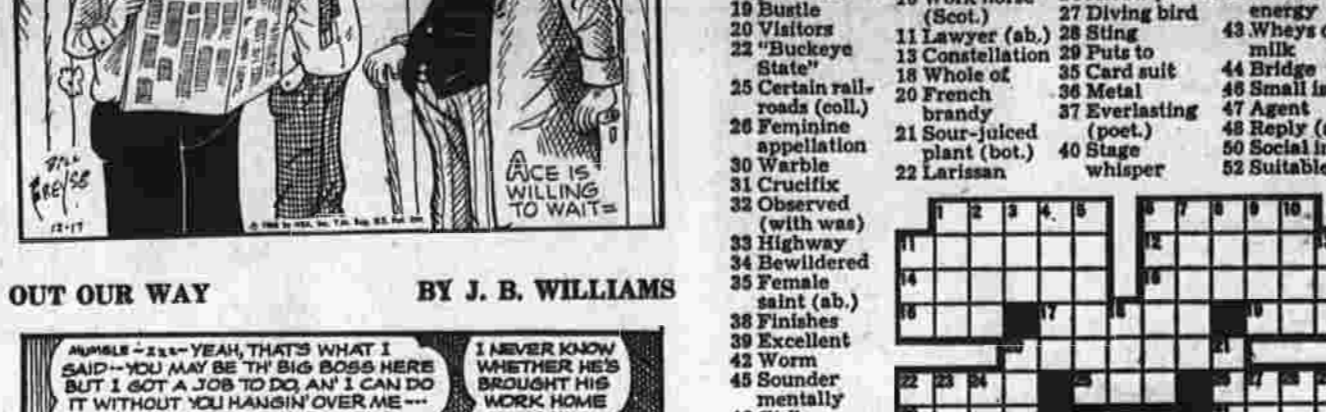

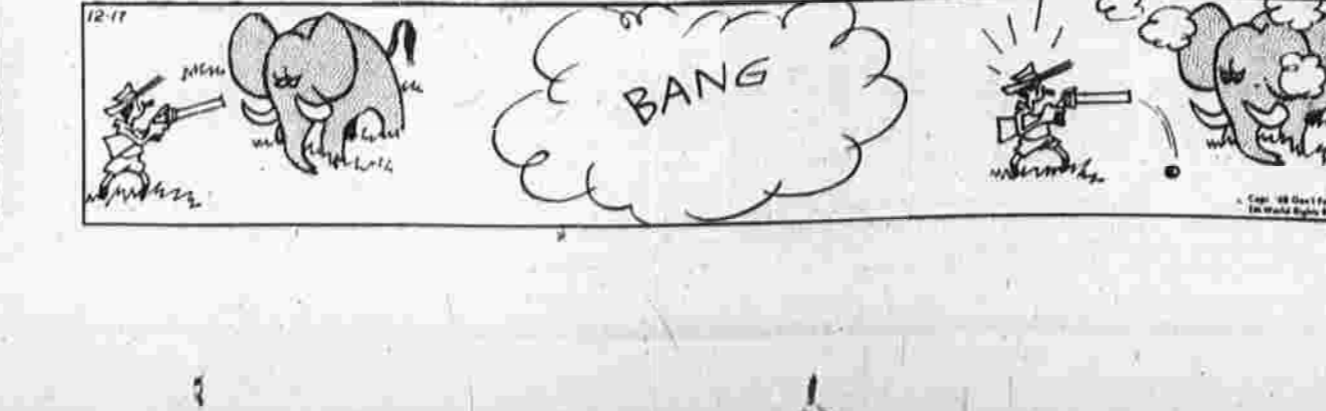
